## Aims and Objects of the Association

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- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
  - (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
  - (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
  - (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
    - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
    - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
  - (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
  - (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.
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The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy. sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

### THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Thirty-fourth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as the co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, The Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre, and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

#### ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council, of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met every month. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee.

#### OBITUARY

The Council records with very real regret, the death during the year of Mr. C. C. A. George, Honorary Treasurer of the Association. Mr. George became Honorary Treasurer of the Association in 1935, whilst a Councillor for the City of Moorabbin. He not only gave many years of valuable service to the Baby Health Centre movement whilst on the Association's Executive Committee, but also did much to further the work in his own district of Moorabbin. His kindly personality endeared him to all those who worked with him, and he has been greatly missed by all members of the Council.

The Council also regrets the death during the year of Mr. J. W. George, who represented the City of Hawthorn on the Association's Council for many years. He was a familiar figure and a very regular attendant at all the Council meetings, and his work for the movement, will be very much missed.



During the year, the death occurred of Mr. J. D. Howie, O.B.E. Mr. Howie was a life member of the Association and a noted charity worker. He died at the age of 91.

The Council was greatly shocked at the recent tragic death of Dr. John Dale, in a motor accident near Venice. Dr. Dale, as its Medical Officer of Health, represented the City of Melbourne on the Association's Council. His kindly personality, and great humanitarian outlook, endeared him to everyone who knew him and worked with him. He had always been interested in the preventive social services, such as the Baby Health Centre movement and the Pre-School movement, and did much to further their advancement in his own City of Melbourne area. Some few years ago, while in England, he represented the Association at the Annual Conference of the National Association for Maternity and Child Welfare, in London.

### GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

### YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are 314 Centres affiliated with the Association, 219 being in country districts, with 42 townships served by the Travelling Baby Health Centres; there are 356 districts linked up with the Association.

New Centres have been established at Armadale, Box Hill North, East Melbourne, Mont Albert, Newtown and Chilwell, Oakleigh South, Pirron Yallock, Surrey Hills and Swan Marsh.

New Centre buildings have been opened during the year at Longwarry, Upwey, Alexandra, Boronia, Gembrook, Highett, Newtown and Chilwell, Seville, Burnley, Murrumbeena and Oakleigh South, and many Committees have funds in hand or plans for raising the necessary money to assist their Councils with the provision of other new Centre buildings, so that the work can be carried out to better advantage, and with more facilities for the Sisters, and amenities for the mothers.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centre Committees and Delegates to the Central Council of the Association, was held at the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre, 96 Keppell Street, Carlton, on Friday, June 20th. There were 130 Delegates present, and 25 country Centres were represented. Sir Herbert Olney, President, was in the Chair, and Mr. Bruce Leahey, M.B.E., Chairman of the Queen Elizabeth



Centre Appeal Committee attended to speak on plans for the Appeal in August.

During the year, Dr. Doris Officer, Honorary Secretary, attended the Moonee Ponds Baby Health Centre, for the unveiling of a plaque in memory of Mrs. E. E. Mott, who had been a member of the Association's Central Executive for many years, and a pioneer of the Baby Health Centre movement in the Essendon district.

Dr. Officer gave a broadcast from 3LO, on the work of the Travelling Baby Health Centre in the Mallee, and also showed films in Malvern, Albert Park, and Richmond, on maternal and child welfare work abroad.

During the year, the Hon. Secretary visited the following Country Centres:— Gembrook, Boronia, Upper Ferntree Gully, Ballarat, Maryborough, Castlemaine, Croydon, Seville, Meeniyah, and Kerang.

We thank Mrs. L. T. Kellaway, Hon. Secretary of the Essendon and District Baby Health Centre Committee, and a member of the Executive Committee and The Queen Elizabeth Centre Committee of Management, for the excellent help she has given the Association during the year, particularly in connection with the domestic affairs of the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre.

### WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils also contemplate providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community.

