# Aims and Objects of the Association

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nusses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall-
  - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers,
  - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

#### THIRTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Thirtieth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, the Mothercraft Home and Training School and

Travelling Baby Health Centre.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office bearers and ten members of Council, of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met every month. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee.

#### **OBITUARY**

The Council records its deep regret at the sudden death during the year, of the Chairman of its Finance Committee, Mr. A. W. McNicol. Mr. McNicol had been appointed by the Charities' Board to the Finance Committee as a Government representative some years ago, and on his appointment to that Committee he was elected Chairman, a position he held up to the time of his death.

The Council very greatly valued Mr. McNicol's keen interest and help in its work, and will miss the assistance he always gave

so readily.

#### **GENERAL PROGRESS**

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting that legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its

progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strengh and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot

be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project, but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the

necessary equipment.

There is no doubt that the best results in Centre work and their general running to suit the interests of the mothers and babies who attend eventuates when Councils have such a Ladies' Committee, with whom they work in close co-operation and unison. The Council thus "fathers" the Centre and assumes technical responsibility for it, but uses its committee to "mother" the Centre and carry out the necessary detailed supervision and domestic management. Councils cannot expect to get the best work and interest from their committees unless they are prepared to work in close

consultation with them in all Centre matters, and as the movement is one to serve the needs of the mothers, it is obvious that a Women's Committee will understand their needs in regard to this service, and would be better equipped to carry out the purchase of the necessary equipment and the planning of new buildings, etc., and give all these details the necessary time and thought than a busy Council.

#### YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are now 239 Centres affiliated with the Association—151 being in country districts. With the 28 townships served by the Association's Travelling Baby Health Centre, this makes 267 districts linked up with the Association.

During the year 9 new Centres were established at Belgrave Heights, Bentleigh, Carisbrook, Golden Square (Bendigo), Highett, Merino South, Pascoe Vale, Strathmore and Tooradin.

Reports from many Centres show a continuance of active work in their districts by the extension of the services given to the Mothers and the provision of extra equipment.

Many Committees have funds in hand, or plans for the raising of the necessary money to assist their Councils with the provision of new Centre buildings, where this important work can be carried out with more comfort and privacy for the mothers and with better facilities for the Sisters.

Many grants for assisting new Centres with equipment, and for providing extra equipment for existing Centres, have been made by the Association.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centres and delegates to the Central Council of the Association was held at the Victoria Palace on Friday, 11th June, at 2.30 p.m. Over 150 delegates attended and came from the Metropolitan area and from all parts of the State.

The Hon. Secretary, Dr. Officer, visited the following country Centres during the year:—Ballarat, E. Ballarat, Croydon, Leongatha, Charlton, Boort, Belgrave, The Basin, Ringwood, Sassafras, Rochester, Eltham, Portland, Heywood, and Port Fairy.

The Hon. Secretary also accompanied a deputation to the Fern Tree Gully Shire Council to press for the establishment of a Home Help Scheme in that district, and for the Council's interest and support for it.

Many meetings of different Women's organisations were attended during the year, and talks given on the importance of Maternal and Child Welfare work.

The Hon. Secretary, Dr. Officer, was given four months' leave of absence for health reasons during the year.

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils also contemplate providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of

transport

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers, it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the Mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the Community.

It is therefore important for the Association to see that through the standard and type of training given at its Training School, its Sisters are equipped with the necessary knowledge and other qualities to enable them to help Mothers in all the domestic and family problems they bring to the Centre Sister. It is equally necessary that Councils make the most careful selection of fully qualified Infant Welfare Sisters for the positions in their Centres. They should bear in mind that not only is a sound training required, but adequate and recent experience subsequent to it, is essential. The right personality to gain the mothers' confidence is a most important requisite for any Sister in Charge of a Centre. Wrong personality will soon reflect itself in a lowered attendance of Mothers at the Centre.

#### Advice at the Centres covers:-

Expectant Mothers.—Attendances of expectant Mothers at all Centres need to be improved by publicity directed to the benefits obtained from such attendance, and the help given. This advice forms a valuable adjunct to that received from the ante-natal clinic of the public hospitals, or from the Mother's own doctor.

The establishment of pre-natal clinics in connection with Centres and under special expert medical supervision needs further extension, and it is encouraging that several Committees have expressed interest in this side of the Centre work, and hope to get such a clinic established in their districts in the near future.

