Aims and Objects of the Association

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
 - (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
 - (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
 - (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
 - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
 - (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
 - (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

FORTY - FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Forty - First Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, The Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee consists of the office-bearers and twenty (20) members of the Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, and is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting.

This Committee which co-ordinates the work has met every month.

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and a Medical Sub-Committee, deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses, and the conduct of the Hospital and its Baby Health Centre.

Finance is dealt with by a separate Sub-Committee.

HONOURS

The Council records its pleasure that Dr. Janet Cooper, Mayor of South Melbourne City Council, was awarded the O.B.E. by Her Majesty the Queen in the New Year's Honours List.

Dr. Janet Cooper has represented the South Melbourne City Council on the Association's Central Council for some years, and the Council has always appreciated her interest and help with its work.

The Council also records with pleasure that Dr. Doris Officer Honorary Secretary of the Association, was awarded the O.B.E. by Her Majesty the Queen in the Birthday Honours List in recognition of her many years of honorary service given to the community, not only through the work of this Association, but through other similar avenues of service.

OBITUARY

The Council records with very deep regret the death of Cr. Nellie Sheehan J.P. Councillor Nellie Sheehan had represented Castlemaine Council on the Association's Central Council for many years and she had for some years been a member of the Association's Executive Committee.

The Council will very much miss the keen interest that Councillor Nellie Sheehan always took in the Association's work for the mothers and babies, and the help she gave in furthering it both in Castlemaine itself, and in the community generally.

The Council also records with very deep regret the death of Mrs. W. A. Kemp—who had been a delegate to the Central Council from the Box Hill Baby Health Centre Committee for very many years. Mrs. Kemp was a very regular attendant at the Council's monthly Meetings—and she will be very greatly missed by the members of the Central Council.

GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are now 389 Centres affiliated with the Association. New Centres have been established at West Norlane, Colac West and North Balwyn (Camberwell), Shepparton.

New buildings have been officially opened at Hopetoun (Karrarooc Shire) Colac West, North Balwyn (Camberwell) and extensions to the Croydon Baby Health Centre building.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centre Committees and delegates to the Association's Central Council was held at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital on June 12th, 1959. Many country councils sent delegates.

Centres visited by the Honorary Secretary during the year for Annual Meetings, to give talks, or for the official Opening of new Centre buildings were Sandringham, Camberwell, Castlemaine, Leitchville, The Basin, Mt. Eliza, Heidelberg, Kilsyth, Croydon, Ballarat, Cohuna, Donald and Heathcote.

Mrs. Bell, Vice President, attended the Official Opening of the new North Balwyn Baby Health Centre in Trentham Avenue.

The Honorary Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, officially opened the New Colac West Baby Centre building in February 1959, and also performed the official opening of the "May Lilley Wing" of the Croydon Baby Health Centre in August 1959.

A colour film of the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital was shown at the October Meeting of the Council.

Dr. Officer attended the Pre-School Conference held in the Ferntree Gully district on 30th September 1958, and the State Conference of the Municipal Pre-School Association held at Sandringham in March, 1959.

Dr. Officer attended the Annual Conference of the Probation Officers' Association of Victoria in September, 1958 to speak on "The Importance of the Early Years in the prevention of delinquency", and was Guest Speaker at the Conference of the Housewives Association held in May 1959.

A talk to the members of the Kooroora Club was also given during the year.

In June 1959 the Honorary Secretary was invited to be one of the Speakers in the "National Forum of the Air," over 3AR, the subject being "Are Family needs being forgotten in Modern Home Planning". The affirmative side being taken.

During Child Care Week in August 1959 Dr. Officer was invited to be a Guest Speaker at the Television Session entitled "Strictly for Mothers" over Channel 7.

V.B.H.C.A. TELEVISION SESSIONS

At the request of "Women's Weekly," the Association agreed to put on a monthly television session over Channel 7 giving advice to mothers.

The first session was given in November, 1958. The session was introduced by the Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer on behalf of the Association, and the first talk on "Vitamins" was given by Matron Buxton of the Association's Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies.

The subsequent monthly talks have all been given by Sister Stott, Assistant Matron to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, who has covered a number of subjects of particular interest and value to the mothers.

