Aims and Objects of the Association.

- (1) To Safeguard the Health of mothers and babies, by the spread of knowledge of the laws of health.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To employ trained nurses, who shall—
 - (a) Attend certain centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (4) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (5) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The objects of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor, or to a hospital.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,-

In presenting the Sixteenth Annual Report, the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district.

The Balance Sheet, at the end of this pamphlet, is for the Central Council and the Mothercraft Homes and Train-

ing School only.

ADMINISTRATION.

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council, of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected annually by the Council to coordinate the work. This Committee has met at frequent intervals. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of Nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a seperate Sub-Committee, and there is a Board of Trustees to manage the activities of the Newspaper Depot.

LADY HUNTINGFIELD.

Lady Huntingfield kindly consented to become a Patroness of the Association. She has already visited the Training School and some of the Centres, and is keenly interested in the work.

The Lady Mayoress of Melbourne, Lady Gengoult Smith, has also become a Patroness of the Association.

OFFICE-BEARERS.

The Council and Association were most gratified when Sir Walter Leitch accepted the position of President of the Association in September, 1933. Sir Walter Leitch is taking much interest in the duties of President, and in forwarding the aims of the Association.

Mrs. C. O. White, who for the past fifteen years held the position of Hon. Secretary of the Association, has resigned and is now living in England. It has been largely due to the untiring energies and keen interest in the movement shown by Mrs. White, that the work has progressed to its present position.

Mrs. J. H. Dodds, a Vice-President, representing the Free Kindergarten Union of Victoria on the Council of the Association, has gone abroad. Mrs. W. Kernot (President of the Geelong Centres) has been appointed a Vice-President of

the Association.

Mrs. P. Oakden, representative of the Children's Hospital, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Association, has also resigned, during her absence abroad, but the Council hopes for her return later on.

Vacancies on the Executive have been filled by the following members:—Mrs. A. C. C. Holtz, who is a representative of Camberwell Centres, Mrs. Batchelder (Bendigo), and Councillor J. Monahan Lewis (Melbourne City Council).

The Council wishes to thank Dr. Constance Ellis, who acted as President, until the appointment of Sir Walter Leitch, and Mrs. Skene, who, in spite of great pressure of work, undertook the duties of Hon. Secretary during the absence of Mrs. C. O. White.

In December last, Dr. Younger Ross, one of the founders of the movement in Victoria was appointed Hon. Secretary of the Association.

GENERAL PROGRESS.

The work of the Centres during the year has been very satisfactory.

New Sub-Centres have been opened at Daylesford, Portland, Great Western, and a part-time Centre has been

established at Warragul.

New Centre buildings have been erected at Monbulk and Merbein. At Bendigo we are very interested to know that a Centre is to be built as a Centenary Memorial. Mildura, Flemington, Greensborough, Ferntree Gully, Colac and Ascot Vale will shortly operate in their own buildings. There are 100 Centres affiliated with the Association, of which forty-seven have special buildings for the Centre work.

There have been several changes in the Centres during the year, three of the Sisters being on leave in England. We regret very much to report the resignation of Sister M. Wilson owing to ill-health. Sister Wilson was in charge of the Camberwell Centre for over 10 years, and her work with the mothers and belies in that district was outstanding.

has been appointed to take charge of the Baby Health Centre

A Club has been formed of past trainees of the Association. Sister Forrest, of the Ivanhoe Baby Health Centre, being appointed President, and Sister A. Sage is the Hon. Secretary. In connection with the Club, a Library, to be known as the "Margaret White" Library, is to be established. The Sisters of the Association will have the opportunity of meeting at various intervals to discuss their work and to arrange social events. It is intended that the general meetings will be held at the Association's Training School.

TRAINING SCHOOL AND MOTHERCRAFT HOME.

The work at the Association's Mothercraft Home and Training School for Nurses is progressing satisfactorily.

Admissions to the residential part of the Training School numbered 53. Of these 23 were mothers with their babies for re-establishment of breast milk and 11 premature babies. The remainder were artificially fed babies.