There are now 10 special Pre-Natal Clinics attached to Baby Health Centres in the Metropolitan area—namely, at Collingwood, Fitzroy, Hawthorn, Northcote, Prahran, Richmond, Sandringham, South Melbourne, Sunshine and Fairfield.

In Maryborough, the medical practitioners have also established a pre-natal clinic, and are to be very warmly congratulated on this move—which could with advantage be followed in other country Centres.

Increased care of the expectant mother, with particular attention paid to nutrition, would considerably help to lower the infant mortality rate by decreasing the number of deaths from prematurity—the highest single cause of our infant mortality rate, and responsible for about half the deaths of infants occurring in the first month of life.

Better pre-natal care would also considerably help the mother in breast feeding her infant, another valuable factor in reducing the infant mortality rate, and in creating the right relationship between the mother and child at the outset, which is so necessary if the mother is to give her child the proper feeling of love and security, which is fundamental to its right adjustment through life. Pre-Natal Clinics in the Municipalities are available to all those in their district who wish to take advantage of that service.

Mothers With Infants.—Many unnecessary infant deaths and much ill-health and sickness is prevented by the mother's regular attendance at the Health Centre, where under expert guidance the baby's progress can be watched and correct advice and supervision in management given. Home Visiting, which is part of the work, is important in enabling the Sister to advise the Mother with a full knowledge of her home environment, and special help can be given her in overcoming any specific difficulties occasioned by it.

Children of Pre-School Age.—Post war development of Centres should include the need for medical supervision of all work at the Centres, and for the periodic examination of the babies and children attending. Such medical officers would need to be specially experienced in this work, since it is a speciality requiring both training and experience. The appointment of Child Welfare Medical Officers to supervise the work in their districts is recommended to Councils.

The City of Melbourne has for many years employed such a Medical Officer, and last year the South Melbourne Council appointed one for their district.

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local districts.

Mobile vans for dental inspection and treatment is a crying need in such outback country districts as those served by the Association's Travelling Baby Health Centre. Local dentists are few in these districts, and their attendance at some country townships irregular and with long intervals. This makes it impracticable for mothers to take in their children of pre-school age for advice and treatment. The incidence of dental caries amongst children of this age, and in these districts, is staggeringly high.

Prc-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for Toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development

of children at different age levels.

Croydon has a Nursery School established at its Centre. Play groups have also been established in connection with other Centres, e.g., Belgrave, Lilydale, Warragul and Casterton, and others contemplate forming them. These play groups often function in suitable halls, made available for the purpose.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with Baby Health Centres. Such Clubs are primarily educational in object and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

Clubs are also established at Albert Park, Bendigo, Northcote, North Essendon, Ascot Vale and Moonee Ponds. Maryborough for three years has had a very progressive Mothers' Club, which has arranged many educational lectures for the mothers in the district.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of

special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating Libraries of suitable books for the use of the Mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Many Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre, or living in their districts. Vaccination and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sister in Charge of Centres should encourage all their Mothers to have carried out.

#### MUNICIPAL HOME HELP SCHEME

The Council appreciates the increasing interest taken by Municipal Councils and Women's Organisations in the establishment of Municipal Home Help Schemes in their districts.

The service so successfully inaugurated by the Kew City Council and its Women's Committee has proved a valuable demonstration to other Councils. Kew now employs 6 housekeepers. Scuth Melbourne Council has also established a Home Help

Scheme, and is increasing the number of full-time housekeepers to two. An arrangement is also in operation in South Melbourne, whereby "hourly" help is supplied for certain cases of need.

Hawthorn has also had a Municipal Home Help Scheme operat-

ing for some time, with one housekeeper employed.

Fern Tree Gully established a similar scheme during the year, but subsequently lost the housekeeper employed, and are now

seeking to make another appointment.

The Government subsidises Councils £1 for £1 up to £125 per annum for any deficit incurred in running such a service. This subsidy is encouraging but is bound to prove inadequate as this Service develops, and more Emergency Housekeepers are required to meet increasing demands for this help in individual districts.

#### PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Many problems affecting the health of Mothers and, consequently that of their families, have been the concern of the Association during the year. Reports from many Sisters in Charge of Centres confirm the fact that many mothers are battling to carry out their vital job of motherhood under intolerably difficult conditions, conditions which make it impossible for them to fully benefit from the help and advice obtainable from the Baby Health Centre Sisters, since their home conditions make such advice difficult to implement.