Sister Stott has a decided flair for this new method of bringing the principles of good baby care before the mothers, and has often been assisted in her programmes by mothers and babies from the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

The Council has greatly appreciated all the time and work that Sister Stott has given to ensure the success of these sessions.

The Council also appreciates the help of "Women's Weekly", and the sponsors of the sessions, in making the time available for them.

WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils are also providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0-5 years of age, (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community, including the prevention of delinquency.

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists. Other country towns could well follow this lead.

Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran, and Essendon City Councils have established pre-school dental clinics in their districts in connection with their infant welfare centres, and other Councils we hope will develop similar services.

Ante-Natal Care.—Care of the Expectant Mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out of recent years by the establishment of ante-natal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the overcrowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre ante-natal clinics work in close co-operation.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre or living in their districts. Vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all their mothers to have carried out.

Councils are now including inoculation against tetanus in their routine preventive inoculations to children, and immunisation of children against polio-myelitis.

PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Municipal Home Help Schemes:—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need a **MUCH greater extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.**

Good "Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity, and many more of such personnel.

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

In 1958 the Infant Mortality rate in Victoria was 19.23 per 1000 live births. This is the second lowest figure recorded in Victoria, the lowest rate occurred in 1955, when it was 18.37 per 1000 live births.

The Infant Mortality rate for the Melbourne Metropolitan area was 19.63 per 1000 live births. This is the first time the Metropolitan area's figure has been higher than that for the State as a whole. Of the 19.63 deaths of infants under one year of age per 1000 live births 14.93 occurred in the first month of life, 4.7 occurred between 1 month and 1 year.

"BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over eleven years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. Since moving to our present building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers, and to the many delicate frail little infants, including premature ones, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State.

A total of 661 mothers and babies admitted during the year.

Nursing Mothers' Wing.—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers that have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution.

Infants' Hospital Section.—In this section skilled attention is being given to premature, frail and delicate babies—little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life.

Training Functions.—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

Infant Welfare Trainees. — Thirty seven (37) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 1032 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of the Movement in Victoria.

Nine (9) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year—

The **"Margaret White" Prize** awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded to Sister M. E. McLean.

The Council is grateful to the donors of these prizes and congratulates the winners on their success.

Thirty nine (39) Medical Students attended during the year for special lectures and demonstrations in Infant Feeding and Management.

Eight (8) Mothercraft trainees are in residence for the fifteen months' course in Mothercraft.

Six (6) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the year.

Dr. Kate Campbell continues her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

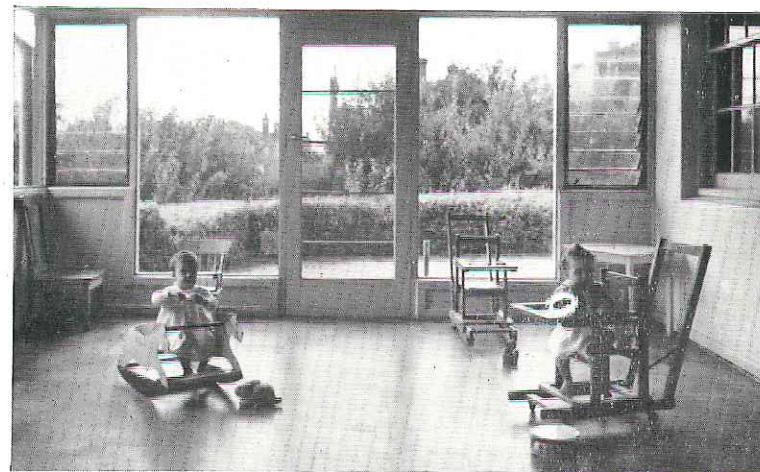
Dr. Elizabeth Turner continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare and Mothercraft trainees.

Dr. Ruth Walker looks after the mothers and babies in the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and Dr. Margery Wadds conducts a weekly clinic to trainees in the Baby Health Centre, and is also Assistant Paediatrician to the Hospital.

Dr. Marcia Robinson continued her lectures on "Ante-Natal Care" to Infant Welfare trainees during the year.

