

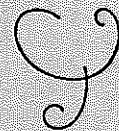

## Aims and Objects of the Association

---

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
  - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
  - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

---

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Thirty-Eighth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as the co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, The Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met every month. The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and Medical Sub-Committee, deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the nurses and the conduct of the hospital and its Baby Health Centre generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee.

OBITUARY

The Council records with profound regret the death of its founder, Dr. Isabella Younger Ross, O.B.E., on 2nd April, 1956, after a long illness.

Victoria will always owe a debt of gratitude to this quiet, unassuming woman through whose drive and initiative it owes the Baby Health Centre services, which since she started them have expanded all over the State and mean so much to the mothers.

With her rich and enriching personality, her commonsense and practical mind, and her quiet determination, Dr. Younger Ross had all those vital qualities which enabled her so successfully to overcome all the initial difficulties in launching this great service for the mothers, and to contribute so much wisdom to its development during her life.

Her memory will remain with all who worked with her over the years since the initiation of this movement, and have been associated with her in its progressive development.

The ideals she stood for will continue to be our constant inspiration in carrying on the work she founded.

#### RETIREMENT OF PRESIDENT

The Council deeply regretted the resignation, in April of Sir Herbert Olney as President of the Association on account of ill-health. The Council records its very deep appreciation of all that Sir Herbert has done to further the work and interests of the Association during his many years' service as President.

The Council appreciates too that Sir Herbert will maintain his interest and help with the Association's work by remaining a member of the Council, and by holding the office of Immediate Past-President.

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner was nominated by the Executive Committee as Acting-President pending the appointment of a new President.

The Council very much regretted that a severe accident in July has incapacitated her for several months.

#### GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

**The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.**

**The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.**

**Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.**

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

#### THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are 361 Centres affiliated with the Association, 253 being in country districts. With 42 townships served by the Travelling Baby Health Centre Services established by the Association, there are 403 districts linked up with the Association.

New Centres have been established at R.A.A.F., East Sale; Heidelberg (Southern Road); Rosanna; Eltham North; Middle Park; Mt. Waverley and Jordanville.

New Centre buildings have been officially opened at Leongatha, Camperdown, Port Fairy, The Basin, Kongwak, Lilydale, Broadmeadows, Ivanhoe, Casterton, Healesville, South Bendigo, Aberfeldie (Essendon).

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centre Committees and delegates to the Association's Central Council was held at the Queen Elizabeth

Hospital for Mothers and Babies, Carlton, on Friday, 22nd June, 1956. There were approximately 130 delegates present, many country centres being represented.

The Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, visited the following districts to attend Annual Meetings, to give talks, or for the opening of new centre buildings: Camberwell, Meeniyan, Warragul, Benalla, The Basin, Hurstbridge, Croydon, Malvern, Dartmoor, Essendon, Heidelberg, Emerald, Sandringham, Lang Lang, Drouin, Colac, Belgrave, Portland, Port Fairy, Heywood, Camperdown, Kongwak, South Bendigo.

Dr. Officer attended the meeting of the Women's Section of the Liberal and Country Party in May to speak on the work being carried out in Britain to help neglectful mothers. Dr. Officer also gave a broadcast on "Footwear for Children" over 3UZ for "National Footwear Promotions."

Dr. Younger Ross attended Annual Meetings at Belgrave and Monbulk and at Castlemaine with Mrs. J. M. Gardiner. This was the last meeting that Dr. Younger Ross attended prior to her illness.

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner attended the Annual Meeting at Ballarat and Upper Ferntree Gully.

Mrs. L. T. Kelloway represented the Association at the Opening of the Lilydale new centre building.

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner and Mrs. Kelloway represented the Association at the opening of the new Ivanhoe Baby Health Centre.

Mrs. W. Rogers represented the Association at the Oakleigh and Belgrave Heights annual meetings, and at the official opening of the Drouin Baby Health Centre's new building, with Mrs. R. Dickinson.

The Association organised an Exhibit of the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies at the "Better Food Exhibition" in January. The Association was grateful to Paddle Bros. for sponsoring the cost of the erection of the stand, and for donating some of the equipment to the Association.

The Council greatly appreciates the interest of Mr. Charles Gough, and Mr. Roy Hoult who, as members of the Association's Council, have been a great help on the Association's Finance Committee—particularly in regard to the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies.

