Aims and Objects of the Association.

- (1) To Safeguard the Health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
 - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,—

In presenting the Eighteenth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its Report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates to the Central Council and the Mothercraft Home and Training School only.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council, of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met at frequent intervals. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee, and there is a Board of Trustees to manage the affairs of the Newspaper Depot.

LADY HUNTINGFIELD

Lady Huntingfield, Patroness of the Association, has shown continued interest in the work and has visited many Baby Health Centres throughout the State during the past twelve months. She has expressed her appreciation of the various activities of the Association.

GENERAL PROGRESS

The Council is very pleased to report the splendid progress in the work at the various Centres during the year under review. Special scales for weighing the "toddlers" have been installed in many of the Centres, the Ladies' Committees in most cases raising the funds for the purchase of these scales. The Richmond City Council generously donated a set of toddlers scales for the Centres at North and South Richmond.

This branch of the work, the care of the pre-school child, is needed so that the babies who receive individual care and attention at the Centres are not neglected after they reach the age of two years, but the good work is carried on as far as the time of the Sisters permits. It is considered by the Council that medical inspection is essential for this branch of the work.

The number of Centres affiliated with the Association is 110. New Sub-Centres have recently been opened at Casterton, Eaglehawk, Kangaroo Flat, Elmore and Werrimull. A Sub-Centre is shortly to be opened at Belmont.

There are 60 special buildings for Baby Health Centres. This reflects great credit on the Municipal Councils who provide the land and bear the cost of the buildings. New Centres erected during the year are: Ascot Vale, Bendigo, Colac, Flemington, Ferntree Gully, Greensborough. At Glen Iris and Mildura Centres buildings are in course of erection. Plans are being prepared for new buildings at Geelong West, Brighton, Clayton, Hampton and St. Kilda. In each of the above-named districts Baby Health Centres have been established for a number of years; the provision of special Centre buildings enables the work to be carried out more effectively and the attractive surroundings are much appreciated by the mothers.

Special mention must be made of the very fine Centres at Bendigo and Flemington; the latter, which was erected as a memorial to the late Sir George Cuscaden by the Melbourne City Council, includes a well-equipped dental clinic. Sir George Cuscaden represented the Melbourne City Council on the Central Council of the Association and was for ten years President of the Victorian Baby Health Centres Association.

The Council of the City of Moorabbin and the Women's Club at Redcliffs have recently purchased cars for the use of the Sisters in Charge of Centres, thus facilitating visits to the mothers of their districts. Individual members of the Committee of Castlemaine Baby Health Centre pay official visits to the Centre each month, the result being a far more interested Committee.

SISTERS-IN-CHARGE OF CENTRES

There have been several changes in the personnel of the Staff during the last few months. Sister Hughston, of Maryborough Centre, has accepted a position with the Australian Inland Mission—her place has been taken by Sister de Morton. Sister Bennett has been appointed to the Centre at Box Hill, and Sister Nemnham, of Hamilton, is shortly taking up duty at the Surrey Hills and Burwood Centres. Sister Bailly, a trainee of the Association, is doing splendid work at the Northam (W.A.) Baby Health Centre, where she is Sister-in-Charge.

VISIT OF ENGLISH EXPERT

The following is an extract from a letter received from Dr. G. F. McCleary, formerly Deputy Senior Medical Officer to the English Ministry of Health:—

"Before leaving Melbourne, after a stay which I wish I could have made longer, I should like to thank you again for the opportunities you have given me of seeing something of the good work that is being carried on by the Victorian Baby Health Centres Association. I was greatly impressed by the efficient arrangements made at the various Centres I visited and the thoroughness of the methods adopted; and the Association may well be proud of the Mothercraft Home and Training School. I was particularly interested in what is being done in this pioneer institution, which will doubtless serve as a model for similar work elsewhere. It is evidently the result of much thought and devotion to the public good, and embodies ideas that might well be taken up and find full expression wherever the maternity and child welfare movement is in progress.

"May I be permitted to congratulate your Association on this valuable work and to wish it further success in the future."

TRAINING SCHOOL MOTHERCRAFT HOME

The Council is pleased to report the satisfactory progress of the Mothercraft Home and Training School.

Admissions to the Mothercraft Home during the year numbered 109; of these 29 were mothers with their babies for re-establishment of breast milk and 18 premature babies. The remainder were artificially fed babies.

At the Model Baby Health Centre at the Training School the attendances were as follows:—

Trainees at the Mothercraft Home and Training School during the year numbered 23, making a total of 366 Nurses trained by the Association in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.

Medical Students continue to attend the Training School for Lectures and Demonstrations in Infant Welfare. Dr. Campbell, the Association's Medical Officer, at the request of Professor Marshall Allan, gives lectures to members of the medical profession in connection with the Diploma of Gynæcology and Obstetrics.