Many health schemes put forward by the Government will prove of no real value, until such fundamental problems are tackled, as:—Provision of adequate and sufficient Housing, with slum abolition; provision of reliable essential services, such as gas, electricity and fuel; the encouragement of adequate delivery services, and shopping facilities; increased accommodation for Maternity cases in Hospital and After Care Homes, together with an adequate Nursing Staff, to ensure proper care and longer rest for the Mother following childbirth, with the encouragement of Municipal Home Help Schemes to relieve the Mother's anxiety as to the welfare of her other children at home, whilst she has the benefit of this extra care for herself.

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner, Vice-President, attended a Conference in Ballarat during the year in regard to the cutting out of a Sunday Milk Delivery in that area, and representations were made to the Premier on the inadvisability of any interference with a sevenday delivery of milk, as there would inevitably be repercussions in health following such a retrograde step in any district

#### INFANT MORTALITY RATE

Vital Statistics for 1947 show that the infant mortality rate per 1000 births was 26.28. This is a record low rate for Victoria. In each of the years 1945, 1946 and 1947, the rate was under 30; the first occasion on which the rate dropped below 30 was in 1945.

This low rate is encouraging, and there is no doubt that the Baby Health Centre movement has played a major part in achieving this, especially in reducing the death rate amongst infants from 1 month old up to the end of the first year.

The neo-natal death rate, i.e., that occurring in the first month of life could be further improved, especially those due to prematurity. This could be improved by better care of Expectant Mothers to reduce the number of babies born prematurely, and by increased trained Nursing care in all Midwifery Hospitals, and further improvement in obstetrical practice to reduce the number of what are regarded as "unavoidable birth injuries."

# VERA SCANTLEBURY BROWN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP APPEAL.

Many Committees have generously supported this Appeal, and through the Association, have contributed to it. The sum of £282/17/4 has been forwarded to the Trust Fund by the Association to date.

The Council congratulates Sister V. T. Baker on winning the first award of this Scholarship. Sister Baker trained in Infant Welfare at the Association's Infant Welfare Training School, and later, was appointed one of the Sisters in Charge of the Association's Travelling Baby Health Centre. The Council wishes Sister Baker a very successful and interesting period of study whilst she is abroad.

#### "BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

During the year the Association undertook the publication of a Quarterly Magazine "Baby Health," a new venture in propaganda work designed to interest more and more people in the work of the Baby Health Centres, and Maternal and Child Welfare work generally. Two issues of the Magazine have appeared to date.

#### VICTORIAN BABY HEALTH CENTRE SISTERS' CLUB

The members of the Sisters' Club continue their interest in the Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School, and have arranged various functions to raise funds in support of it and other activities in which the Club is interested.

The sum of £16/8/ was raised for the "Centaur" Memorial Fund, and a donation of £6 was made to the Training School.

A Christmas presentation was made to the Association's Medical Officer, Dr. Kate Campbell, in appreciation of her lectures to the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres and ready help afforded them at all times in any problems they bring to her.

Flowers were also presented at Christmas to Mrs. Skene, a Vice-President of the Association and Chairman of the Training

School Committee.

Flowers were also sent to the Association's Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, whilst she was in Hospital, and also to the Hon. Treasurer of the Sisters' Club, Sister E. Stafford, during her period in Hospital.

#### **VOLUNTARY HELPERS**

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters in Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters in Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babies and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

### MOTHERCRAFT HOME AND INFANT WELFARE TRAINING SCHOOL

The year has as usual been a busy one, and residential care and investigation has been given to a number of difficult babies, including premature ones. Owing to lack of accommodation a number of cases seeking admission and urgently requiring the specialised care obtainable at the Mothercraft Home, had to be refused.

Attendance figures for the Centre in some instances are slightly lower than last year's figures. There are various reasons for this, the birth notifications received for the year are almost 100 lower than last year, and quite a number of mothers, formerly attending have now left the district, as they have obtained homes in other suburbs.

The Committee is greatly appreciative of the excellent work of Sister F. M. Smith, who is in charge of the Centre. The Committee also has valued her enthusiasm and the amazing amount of thought, work and time which she has given to preparing and making the wonderful sets of demonstration equipment. This equipment is used for the instruction of mothers attending the Centre, and for the training of both Infant Welfare Sisters and Medical Students.

#### **TRAINEES**

Thirty (30) Sisters commenced training during the year. Two were unable to complete the Course, one on account of illness and the other for family reasons.

A total of 669 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of the Movement.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year:—

The "Sir Herbert and Lady Olney" prizes, given to the trainee in each term considered most suitable for Baby Health Centre work, have been allotted to:—1st Term, Sister J. Guy; 2nd Term, Sister H. Brownell; 3rd Term, Sister H. Grano.