The Council greatly appreciates the appointment of Mr. M. V. Anderson as Government representative on the Association's Central Council.

Mr. M. V. Anderson represents the Hospitals and Charities Commission on the Committee of Management of the Queen

Elizabeth Hospital, and is chairman of the Association's Finance Committee.

The Council greatly values the time and interest he gives to this work.

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner and Dr. Doris Officer represented the Association at the Reception given at Government House during the visit of Lady Mountbatten to Melbourne.

The Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, represents the Association on the Executive Committee and Council of the Children's Welfare Association, and on the Council of the National Council of Women.

Dr. Officer represents the Association on the Victorian Council for Infant Welfare and/or Mothercraft Training Schools, and acts as Hon. Secretary for this Council.

During the year Dr. Officer was appointed as one of the Employer representatives to the new Mothercraft Nurses' Wages Board.

#### WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils also contemplate providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0-5 years of age, (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for



national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community.

**Dental Examinations.**—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists.

Albert Park Baby Health Centre has a beautifully equipped dental clinic at its Centre.

Prahran City Council has also recently established a Pre-School Dental Clinic in its Municipality.

Essendon City Council is to be congratulated on incorporating facilities for a Pre-School Dental Clinic in its new centre building at Aberfeldie. Mrs. L. T. Kellaway, Hon. Secretary of the Essendon Baby Health Centres Committee was largely instrumental in interesting the Essendon Council in this project. The Essendon Branch of the Lions Club contributed £360 towards the cost of the clinic. It is hoped that before long other Municipal Councils will follow the lead of Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran and Essendon City Councils in establishing pre-school dental clinics in their districts.

**Ante-Natal Care.**—Care of the Expectant Mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out of recent years by the establishment of ante-natal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the overcrowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre ante-natal clinics work in close co-operation.

**Pre-School Facilities.**—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

**Parent Clubs.**—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily

educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

**Libraries.**—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

**Immunisation and Vaccination.**—Many Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre or living in their districts. Vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all their mothers to have carried out.

Some Councils include inoculation against tetanus in their routine preventive inoculations to children, and are now undertaking the immunisation of children against polio-myelitis.

## PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

**Lack of Housing.**—A separate home for each family is the most urgent need in this country for the health of the community.

No maternity homes, health centres, however well equipped, no schools with up-to-date buildings and apparatus, no free milk or meals can compensate for the evils of an over-crowded home, for it is impossible to teach health where people are herded together in insanitary conditions, as so many are these days. Relieving the acute housing shortage therefore remains a No. 1 Health necessity—inadequate housing outweighs all other problems in its adverse effect on the rearing of a family, and for stimulating an increase in our birth rate. Inadequate housing also fosters the prevalence of delinquency in the community.

**Municipal Home Help Schemes.**—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need an extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.

“Personnel” for staffing “Home Help” services is our prime necessity.

## INFANT MORTALITY RATE

Vital Statistics for 1955 show that the infant mortality rate for Victoria is now 18 per 1000 live births — a record low level for Victoria — which is encouraging, and is a world low figure.

## "BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over eight years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

## VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

## THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. Since moving to this new building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers, and to the many delicate frail little infants, including premature ones, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State.

**Nursing Mothers' Wing.**—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers that have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution.

**Infants' Hospital Section.**—In this section skilled attention is being given to premature, frail and delicate babies—little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life.

**Training Functions.**—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

**Infant Welfare Trainees.**—Thirty-six (36) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 925 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of the Movement in Victoria.

Eleven (11) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The "Margaret White" Prize awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded to Sister A. M. Richards.

The Council is grateful to the donors of these prizes and congratulates the winners on their success.

Forty-eight (48) Medical Students attended during the year for special lectures and demonstrations in Infant Feeding and Management.

Eight (8) Mothercraft trainees are in residence for the fifteen months' course in Mothercraft.

Three (3) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the year.

Dr. Kate Campbell continues her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

Dr. Elizabeth Turner continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare and Mothercraft trainees.

Dr. Norrene Nicholson assists as Assistant Paediatrician to the institution.

Dr. Ruth Walker looks after the mothers and babies in the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and Dr. Margery Wadds conducts a weekly clinic to trainees in the Baby Health Centre.