**Dental Examinations.**—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists.

Albert Park Baby Health Centre is to be congratulated on adding a dental clinic, beautifully equipped, to its Centre Services.

Mobile vans for dental inspection and treatment is an urgent need in such outback country districts as those served by the Association's Travelling Baby Health Centre. Local dentists are few in these districts, and their attendance at some country townships are irregular and with long intervals. This makes it impracticable for mothers to take their children of pre-school age for advice and treatment. The incidence of dental caries amongst children of this age, and in these districts, is far too high.

**Pre-School Facilities.**—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Croydon has a Nursery School established at its Centre. Play groups have also been established in connection with many other Centres—e.g., Belgrave, Lilydale, Warragul and Casterton, and others contemplate forming them. These play groups often function in suitable halls made available for the purpose.

**Parent Clubs.**—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

Clubs are established at Albert Park, Bendigo, Northcote, and Ascot Vale. Maryborough for some years has had a very progressive Mothers' Club, which has arranged many educational lectures for the mothers in the district.



It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

**Libraries.**—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

**Immunisation and Vaccination.**—Many Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre or living in their districts. Vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all their mothers to have carried out.

### PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

**Lack of Housing.**—A separate home for each family is the most urgent need in this country for the health of the community.

No maternity homes, health centres, however well equipped, no schools with up-to-date buildings and apparatus, no free milk or meals can compensate for the evils of an over-crowded home, for it is impossible to teach health where people are herded together in insanitary conditions, as so many are these days. Relieving the acute housing shortage therefore remains a No. 1 Health necessity—inadequate housing outweighs all other problems in its adverse effect on the rearing of a family, and for stimulating an increase in our birth rate.

**Municipal Home Help Schemes.**—The Councils, such as Kew, Hawthorn, South Melbourne, Camberwell, Ringwood and Prahran, who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts, are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need an extension of all existing Home Help Schemes and the provision of properly staffed hostels where the children can reside during her absence.

"Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity.

### Infant Mortality Rate

Vital statistics for 1951 show that the infant mortality rate has slightly risen to 22 per thousand births for Victoria.

This is the first rise in our infant mortality rate for some years, and though still a low world rate, it indicates the necessity for constant watchfulness in connection with all maternal and child welfare services, and conditions which militate against the health of women and children.

### "BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this magazine during the year, and wishes to thank all those who have contributed articles which have helped to make the magazine a success.

The Association values the interest of the firms who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements.

The Council is grateful to all those who have become regular subscribers, as this helps the financial stability of the production. Rising costs of paper and of printing, etc., have increased considerably, and the magazine needs a great many more regular subscribers, and the interest of local Committees to guarantee the sale each issue of a guaranteed number of copies to ensure financial stability of the magazine.

If this support is forthcoming, continued production of the magazine would be ensured. The Minister of Health has approved and granted permission for the distribution of copies of "Baby Health" in Infant Welfare Centres.

### VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babies and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

### LECTURING SISTER

"The Baby Health Centre of the Air" session, which is sponsored by Pro-Vita Products through 3UZ Broadcasting Station, is becoming well-known. Many letters have been received expressing interest and appreciation of these weekly broadcasts.

The Mothercraft classes in the schools have been very satisfactory and the keen interest shown by the girls in this subject is very encouraging. The project books, compiled by the girls, have entailed a great deal of work and pay tribute to their enthusiasm of Mothercraft. Where excursions have been made to Baby



Health Centres and the Training School, the senior girls have shown an intelligent interest in the babies and equipment

The head teachers and head mistresses of the various schools are most co-operative, and have expressed their appreciation of the Mothercraft Lectures.

The State Film Centre has again made available the film—"Care of the New Born Baby", which has been shown at several schools.

The Council expresses its appreciation that the Government this year has agreed to subsidise the Association to the extent of £350 per annum, i.e., on the same basis as the subsidy for Sisters working in Centres. Hitherto, since 1922, the Association has financed this service to the Schools out of its Voluntary funds. The subsidy will be a help in carrying on this Service, particularly with the present high salary rates.