The "Margaret White" prize, awarded to the trainee considered best for the year has been given to Sister H. Grano.

"Pro-Vita" prizes, awarded for the best essays on "Pre-Natal Care and Mothercraft Nutrition," have been won by:—(1) Sister G. Pannell, (2) Sister K. Chancellor.

No entries have been received for other Terms.

The Council is grateful to the donors of these prizes, and for their encouragement to the trainees to aim at a high standard of efficiency in their work.

The Council congratulates the winners of the prizes and wishes them success in their future work, which it is hoped will be in the sphere of "Infant Welfare."

Seventy-two (72) Medical Students attended during the year, and were keenly interested in the special lectures and demonstrations arranged for them in Infant Feeding and Management.

Six (6) Sisters completed Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

Medical Lectures at the Training School have been given by Dr. Kate Campbell and Dr. Elizabeth Turner.

Dr. Winifred Kennan continues to give the Medical Lectures on Ante-Natal work to the trainees.

Lectures on "Public Speaking" have been given by the Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer.

Special Lectures on the Pre-School Child have been given by Miss Walker, of the Public Health Department, and each term the trainees have attended at the "Lady Gowrie Centre" for demonstrations in pre-school work.

Dr. Elizabeth Turner gives a clinic every week on the babies attending the Centre.

Dr. Kate Campbell holds a weekly clinic at the Training School on the babies and mothers in residence.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by its Lecturers and the time they devote to this work.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by Matron and her Staff.

The Council values very highly the work of its senior Medical Officer, Dr. Kate Campbell, and appreciates her interest in supervising the care of the mothers and babies in residence, and the teaching she gives in that connection to the trainees. The Council also values Dr. Campbell's experience and help in any medical matters connected with the Association's work, referred to her by the Executive Committee. Dr. Campbell has been Medical Officer of the Training School for 20 years, a fact which the Council feels should be specially recorded, and also special mention made of how highly it regards her work, and values the knowledge and long experience which she brings to it.

The Council also congratulates Dr. Campbell for the very excellent revision of the former "Guide to Infant Feeding," which she has carried out in conjunction with the late Dr. Scantlebury Brown, and completed after her death. The new "Guide" forms a very excellent text book for the Infant Welfare Training Schools, and for medical practitioners who are engaged in the care of the infant and young child, and contains a wealth of valuable knowledge in easily presentable form.

Dr. Campbell continues to lecture once a month at the Training School to Sisters in Charge of Centres. These lectures are much valued by the Sisters, who find them wonderfully helpful, and at the lectures they are able to bring the problems and difficulties that they meet in the course of their work to Dr. Campbell, and gain great help in discussing them with her.

The Council very greatly appreciates all the work carried out by its Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. Elizabeth Turner. It would also like to record its congratulations to her on recently obtaining her M.D. degree.

Various changes in Staff have occurred during the year. Matron R. Swanton resigned in April, and in June, Miss Jean Stillwell was appointed Matron, but was not free to take up that position until October. During the interim period, the Assistant Matron, Sister I. Ould, acted as Matron, Sister E. B. Phillips as Assistant Matron, and Sister Dowrick was appointed Staff Sister. The Council has very greatly valued the work carried out by these Sisters, and the co-operative and capable manner in which they have carried out all the work at the Training School pending the appointment of the new Matron.

The excellent work carried out by the domestic staff of the Training School has been much appreciated by the Council. The smooth working in this sphere very greatly aids and assists the work of the Training School as a whole, and is appreciated by the Matron, Nursing Staff and trainees.

The Association's Lecturing Sister, Sister Mole, has visited the Training School periodically with members of her Mothercraft classes, and also with two groups of pre-nursing students from the Emily McPherson College of Domestic Economy.



#### TRAVELLING BABY HEALTH CENTRE

This Service has been on the road eleven years, and was the pioneer of such services in Australia. A successful year's work is reported.

Total attendance figures are slightly less than last year's figures, but fewer new babies were enrolled for the district compared with last year. However, the enrolment of new babies compares very well with the number of birth notifications received for the district. 256 babies attended the Travelling Centre out of 274 birth notifications received, only 18 babies were not enrolled. This represents a 94 per cent. response of mothers to invitations to attend the Travelling Centre—a remarkably fine one for such a large and scattered district, and when mothers have long distances to travel in order to attend. It indicates the very high value placed by the mothers on this service.