During the year 258 individual babies attended the Centre attached to the Training School, and 12 children over two years of age. Total attendances of babies at Centre 2129, children over two years of age, 28. Visits to homes, 452; lectures given, 450; and class demonstrations, 420. Two hundred and sixty-five letters for advice were received and answered.

Twenty Sisters received their Mothercraft and Infant Welfare training during the year at the Training School, and all were successful in the examinations. Two Sisters of the Melbourne District Nursing Society have taken the Course of Training. Many of the trainees of the Association hold responsible positions at the various Hospitals and Institutions in Victoria. The total number of nurses trained by the Association is 318, including 100 Bush Nurses.

Two Mothercraft Nurses have completed their twelve months' course of training and passed the Training School and State Examinations. Both nurses obtained positions at the completion of their training.

Medical students still attend at the Training School for two days at the beginning of their work in the care of children, and it is expected that a further two days at the close of this period will be arranged. Various post-graduate classes and individual lectures have also been held. Refresher Courses for Sisters in Charge of Baby Health Centres have been arranged during the year.

The Council is pleased to report that in spite of reduced

income the work has continued without curtailment of any of its activities. This is due to the splendid response of those interested in the Association. The Council would specially like to thank local Centres for their efforts in this direction.

During the year many members of local Committees visited the Training School and have been very interested in the work that is carried out.

Dr. Kate Campbell still continues her valuable work as Medical Officer of the Association; the Council appreciates her interest and co-operation in the different teaching activities of the Training School.

The Council desires to thank the Matron, Miss Kerville, and Assistant Matron, Miss Sage, for the good work accomplished during the past twelve months at the Mothercraft Home and Training School.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS.

The resignation of Miss Strachan, Hon. Organiser of the Voluntary Helpers, has been received with regret.

From 1920 to 1933, Miss Strachan was responsible for organising the work of the Voluntary Helpers, and the Association is indebted to her for the splendid work she has done in training them for the local Centres.

The Council wishes to thank Mrs. H. Williams, who has now undertaken Miss Strachan's work, for her interest and the valuable services she is rendering.

The Voluntary Helpers are of the greatest assistance to the Sisters in Charge of Centres, and the Council is very grateful to all those who are helping in this branch of the work. The Voluntary Helpers at Ivanhoe and Caulfield Centres have this year formed Auxiliaries to work for the Mothercraft Home and Training School; this further interest is much appreciated.

LECTURING SISTER.

The work of the Lecturing Sister has been very successful. This work hitherto has been carried on at the expense of the Association's funds and without cost to the Education Department and other Schools and Institutions visited. The Council feels that some payment, where possible, should be arranged, as, unless the financial position improves, this most desirable work may have to be curtailed.

During the past year lectures were given at the following schools:—"Fintona" Presbyterian Girls' Grammar

School, "Firbank" Church of England Girls Grammar School, Methodist Ladies College, Domestic Arts Schools:—Camberwell Girls School, J. H. Boyd, South

Malvern Central, Windsor, Port Melbourne, Glenhuntly, Gardiner Central, Thornbury, Deepdene, East Kew Central, Sandringham, Kew, Peel St., Falconer St., Fitzroy, Cambridge St., Collingwood, Elwood Central, Ivanhoe, Fairfield, Auburn Central, Middle Park, St. Kilda Central, Ascot Vale, Heidelberg, George St., Fitzroy, Albert Park, Lee St. Training School.

The results of the examination are as follows:

Certificates Awarded 744, Passed 852 (total 1912).

Lectures have been given to the Fitzroy District Rangers and Malvern Ranger Company, also to the 1st Melbourne and Malvern Girl Guides.

During the year lectures were given to the midwifery trainees of St. George's Intermediate Hospital. Two courses of lectures were given to the students of the Emily

McPherson College of Domestic Economy.

Sister Colvin, Lecturing Nurse, was in charge of the stand occupied by the Association at the Royal Agricultural Show Grounds. Many visitors called and were interested in the Centre. Sister Colvin was able to get in touch with country mothers, who wanted advice or leaflets and patterns of infants' garments.

CO-OPERATION.

The Council wishes to express its gratitude to Professor Marshall Allan for his interest and co-operation in the work, to Dr. Isabel Ireland and Dr. George Simpson for the lectures they have given each term to the trainees of the Association.