Infant Welfare trainees from Tweddle Baby Hospital have been granted leave to attend these teaching clinics conducted by Dr. Wadds.

Dr. Winifred Kennan continues her lectures on "Ante-Natal Care" to Infant Welfare trainees.

Dr. T. Seward continues his monthly lectures on "Preventive Dentistry" to the trainees, and to the Mothers in residence or attending the Baby Health Centre.

\*Special lectures on the Pre-School Child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Public Health Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by the trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by the Matron and her Nursing Staff.

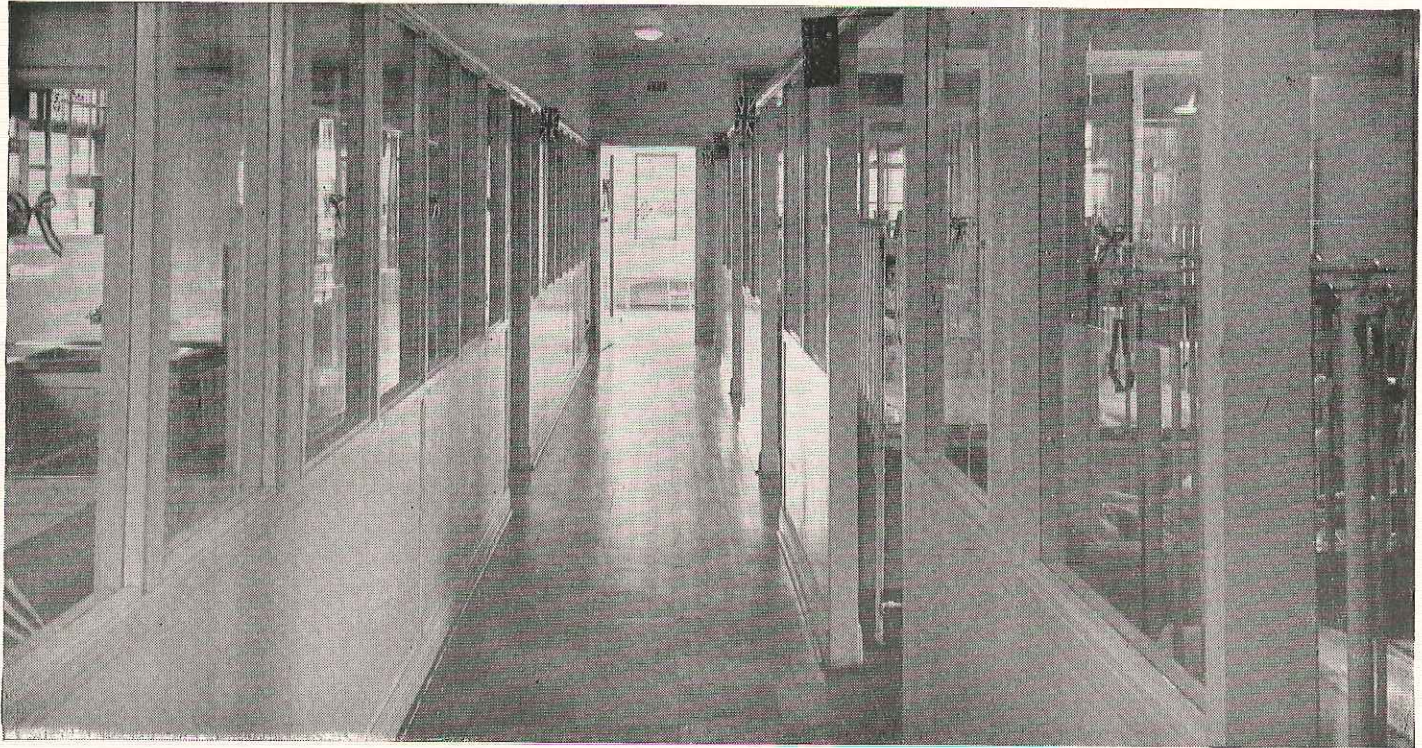
Dr. Doris Officer continues to give the lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

This appeal to commemorate Dr. Younger Ross's work as founder of the Baby Health Centre movement in Victoria was launched on 22nd June at the Association's Annual Conference at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

Lady Brooks, the Association's Patroness, and Patroness of the Appeal Committee, was present, and warmly commended this very special Appeal to further the work which Dr. Younger Ross founded and did so much to advance. The Lady Mayoress, Lady Selleck, kindly consented to be President of the Appeal Committee.

