NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,—

In presenting the Nineteenth Annual report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to, the Central Council and the Mothercraft Home and Training School.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council, of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met every month. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee, and there is a Board of Trustees to manage the affairs of the Newspaper Depot.

LADY HUNTINGFIELD

Lady Huntingfield kindly consented to represent the Association at the Seventh English-Speaking Conference on Maternity and Child Welfare held in London in June 1937. The Council is deeply indebted to Lady Huntingfield and very much appreciates her continued interest in the Association and the work of the Baby Health Centres throughout Victoria.

GENERAL PROGRESS.

New sub-centres have been opened at Belmont, Branx-holme, Devenish, Gisborne, Macedon, Warracknabeal. At Bayswater and Warrandyte, new centres are being established.

There are now 117 centres affiliated with the Association,

55 of these being in country districts.

New buildings for centres have been erected at Hampton, Brighton, Geelong West, Glen Iris, and Mildura, and many new buildings are contemplated.

MOTHERS' CLUBS.

During the year an interesting development of the work has taken place in the formation of Mothers' Clubs, in connection with the Centres which are run on educational lines. The Mothers are very interested and good attendances are reported at every meeting. There are three Mothers' Clubs at Essendon, one at Colac, Croydon and Terang. A very successful Mothers' Club has been established at Bendigo for some years. Lectures are given by Specialists.

TRAVELLING BABY HEALTH CENTRE

The Travelling Baby Health Centre is now completed and will begin its service shortly to mothers in country districts. The first visit will be paid to the Wimmera and Upper Mallee. Sisters Hughston and Turner will be in charge of the Travelling Centre.

The Women's Centenary Council donated the Travelling Baby Health Centre in honour of the Pioneer Women of Victoria, and a further donation of £828 was received from King George V. Jubilee Fund. 3DB Broadcasting Station donated £700 from its "Tall Story" Fund to maintain the Caravan for a year. It is hoped that its value will be demonstrated sufficiently to enable funds to be raised to continue and develop the service in other districts.

In the front portion of the Caravan, a Baby Health Centre is arranged to accommodate five people and sleeping and living accommodation for two Sisters in the rear.

All equipment and furnishings, scales, linen, china, cutlery, etc., have been donated by business houses.

The Council wishes to place on record the very fine service rendered to the Association by Mr. F. W. Kerr, City Engineer, Box Hill. Mr. Kerr has designed and supervised the building of the Travelling Baby Health Centre, and his advice and help on matters in this connection have been invaluable.

TRAINING SCHOOL AND MOTHERCRAFT HOME

The work of the Mothercraft Home and Training School has progressed very satisfactorily under the management of Matron Sage.

Admissions to the Mothercraft Home during the year numbered 109.

At the Model Baby Health Centre at the Training School the attendances were as follows:—

Trainees at the Mothercraft Home and Training School during the year numbered 27, making a total of 393 nurses trained by the Association in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.

Medical Students continue to attend at the Training School for lectures and demonstrations in Infant Welfare—the number attending during the past year being twenty-eight. Post Graduate Courses arranged by the Women's Hospital for Midwifery Nurses include lectures and demonstrations in Infant Welfare.

Dr. Kate Campbell, the Association's Medical Officer, continues her valuable work in connection with the Mother-craft Home and Training School—visiting the Mothers and Babies at the Mothercraft Home and giving lectures in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare to trainees of the Association.

The Council wishes to thank Dr. Campbell most sincerely for her great interest and work for the Association.

The "Margaret White" Prize, donated by Mrs. C. O. White, (England), for the best trainee of the year, was awarded to Sister Elsie Stafford.

AUXILIARIES

The Council is very grateful indeed to the "Ashfield" (Caulfield and Brighton) and Ivanhoe Auxiliaries for their splendid assistance to the Mothercraft Home. Many valuable gifts have been received from these Auxiliaries. Special interest is shown by the Ivanhoe Auxiliary in the premature babies ward.

Miss Book, President of the "Ashfield" Auxiliary, is sincerely thanked for her continued interest and for the work she has done for the benefit of the Mothercraft Home.

Mrs. Foletta, President of the Ivanhoe Auxiliary, is also thanked most sincerely for her interest and help.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS AT CENTRES.

Mrs. H. L. Williams continues her valuable work as Hon. Organiser of the Voluntary Helpers—the Council thanks her very much indeed for her interest and the help so willingly given to this branch of the work of the Association.

The assistance rendered by voluntary helpers at the centres is greatly appreciated by the Sisters-in-charge, and the Association.

During the past twelve months, 32 new Voluntary Helpers have attended the lectures at the Training School and were successful in the examinations held in June, the majority of the helpers have been allotted centres, the remainder are waiting for vacancies at centres near their homes.

It is the intention of the club to provide the Training School with a camera and projector to show films demonstrating the lectures on Mothercraft.

LECTURING NURSE

The Association considers that the work of the Lecturing Sister is of great importance to the future generation.