Postgraduate Courses are arranged by the Women's Hospital for Midwifery Nurses and the Association is very pleased to co-operate by arranging for the lectures and demonstrations in infant welfare to be given by the Medical Officer, Dr. Kate Campbell, and the Matron of the Training School.

Lectures and demonstrations have been arranged at the Training School for the benefit of the girls of the University High School. These students are very interested in the lectures and have shown their appreciation by making a donation of $\pounds 1$ towards the Association's funds.

Additional rooms have been added to the Training School; the new entrance to the School, facing Swanston Street, is a great improvement to the building. There is now accommodation for the full complement of trainees (8) each term. Before the alterations were carried out rooms were rented by the Association for the trainees. In connection with these alterations the Association is greatly indebted to the Melbourne City Council and also their Architect, who supervised the work, and to Mr. Kerr, City Engineer of Box Hill, for advice and help in technical matters.

The Council wishes to tender its sincere thanks to those Municipalities which have made special contributions towards the maintenance of the Training School.

Dr. Kate Campbell, the Association's Medical Officer, still continues her valuable work in connection with the training of the Sisters in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare, and visiting the mothers and babies at the Mothercraft Home.

Dr. Campbell's interest and devotion to the work is much appreciated by the Council.

Miss Kerville, who was for six years Matron of the Training School, has accepted a position at Adelaide in charge of Infant Welfare work. Her resignation was received with regret. At a Farewell Party given to her the Executive expressed their great appreciation of Miss Kerville's work and wished her every success in the future. The Executive presented Miss Kerville with a travelling bag.

Miss A. Sage has been appointed to the position of Matron of the Training School. Miss Sage was for five years Assistant Matron of the Training School and in that capacity rendered valuable service to the Association.

The "Margaret White" Library at the Training School continues to be of great assistance to the Sisters and Trainees of the Association. Mrs. C. O. White is donating a prize annually to the best Trainee of the year.

AUXILIARIES

The Council has again to record the good work of the

Ivanhoe and "Ashfield" (Caulfield and Brighton) Auxiliaries. Their interest in the Mothercraft Home and Training School and their valuable gifts are very much appreciated and are of the greatest assistance. The gifts comprise garments for the babies at the Mothercraft Home, linen, curtains, groceries, eggs, a Frigidaire, and a suite of furniture for the Matron's sitting room. The Ivanhoe Auxiliary also contributes the sum of 15/- weekly towards expenses in connection with the Premature Babies' Ward.

Miss H. Book, President of the "Ashfield" Auxiliary, and Mrs. E. A. Foletta, President, Ivanhoe Auxiliary, are both sincerely thanked for the splendid assistance rendered to the Association through these Auxiliaries.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council wishes to thank Mrs. H. L. Williams, Hon. Organiser of the Voluntary Helpers, for her interest in the work, and for inaugurating the Voluntary Helpers' Club.

Classes in Mothercraft for Voluntary Helpers have been held regularly during the year. The Sisters-in-Charge of Centres require two Voluntary Helpers for each session, and their assistance so willingly given is much appreciated.

The Voluntary Helpers' Club which was formed last year is very active. Many social events have been arranged which have been a financial success and very enjoyable. A very fine map of Victoria, showing the location of Centres throughout the State, has been presented to the Association by Messrs. Broadbent through the Voluntary Helpers' Club.

VICTORIAN BABY HEALTH CENTRES SISTERS' CLUB

The above Club is a very active one. Meetings are held each month at the Association's Training School. Interesting lectures and bridge evenings are arranged frequently. The Council thanks the Sisters very much indeed for their donation of an electric iron to the Training School.

TRAVELLING HEALTH CENTRE

As a Memorial to the Pioneer Women of Victoria the Women's Centenary Council donated the sum of $\pounds 600$ for a Travelling Baby Health Centre to visit groups of mothers in isolated country districts.

From the King's Jubilee Fund an amount of £828 has been allocated towards the Travelling Centre. The H. V. McKay Charitable Trust has given a donation of £100. In the last few weeks 3DB, the "Herald" Broadcasting Station, has generously donated from the "Tall Story Club" the sum of £700 towards the upkeep and maintenance of the Travelling Health Centre.

The Council hesitated to initiate this project without an assured income, but with this grant they are encouraged to embark in this most desirable activity.

The Travelling Health Centre will not only serve isolated country mothers but will show the shire councillors the benefit of the work and encourage them to support permanent Centres in their districts. Probably, too, it will be an inspiration to other shires to form permanent Centres. The Travelling Centre will first go to the Mallee and the "Herald" Broadcasting Station will inform the mothers of the movements of the Caravan. The Sisters-in-Charge will be able to broadcast lectures on mothercraft.

LECTURING NURSE

For the past ten years the Association has paid the salary and expenses of a lecturing Nurse in schools and has on several occasions drawn the attention of the Education Department to this fact; nevertheless the Department has not seen its way to assist in this activity.