The proposed memorial, a lecture hall to be called the 'Isabella Younger Ross Memorial Hall,' is to be built at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, Carlton. It will form a valuable addition to the hospital's facilities for helping parents, and in its training of infant welfare sisters and other child welfare workers.

It will also form part of the further development contemplated at the hospital in establishing the "Queen Elizabeth II Family Guidance Clinic." The Association has already some funds in hand for this from the "Queen Elizabeth Coronation Gift Fund." The Council has appreciated the support for this Appeal which it has already received from all over the State, from Municipal Councils, Baby Health Centre Committees, parents, and the public generally.

The Council deeply valued the magnificent publicity given it in launching the Appeal by the "Herald" and "Sun" newspapers, which so greatly contributed to the Appeal's success.

The Council also greatly appreciated the publicity given for the Appeal by the "Age" and "Argus," and by the editors of so many local papers in the metropolitan area and in country districts throughout the State. The Council very much valued the publicity for the Appeal afforded by the broadcasting stations. Special broadcasts were made over stations 3AR, 3DB, 3UZ, 3AW, 3XY, 3GL and 3CS (Colac).

The Appeal has now raised £13,525. It is hoped that further donations will shortly bring the Appeal up to its objective of £20,000.

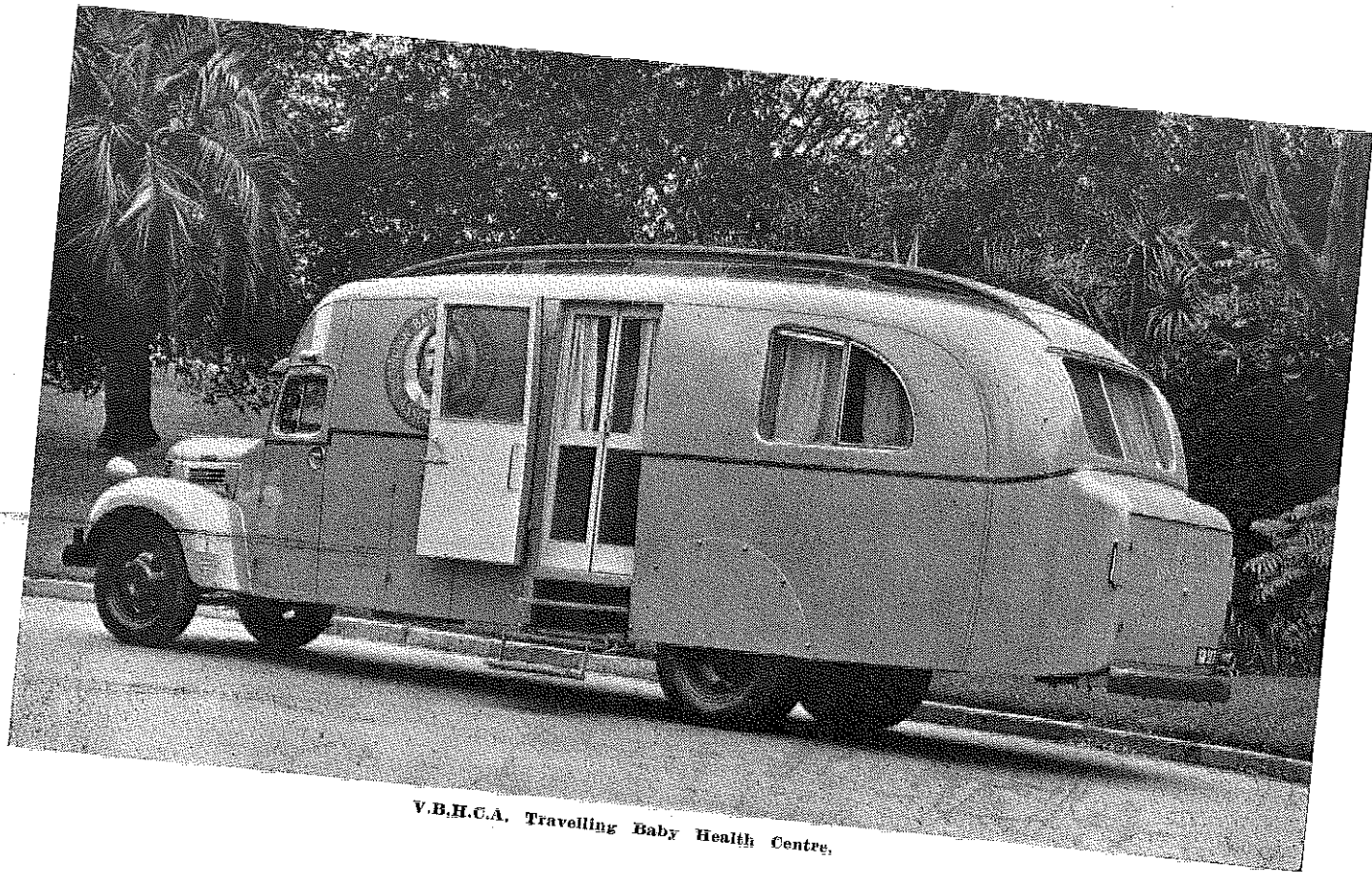
Attendances show an encouraging increase on last year's figures.