General health of the babies and children have been above average.

Twenty-eight (28) towns and townships are served with a regular torungatly service, and many wayside calls and stops to interview mothers en route are made.

Improvements are being made on nearly all the roads, and only one or two are impassable at any time. The road to Ultima is bad in wet weather, and is out of the question for the Caravan after 20 points of rain; in fine weather there is no difficulty. The Patchewollock road is still the chief worry, it is always rough, and very skiddy in wet weather.


The schedule has not been altered during the year, and has been maintained very well throughout the year, occasionally townships have been missed on account of bad roads, or engine trouble.

The Caravan travels over 1,000 miles per month, and is continuously on the road except for the short breaks in the schedule when the Sisters are on Annual Leave.

The only major repair needed for the engine was a new clutch plate, the other one having burnt out.

There have been some changes in the staff of the Caravan during the year. Sister Goodin became ill and had to return to welbourne for treatment. For a few days a Sister was lent to the Caravan by the Ouyen District Hospital, so that Sister Northcott would have a companion, and be able to continue the schedule. The Council is very grateful to the Ouyen Hospital for this kind help. Miss Doreen Hill was then sent up from Melbourne to assist with the driving and domestic side of the Caravan routine, until Sister Brodrick could be appointed to the Staff. Sister Northcott and Sister Brodrick have been in charge of the vehicle since then, and the Council is highly appreciative of their excellent and capable work with this Service, which is so greatly esteemed by the Mothers in the district.

The Council greatly appreciates the wonderful hospitality shown to the Sisters by the Mallee people, and knows how much



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
the Sisters value this kindness. It is a very great help to the Sisters and to their general happiness in their life on the Caravan.

The Council warmly thanks the men in the Mallee who so readily assist the Sisters in any trouble or difficulty. The Council also values the work put into the Caravan by the various garages in the district, and the helpful way they service the vehicle to keep it in running order, and up to time on its schedule.

The "Bedford" Caravan was lent to the Maternal and Child Hygiene Branch of the Public Health Department in September to initiate a new Mobile Service in the Kowrie Shire.



The Department had no suitable vehicle available, as they were awaiting receipt from the Government of three vehicles for their Mobile Services, and their delivery was delayed. The "Bedford" Caravan was on loan for six months. Letters of appreciation for the Association's co-operation in making the vehicle available were received from Dr. Meredith, Director of Child Welfare, and from the Minister of Health, Sir Albert Dunstan. The Council greatly appreciates the help and co-operation of the Board of Management of Fairfield Hospital in allowing the "Bedford" Caravan to be garaged at the Hospital pending its being put into commission to serve a new district. The Council is also very grateful to Mr. Neep, Secretary of Fairfield Hospital, and to Mr. Baxter, head of the Ambulance Service at Fairfield and his Staff for their kindness in looking after the Caravan and putting it in running order when lent to the Department, and its supervision since its return in March.



#### LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT

The Lectures in Mothercraft given by the Association at many Girls' Schools, and to various Women's organisations, form an important feature of its activities.

These lectures are greatly valued by the Principals of the Girls' Schools, and the amount of work that the girls put into preparing project books on the subject is indicative of their interest and enthusiasm.

Visits have been arranged for the girls to the Association's Training School and Mothercraft Home, and to various Baby Health Centres. The girls enjoy these visits, and show a very intelligent interest in the babies and equipment. A number of the classes at the schools are larger than is desirable, but this appears unavoidable. Some of the smaller schools formerly visited have been omitted this year, and it has been arranged for them to have a Mothercraft class every second year. This will increase the number of girls able to have Mothercraft Lectures.

Forty-eight (48) Schools were visited, a number of the larger schools have had three and four classes. A total of 2,129 girls received tuition in Mothercraft during the year—410 more than last year.

and personality are received by the Association.

These Lectures in Mothercraft play an important part in educating girls for Motherhood, the career most vital for the Nation. Such lectures, together with such subjects as Homecraft and Home Nursing, should be compulsory ones for every girl in every school.

#### COUNTRY SISTERS LECTURING IN MOTHERCRAFT

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied by the Association to schools in the Metropolitan area, Sisters in Charge of the following Country Schools have given lectures in their districts:—Benalla, Colac, Echuca, Euroa, Geelong, Maryborough, Rochester and Wonthaggi.

The Council congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

#### **CO-OPERATION**

The Council wishes to express its appreciation for the interest, help and co-operation received from Dr. Meredith and members of her Department during the year.