The Council values Sister G. Mole's work as Lecturing Sister, and the many letters in appreciation of her work and personality are a testimony of the wonderful work she is carrying out in the Schools.

### THE QUEEN ELIZABETH MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH CENTRE CARLTON, MELBOURNE.

#### OFFICIAL OPENING.

In 1949, when the former Carlton Home ceased its activities, the Government transferred this 2½ acre site to the Victorian Baby Health Centres Association, for its development as a "Maternal and Child Health Centre".

Re-modelling, renovating and refurnishing of the former Carlton Home building was completed in August 1951, and all the functions formerly conducted at the Association's former building at 730 Swanston Street, Carlton, were transferred to the new building in August, 1951.

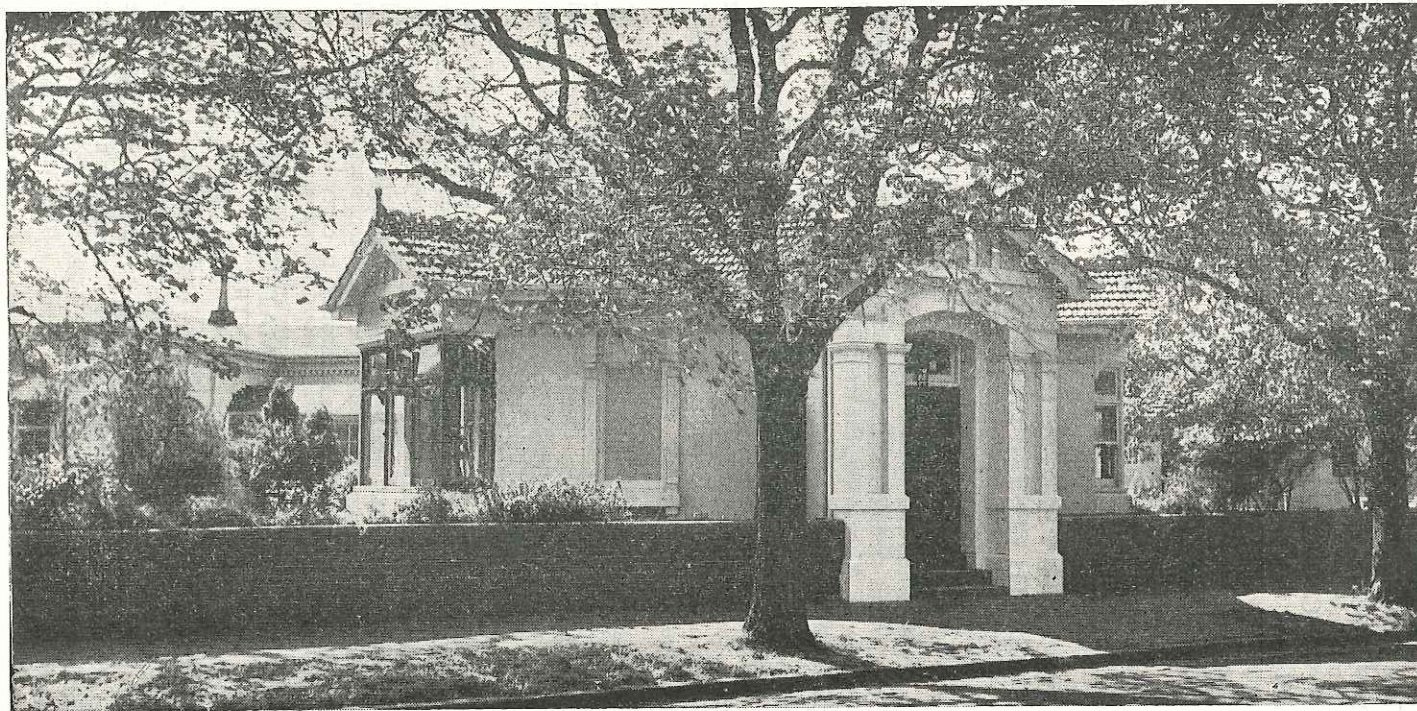
The building was officially opened by His Excellency The Governor of Victoria, Sir Dallas Brooks, on December 5th, 1951, and named by him, "The Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre", after Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother.