During the past year lectures on Mothercraft have been given in the following schools:—"Fintona" Presbyterian Girls' School, "Firbank" Church of England Girls' School, Methodist Ladies' College, Hawthorn, Collingwood, Richmond, Camberwell East, Fitzroy, Preston, and J. H. Boyd Girls' School.

The Swinburne Technical Girls' School, Brighton Technical School, Hampton, Essendon, and Coburg High Schools.

Windsor, Port Melbourne, Westgarth, Victoria Park, Richmond, Burnley, Hawthorn, East Malvern, Deepdene, Elwood, Fitzroy, Middle Park, Heidelberg, Albert Park, Fairfield, Ivanhoe, Armadale, St. Kilda Park, Carlton, Auburn, Ascot Vale, Fitzroy (George Street), Gardiner, Glenhuntly, Collingwood, Sandringham, Kew (Peel Street), East Kew, and Thornbury State Schools.

The senior girls in these schools receive lectures and show their interest in the subject by the close attention given in class and also by the results of examinations which are held at the end of each term.

Total—2040 who received lectures in Mothercraft. Head teachers of many schools have expressed their appreciation of these lectures arranged by the Association.

Lectures have also been given to the second and third year diploma students of the Emily McPherson College of Domestic Economy.

The students of the Kindergarten Training College, Kew, received a course of lectures during the year, and the midwifery trainees of St. George's Intermediate Hospital, Kew. These lectures are necessary to enable the nurses to sit for their State midwifery examination.

Addresses were given to the members of the Armadale Mothers' Club on the 9th of June, and to the Mothers' Club of the Presbyterian Church, East Malvern, in January, 1936.

The following Girl Guides were given lectures during the year:—Glen Iris, Darling (East Malvern) and Gardiner.

This year the Stand at the Agricultural Show took the form of a rest room. Leaflets and patterns were on view and obtainable if wanted; information was given in answer to enquiries. The majority of callers at the Stand were attending Centres at home and came to see if they could get any additional leaflets or advice.

During the year the pupils at the schools where lectures have been given have helped considerably in collection of papers for the Newspaper Depot. Large supplies have been received from Elwood, Westgarth, Ivanhoe, and East Malvern Schools, whilst others have contributed smaller amounts.

CO-OPERATION

The Council wishes to express its gratitude to Professor Marshall Allan for his interest and co-operation in the Association. To the lecturers and examiners at the Training School—Dr. Hilda Kincaid, Dr. Hodges, Dr. George Simpson, Dr. Boyd Graham and Dr. A. P. Derham—sincere thanks are extended. Mrs. Siggins is thanked for her lectures to the trainees in public speaking.

The Willsmere Milk Institute, Free Kindergarten Union, Victorian Association of Creches, Melbourne District Nursing Society, Benevolent Society, Junior Red Cross Society and the Girl Guides' Association have greatly assisted in the work during the year, and the Council is very grateful for such splendid co-operation.

The Country Women's Association is of great benefit to the Movement; it is through the efforts of the Country Women's Association that many Baby Health Centres are established.

Miss Iris Turnbull, of 3DB Broadcasting Station, has forwarded to the Mothercraft Home many parcels of useful woollen garments for the babies. Her interest and assistance is very much appreciated. The members of "Time and Talents," who have made beautiful dresses for the babies, are also thanked for their kindness and interest in the work.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The Victorian Government continues to subsidise the Centres £ for £ with the Municipal Councils up to £100 per annum for each full-time Centre. Many deputations to the Government have been arranged by the Association on behalf of the Municipalities and Committees of Baby Health Centres, regarding the question of restitution of the grant to Centres to the original amount, i.e., £125 per annum for each full-time Centre. Those who realise the value of the work done by our Sisters hope that this will be remedied in the near future.

MUNICIPALITIES

The Municipal Council subsidise the Centres £ for £ with the Government and in many cases have continued the subsidy of £125. Many fine Centre buildings have been

erected by the Councils throughout the State and no expense has been spared. The present year has been a record one for Centre building. Members of the Councils take great interest in their Centres and are always ready to help in every way possible.

CHARITIES BOARD

The grant of £200 per annum made by the Charities Board towards the maintenance of the Training School has been most useful; the Association would find it very difficult to carry on the work without this regular assistance.

NEWSPAPER DEPOT

The Newspaper Depot has now been moved to the City, the address being 7 Rankins Lane, Melbourne (telephone F5771). The work is progressing very satisfactorily; its success being mainly due to the interest shown by Mr. A. E. Clarke, to whom the Association is very much indebted. The Council would like to take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Clarke for giving up so much time to the Association and for his help and advice in matters concerning the Depot.

The work has been greatly assisted during the past year by special collections of paper organised at State Schools and by members of the Junior Red Cross Society. Now that the Depot is situated in a more central position many donors of papers are very kindly arranging to bring their papers direct to the Depot—this is of very material assistance. The Council thanks all those who have saved their papers for the Association.

FINANCE