With the rapid growth and enlargment of the Movement as a whole in this State, there is need for the development of an even greater and closer liaison between the work being carried out by such a Voluntary organisation as the Association and the Maternal and Child Hygiene Branch of the Public Health Department, this would be mutually advantageous, and greatly assist the advancement of the whole Movement.

The Council also expresses it's appreciation of the interest and help received during the year from Dr. Hilda Kincaid, Child Welfare Medical Officer to the Melbourne City Council, especially in connection with the work of the Association's Training School

Centre in Carlton.

The Council thanks the Directors of the "Argus," "Age," "Herald" and "Sun" newspapers for the valuable publicity afforded during the year in regard to the Association's work. The Council also appreciates the space given by the Editors of many country newspapers to this work.

#### STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £200 per annum for each full-time bister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister. The Government's subsidy represents half the salary of the Sister (and that of the relieving Sister for two weeks).

Municipalities pay the other half of the Sister's salary (on a £1 for £1 basis), in addition the Municipalities, assisted by their Committees, pay all maintenance expenses, and the cost of the erection of any special buildings found necessary to house this

service adequately.

The Association congratulates the Government and is appreciative of the fact that in its Budget this year, a sum of £40,000 is set aside for the subsidising of special buildings erected for baby health centres, creches and kindergartens. Advice has been received that this subsidy is to be on a £1 for £1 basis with a limit of £1,000 for any one building. This subsidy is helpful and will encourage local effort to raise funds for such buildings, but with building costs as they are to-day the major burden of finance for the erection of these buildings will fall on the Municipalities, aided by their local Baby Health Centre Committees.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Infant Welfare Training School, and to other Training Schools, and appreciates the increase made in this year's grant for such purposes. In view of the tremendous increased costs in running such institutions, occasioned by constantly increased salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, an even higher rate of subsidy is imperative if such institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial

anxiety.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for such full-time Sisters appointed. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

#### MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as building conditions are easier, and plans have already been prepared in anticipation of the time when building is possible. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose. Their funds will be greatly assisted by the Government subsidy now obtainable.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £200 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £7/7/6 per week. In addition a uniform allowance of 3/6

weekiy is payable under the award.

Many Councils have increased the number of Sisters employed by them for Baby Health Centre work, others contemplate increasing their staff in the near future. These staff increases have been occasioned by the increasing attendances at the Centres. The Councils are to be congratulated on meeting these increasing demands of the Movement in their districts by extra staff, to ensure that the Sisters have adequate time to carry out the work efficiently for the Mothers. Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters use in visiting and travelling between Sub-Centres.

In some cases the Baby Health Centre Committee assists the Council with funds for the maintenance of the Centre, for the provision of a car for the Sister, or by arranging other transport

facilities.

Where the Sister owns her car and uses it for her work, provision is made in the award for a re-imbursement towards the cost of the use of her own car. This cost is borne by the Council.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part time Centres, or to save her time in visiting the Mothers in their homes.

The Sister's time should be conserved and utilised in every way for the benefit of the Mothers, for whom her services are provided. Time wasted in travelling is uneconomic for Councils at present award rates of salary.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School with regular donations each year.

#### CHARITIES BOARD

The Council records its thanks to the members of the Charities Board for their helpful grant made during the year, and which is of material assistance in keeping the Mothercraft Home in opera-

#### WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by the contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper. The collection of such waste paper is carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee. The interest of every householder to save as much waste paper as possible, and to allocate it to the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper collection is sought, so that by an increase in the general collection of waste paper, the Association may benefit to an increasing amount.

#### **FINANCE**

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. The Council is especially grateful for this help and continuance of interest, when generally rising costs, over which the Council has no control, have considerably added to its financial commitments and anxieties.

Funds are urgently needed for the maintenance of all our present activities and also for their increased development, especially funds for the erection of the Association's new Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School, which is most urgently needed. Its functions make it a key one for the Baby Health Centre Movement as a whole, and in that connection a new Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School bears as important a relationship to Preventive Medicine, as the Children's Hospital does to Curative Medicine.

The increasing attendances at the Centres, and the desire for such services in new districts on the part of the mothers, is the greatest testimony that can be given to the efficient work of the Sisters, and the confidence the mothers have in their advice and help at all times, and in their ability to assist them in their many personal problems and difficulties.

In its work of safeguarding the health of women and children, the Association is playing its part in ensuring sound and happy family life, the only basis for National Security and Strength.