The Governor, in performing the Opening Ceremony said, "This Maternal & Child Health Centre has great work to do for the mothers and babies in Victoria—work worthy of a great name. The Queen is absorbed in anything to do with mothers and children, and in granting permission for the use of her name she said she would be very proud for this institution to carry her name."

### THE QUEEN ELIZABETH MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH CENTRE.

The year has been a particularly busy one, as in this new building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers, and to the many delicate frail little infants, including premature ones, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State.

**Nursing Mothers' Wing.**—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers that have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution.

**Infants' Hospital Section.**—In this section skilled attention is being given to premature, frail and delicate babies—little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life.

**Training Functions.**—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre. These highly trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

**Infant Welfare Trainees.**—Thirty (30) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 784 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained since the inception of the movement.

Twelve (12) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year:

“The Sir Herbert and Lady Olney” prizes, given to the trainee in each Term considered most suitable for Baby Health Centre work:—

First Term—Sister Gladys Stott.

Second Term—Sister Elaine Lynas.

Third Term—Sister Jean Hollingdrake.

“The Margaret White” prize awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded equally between Sister Gladys Stott and Sister Jean Hollingdrake.

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The Council is grateful to the donors of these prizes, and congratulates the winners on their success.

Thirty-four (34) Medical Students attended, during the year, special Lectures and Demonstrations in Infant Feeding and Management.

Seven (7) Mothercraft Trainees are in residence for the fifteen months course in Mothercraft.

Dr. Campbell resumed her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre in February, 1952, after her return from her visit overseas.

Dr. Elizabeth Turner continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare and Mothercraft trainees.

Dr. Norrene Nicholson has been appointed as Assistant Paediatrician to the institution.

Dr. Mary Fraser conducts the weekly clinic to trainees in the "Baby Health Centre". Infant Welfare trainees from the Tweddle Baby Hospital have been granted leave to attend these special teaching clinics of Dr. Fraser's.

Dr. Fraser is also medical officer in charge of the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and the Council is especially grateful to her for the time she devotes to the successful establishment of breast-feeding, amongst the mothers in residence—and for the co-operation she receives from the members of the nursing staff.

Dr. Winifred Kennan has resumed her lectures on "Antenatal Care", after her visit overseas. The Council is grateful to Dr. Isobel Ireland, for carrying on this work whilst Dr. Kennan was away.

Dr. T. Seward gives monthly lectures on "Preventive Dental Care" to the Trainees and to the mothers in residence and attending the Baby Health Centre.

Special lectures on the Pre-school Child, have been given by Miss Walker of the Public Health Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" have been paid by the Trainees.

The Council greatly appreciates the work of Dr. Alan McCutcheon in so generously giving his time to look after any sick members of the staff.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by the Matron and her Nursing Staff, and Dr. Doris Officer continues to give the lectures on "Public Speaking" to the Trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the medical officers and lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

Miss M. C. Grant was appointed as Acting Matron, in October 1951, and later as Matron, in December 1951. Sister Buxton was appointed Assistant Matron, in October 1951, and Sister Gladys Stott as Senior Staff Sister, during the year.

The Council appreciates the excellent work carried out at the institution, by Matron and her Nursing Staff. They have been untiring in their efforts to promote the happiness and well-being of the mothers and infants in residence, and in maintaining a high standard of training for the Trainees, all of whom have been successful in their State examinations in Infant Welfare.

The Council has greatly appreciated also, the highly capable and extremely efficient work of the Housekeeper, Mrs. Duxbury, in supervising the smooth running and organisation of the domestic side of the institution, and for her economical catering—a difficult task with the ever increasing costs in food and other domestic supplies. The Council is particularly grateful to Mrs. Duxbury for her wonderful catering and planning for the special functions held during the year at the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre—notably, the Annual Conference in June, and the Press Luncheon held in connection with the Appeal, in July.