During the past year the following schools have been visited and lectures given to the senior girls on Mothercraft:—

Firbank, Church of England Girls School, Brighton, Fintona Presbyterian Girls Grammar School, Balwyn, Methodist Ladies College Hawthorn; Hampton, Essendon and Coburg High Schools, Brighton and Swinburne Technical Colleges; Collingwood, Richmond, Preston, Fitzroy, East Camberwell, South Melbourne and Brunswick Girls Schools; East Malvern, Hawthorn, Burnley, Richmond, Victoria Park, Westgarth, Port Melbourne, Windsor, Ivanhoe, Fairfield, Middle Park, St. Kilda Park, Albert Park, Heidelberg, Ascot Vale, Auburn, Carlton, Armadale, Thornbury, Gardiner, Sandringham, East Kew, Kew, Deepdene, Fitzroy, Elwood Collingwood and Brunswick North State Schools.

Examinations are held at the end of each course of lectures and during the year pupils who sat for the examination, numbered 1921, the results being as follow:—

The girls, with very few exceptions are keenly interested in Mothercraft, and look forward to the weekly lectures.

The Headmistresses of the various schools have expressed their appreciation of the work being done by the Association in making these lectures available.

The pupils of the schools where lectures are given have contributed towards the Newspaper Depot; large collections of papers being received from E. Malvern, Westgarth, Brighton and Elwood as well as smaller quantities from other schools.

The pupils of Fitzroy Girls School have given a donation of day gowns and booties for the babies in residence at the Mothercraft Home.

Visits to the Training School were paid by pupils from the Emily McPherson College of Domestic Economy, Methodist Ladies College and the Fitzroy Girls School.

Lectures were given to the Diploma Students of the Emily McPherson College of Domestic Economy, and to the Students of the Kindergarten Training College, Kew.

Two courses of lectures were given to the midwifery nurses of St. Georges Intermediate Hospital, Kew.

From the 12th to 19th November last, the Victorian Baby Health Centres Association occupied a stand in the Melbourne Town Hall in conjunction with others who took part in Children's Health Week. The stand attracted a great deal of attention and many visitors expressed their opinion regarding the great value of the work of the Centres in helping to improve and maintain the health of the babies.

CO-OPERATION

The Council wishes to express its gratitude to Professor Marshall Allan for his continued interest in the Association, to the lecturers and examiners at the Training School:—Dr. Hilda Kincaid, Dr. George Simpson, Dr. A P. Derham and Dr. Boyd-Graham, sincere thanks are extended.

The Willsmere Milk Institute, Free Kindergarten Union, Victorian Association of Creches, Melbourne District Nursing Society, Benevolent Society and Girl Guides Association, have all greatly assisted in the work throughout the year. Special mention must be made of the interest shown by members of the Junior Red Cross Circles; they have been very active in helping in the collection of newspapers for the Association's Depot.

The Australian Women's National League (combined junior branches) have organised social functions in order to raise money to help the work; great interest being displayed in the Training School.

Members of "Time and Talents" have again donated most lovely garments for the babies at the Mothercraft Home-their work is much appreciated.

The Council has also to thank 3DB Broadcasting Station for beautiful woollen garments for the babies; many parcels of useful clothes have been received.

The Country Women's Association is co-operating with the Association in the work of the Travelling Baby Health Centre—interesting their members in the scheme and helping the Association in planning areas to be visited.

STATE GOVERNMENT.

The Victorian Government has subsidised the Centres £1 for £1 with the Municipal Councils up to £100 p.a. for each full time centre. In some instances this amount has been increased to £112/10/- p.a., but further reductions have recently been made. The Council sincerely hopes that the Government will see its way to restore the grant to centres to the full amount paid before the depression, i.e., £125 p.a. for each full time centre. When the Baby Health Centre

Movement was inaugurated, it was estimated that the cost of running a full time centre (including salary of the Sister-in-Charge and maintenance of centre) was £250; of this amount the Government agreed to pay £125 p.a. the Councils paying £125 p.a.

MUNICIPAL COUNCILS

The interest shown by Municipal Councils in their individual centres is apparent to everyone who has seen the fine buildings erected for carrying out the work for the welfare of mothers and babies. The cost of these buildings is borne entirely by the Councils, many of whom have also supplied the furnishings. Municipal Councils are in many districts making up the Government Grant reductions. They are hopeful that the Government Grant will soon be restored to the original amount paid, i.e., £125 p.a.

The Councils at the present time in addition to subsidising the centres are providing buildings which cost from £600—£2000 and in many instances they are making special grants for milk to be provided for necessitous cases.

CHARITIES BOARD

The Grant of £200 p.a., received by the Asociation from the Charities Board, towards the cost of maintenance of the Training School, is of great assistance.

NEWSPAPER DEPOT

The Council wishes to take this opportunity of thanking all donors of paper for the Newspaper Depot. Through the organised effort of interested members increased supplies have been received for which we are very grateful. The work of the Depot is progressing very satisfactorily.

At many of the centres, boxes for the collection of newspapers are installed. Several donors from country districts have very kindly arranged for their supplies of paper to be delivered direct to the Depot.