#### LECTURING SISTER

Mothercraft classes for 1955-56 have been most satisfactory. The headmasters and mistresses have been appreciative and co-operative, and the girls have shown great interest in the course, making even the very large classes, in some schools, easy to manage.

The standard of the project books is very pleasing, and gives proof of an intelligent approach to the subject by the girls. A prize was awarded in 1955 for the best book of the year and was won by a student of the Brighton Technical School, with a beautifully set out book.

Excursions were arranged for two groups from schools to inspect Mothercraft training centres and these were greatly enjoyed.

Owing to large classes and the danger of infection to the babies, it is impossible for many schools to benefit from these trips.

During the year arrangements were made to show a film to schools with projectors depicting the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. This was greatly appreciated by the girls.

During the year 43 schools were visited. Two schools dropped out during the year — the MacRobertson Girls' High School, with the excuse that all their students already held a mothercraft certificate, and the "Grail" who were not holding a class that year. It is hoped to include these schools again in the coming year.

Many of the schools visited have two, three and four classes.

A total of 2,474 girls received tuition in mothercraft during the year.

Sister E. R. Beggs has continued as the Association's full-time Lecturing Sister. The Council very much values Sister Beggs' work as Lecturing Sister.

The many letters in appreciation of her work are a testimony of the wonderful work she is carrying out in the schools.

The Council of the Association pioneered the giving of Mothercraft Lectures to Schools in 1920, and has carried on this work ever since with a full-time Sister. The Service is financed from the Voluntary Funds of the Association.

**LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT  
— COUNTRY DISTRICTS**

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters in Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

Infant Welfare Sisters in Country areas are giving these lectures at schools in their districts at Warrnambool, Maryborough, Numurkah, Beaufort, Moe, Timboon, Heywood, Branxholme, Warracknabeal, Casterton, Portland, Eumna, Colac, Drouin, Daylesford, Echuca, Manangatang and Wonthaggi.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

**STATE GOVERNMENT**

The Government subsidy paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £450 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2:1 basis up to £2,250.

The Association appreciates the increasing State Government interest in Maternal and Child Welfare work, evidenced by its increasing subsidies for this work.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committee responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have not been increased since 1946.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for full-time Sisters appointed to this work. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

### MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £450 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £16/14/-, with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificate or certificates other than a General Nursing Certificate.

A uniform allowance of 3/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies with regular donations each year.

The Council appreciates the subsidies given by the Shires of Walpeup, Whycheproof, Karkaroc, Swan Hill and Kerang to keep the Travelling Baby Health Centre in the Mallee in operation. This has been of great value in assisting the Association to maintain this service with its greatly increased maintenance costs these days.

### WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to collect paper and make it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal," in which the Association shares.

### HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION

The Council records its thanks to the Hospitals and Charities Commission for their helpful grants during the year; they have been of great assistance in maintaining the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. The sums received under the Hospital Benefits Act are also of great value.

### FINANCE

The real prevention of many of the social ills, which cause so much concern today, such as the problems of the neglected, deprived or maladjusted child, or that of juvenile delinquency itself, lies in the teaching of "good parenthood" and in home-making. In this sphere the Association has the opportunity to carry out very valuable preventive work if funds and facilities for developing its work for parents, and the teachers of parents, is forthcoming.

It is much less costly to prevent than to have to cure.