The Council expresses its appreciation to all members of the domestic staff, for their loyal and efficient work during the year. The smooth running of this side of the institution is so important for the successful work of the Queen Elizabeth Centre.

#### QUEEN ELIZABETH BABY HEALTH CENTRE.

This Centre gives daily advice to many mothers living in the vicinity, and visits are also paid to the homes of the mothers.

Sister Stubbs resigned during November 1951, and Sister Mesley is not only responsible for the routine running of the Centre itself, but also for the practical training of the Infant Welfare Trainees in Centre work. The Council is grateful to Sister Mesley for her excellent work in this connection during the year, and has also appreciated the interest she has taken in developing the garden around the Centre building, which has added so much to its attractiveness.

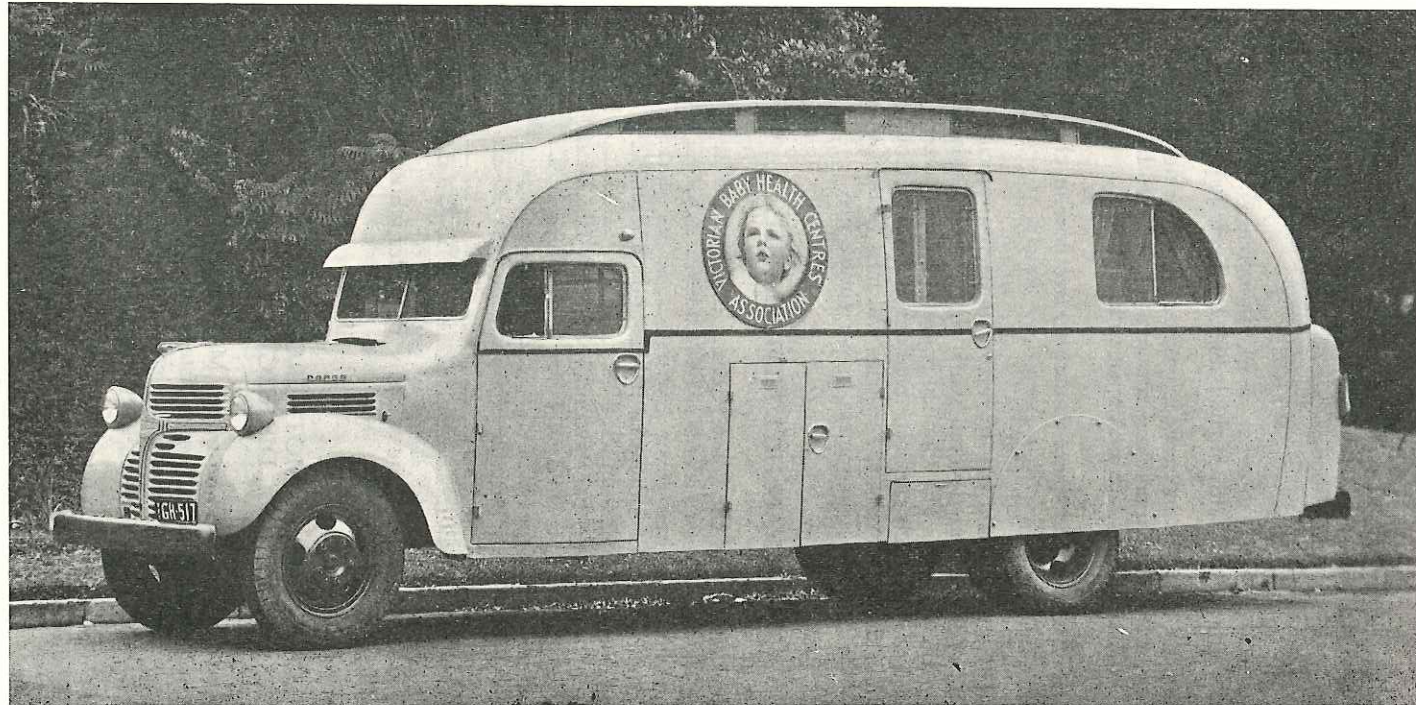

## QUEEN ELIZABETH MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH CENTRE—PUBLIC APPEAL.

A Public Appeal for £50,000 to help maintain and develop the work of the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre was launched by the Association's Patroness Lady Brooks on July 31st, 1952.