Thanks are due to the examiners, Dr. Kincaid, Dr. L. Stokes, and Dr. Boyd Graham, and to the Education Department for arranging for lectures in Public Speaking.

The Willsmere Milk Institute, Free Kindergarten Union, Victorian Association of Creches, Melbourne District Nursing Society, Victorian Bush Nursing Association, Benevolent Society, Junior Red Cross Society, and the Girl Guides Association have greatly assisted in the work. The co-operation of the Country Women's Association in connection with the establishment of Centres in the country districts is much appreciated. The members of the "Time and Talents Society" are thanked for the beautiful garments for babies

STATE GOVERNMENT.

The Council wishes to thank the Victorian Government for the special grant of £100 allocated for the current year towards the Association's Mothercraft Home and Training School. The Government subsidises each Municipality £1 for £1 up to £100 for each full time Centre. It is sincerely hoped that very shortly the Government will see its way clear to subsidise new Centres.

MUNICIPALITIES.

The support received from the Municipal Council where Health Centres are established, has been splendid. They subsidise on a £1 for £1 basis with the Government, and, in addition, have erected many fine buildings for Centres or made rooms available free of charge for the use of the Centres.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION.

During the year the Constitution has been amended (1) to increase the number of members of the Executive from eight to ten (in order that country Centres shall be represented), and (2) a slight alteration in the wording of the Constitution has been made in order that the Mothercraft Home and Training School may be registered under the Hospitals and Charities' Act, 1928. This will not affect the individual Centres in any way, but will allow the Association to apply for a grant from the Board towards the maintenance of the Training School and to raise funds.

NEWSPAPER DEPOT.

The Newspaper Depot is managed by the following Trustees:—Councillors Grant, Renfrey, Pridmore, Monahan,

Lewis, and Mr. A. E. Clarke.

The Depot is a great asset to the Association. The Council is extremely grateful to those who so kindly save their papers for the Association, and would like to specially mention the members of the Junior Red Cross, the Girl Guides Association and students at the Emily McPherson College.

FINANCE.

Total income for the year amounted to £2102/1/-, while total expenditure on general account was £2196/16/1, resulting in an excess of expenditure over income of £94/15/1.

Part of this increase was due to non-recurring expenditure, e.g., £121/17/7, repairs (Training School); £40/4/-, grants. Whilst there were decreases in upkeep due to economy in fuel, light and heating, £88/14/4.

Fortunately, we have had contributions from various sources, which have aided us in tiding over a somewhat difficult financial situation, which we hope at the end of the coming year may have been adjusted.

The Council desires to thank the Trustees of the Edward Wilson Estate, Alfred Felton Bequests Committee, H. V. McKay Charitable Trust, the "Walter and Eliza Hall" Trust, David Syme Charitable Trust, Alfred Edments Estate, Helen Gyles Turner Samaritan Fund, T. J. Sumner Trust, Trustees, Marie Krecklow Estate, J. R. McPherson Trust, Sir William Austin Zeal Estate, Stanley Heath Fund, Lady Gengoult Smith, Mrs. Cecil Levien, Mr. F. J. Cato, Mr. E. Truby Williams, Mr. Sidney Myer, Kew City Council, St. Kilda City Council, and the Proprietors of the "Sun" News Pictorial, for their generous donations.

An anonymous donation of £150, received in April last, was of the greatest assistance to the work.

Thanks are due to the Hon. Solicitors, Messrs Moule, Hamilton and Derham, for their valuable assistance, and the Melbourne Tramway Board for allowing tickets to be purchased for the Sisters whilst on duty at a reduced rate. The Council also desires to thank the directors of the "Argus," "Age," 'Herald," "Sun" and "Star," for their cooperation and assistance.

Finally the Council wishes to acknowledge as ever the fine work and co-operation of the Sisters in Charge of Centres. During these difficult times more work and anxiety has fallen to their share, but they have shouldered their responsibilties bravely, even though in some cases they themselves have had to accept reduced incomes. The splendid social service rendered by the Sisters is very much appreciated.