The Appeal, at its official launching, was supported by the Premier (the Hon. J. G. B. McDonald, M.L.A.) and by the Minister of Health (the Hon. W. O. Fulton, M.L.A.).

The Premier announced that the Government would allocate £15,000 to this Appeal. (£7,500 to be given this year, and £7,500 in the next financial year). This generous action on the part of the Government was deeply appreciated by the Association.

A Men's Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Bruce Leahey, M.B.E. was formed to work for the success of this Appeal. A Ladies Committee with the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. J. Inkster) as President was also founded. Under Mrs. Inkster's capable leadership many successful functions were organised during August in aid of the Appeal.

The Committees intend to function until the objective of the Appeal is reached.

### CO-OPERATION.

The Council wishes to express its appreciation for the interest, help and co-operation received from Dr. Meredith, Director of Maternal, Infant, and Pre-School Welfare (Victoria), and Dr. E. Wilmot, Assistant Director, and members of the Maternal and Child Hygiene Branch of the Public Health Department, during the year. The Council also expresses its appreciation of the interest and help received from Dr. Phillip Gilbert, Medical Officer of Health, City of Melbourne, and Dr. Broderick, Child Welfare Medical Officer, Melbourne City Council.

The Council thanks the Editors of the "Argus", "Age", "Herald", and "Sun" newspapers for their valuable publicity afforded during the year in regard to the Association's work, and especially in connection with the Association's Appeal this year for the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre.

The Council also appreciates the space given by the Editors of many country and suburban newspapers to this work, and to our Appeal.

The Council greatly values the generosity of the Broadcasting Stations in making time available on the air for publicity in connection with our Queen Elizabeth Appeal. Special thanks in this connection are extended to 3LO, 3DB, 3KZ, 3XY, 3UZ, and



Swallow and Ariell's radio session, and to the "Age" and "Argus" for their assistance with publicity on their network of country stations. The help of the press and broadcasting sections has been deeply appreciated by the Association, and has been of infinite value in furthering the success of the Appeal.

### STATE GOVERNMENT.

The Government subsidy paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £350 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings, which has recently been increased, is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £2,250.

The Association appreciates the increasing State Government interest in Maternal and Child Welfare work, evidenced by its increasing subsidies for this work.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a high rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for full-time Sisters appointed to this work. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

The increased Government Grant to Shire Councils in respect to payment to Travelling Baby Health Centre Services in their districts provided the Councils increase their Grant by 100 per cent. is very much appreciated. This increase dates from July, 1949, and is of the greatest assistance to the maintenance of the Travelling Centre service.

### MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS.

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as building conditions are relaxed. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose. Their funds will be greatly assisted by the extra Government subsidy now obtainable.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £350 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £13/3/- with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificate or certificates other than—

- (a) General Nursing Certificate.
- (b) Infant Welfare Certificate.

A uniform allowance of 3/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre with regular donations each year.

### WASTE PAPER.

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

Collections of Waste Paper for the benefit of the Hospitals and Charities (in which the Association shares) have been resumed. They were dropped temporarily. The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to resume collecting paper and making it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal."



## HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION.

The Council records its thanks to the Hospitals and Charities Commission for their helpful grants during the year; they have been of great assistance in maintaining the work of the Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre. The sums received under the Hospital Benefits Act are also of great value. The Council would like to record its warm appreciation of the interest and always helpful advice given during the year by Mr. C. N. McVilly, Chairman of the Commission. The Association looks forward to a close co-operation with the Commission in the future development of the new Queen Elizabeth Maternal and Child Health Centre in Carlton.

## FINANCE.

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work.