Dr. T. Seward continues his monthly lectures on "Preventive Dentistry" to the trainees, and to the Mothers in residence or attending the Baby Health Centre.

Special lectures on the Pre-School Child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Public Health Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by the trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by the Matron and her Nursing Staff.

Dr. Doris Officer continues to give the lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the Medical Officers and Lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

The Council very much values the excellent manner in which the Matron, Miss E. M. Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Miss G. Stott, and the Nursing Staff carry out the work of the hospital, and all that they do to ensure its smooth running. Letters from the mothers constantly express their appreciation of all that is done for them and their babies.

The Council expresses its appreciation to all members of the domestic staff for their loyal and efficient work during the year. The smooth running of this side of the institution is so important for the successful work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.

The Annual Reunion of Sisters in Charge of Centres and past trainees of the Association was held in December, 1958, at the "Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies."

The Council records its appreciation of the work during the year of its Honorary Medical Officers to the Staff of the Hospital,

Dr. Claire Crittle, whose services the Council has very greatly appreciated, resigned as Hon. Medical Officer to the staff of the hospital during the year owing to moving her practice to another district, and Dr. Helen Byrne has kindly consented to act in her place. The Council deeply appreciates the time that these doctors give to this work.

The Council deeply regretted the sudden death of Mr. Hurlbut during the year. Mr. Hurlbut had been on the staff of the hospital since 1949, first as caretaker when re-building was in progress, and later as general handyman. His death was keenly felt by all members of the Committee and Staff of the hospital.

Mr. J. Stenning has been appointed to the position and the Committee greatly values the work he carries out for the hospital in many capacities.

Miss Newton continues her improvements to the garden and grounds at the hospital and her services are much appreciated by the Council.

Dr. Clements from Canberra stayed at the hospital in January for a week to study its work.

Special improvements carried out at the hospital during the year include:

1. Conversion of the hot water units in the laundry from kerosene to electricity.
2. Cyclone fence erected between the isolation block and the lecture room to ensure greater privacy in this area.
3. Re-covering of the cushions in the sunroom in the Mothers' Wing.
4. Extensive improvements to the gardens and grounds carried out by Miss Newton and Mr. Stenning.
5. Various minor repairs to the building generally.
6. New electrical steam sterilizers installed in the Babies' Food Room and Utility Room on the advice of the Hospitals & Charities Commission, and repainting of these rooms and the treatment room in the Nursery Wing.
7. Enclosing of pram shelter at the centre entrance.
8. Lounge chair purchased for the Baby Health Centre for the Test-feeding room.
9. Pedal taps were installed in the hand basins in the "Nurseries" and isolation wing.

QUEEN ELIZABETH BABY HEALTH CENTRE

Sister Crick resigned her position as Sister in charge of the Centre during the year in order to take up work at the Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Centre in Camberwell, and Sister Love was appointed as Sister in charge of this Centre. The Council is grateful to Sister Love for her excellent work in this connection during the year.

During the year this Auxiliary forwarded cheques to the amount of £73/10/0 for this purpose.

The Council expresses its warm thanks to the members of this Auxiliary for their valuable help to the Hospital.

THE ISABELLA YOUNGER ROSS MEMORIAL APPEAL

Funds to assist this Appeal have continued to be received during the year.

During the year the Committee has been consulting with Mr Armstrong, Chief Architect of the Hospitals and Charities Commission, plans for the building have been proposed, and the Committee expects to be able to call for tenders very shortly for the actual building of the Hall — which it is estimated will take about ten months to build. It is anticipated that building will begin before the end of this year. The seating capacity of the Hall will be 400.

TRAVELLING BABY HEALTH CENTRE (WALPEUP SHIRE)

This service has been on the road 23 years and was the pioneer Travelling Baby Health Service in Australia. A successful year's work is reported.

The Council regretted the resignation of Sister Nixon in February, 1959 after several years of magnificent work for the Mothers and Babies in the districts served by the Association's Travelling Centre. Sister Nixon however left to be married, and the Association wishes her every happiness in her new life.

Sister Reynolds was appointed to take Sister Nixon's place and has been very capably carrying on the work for the Mothers and babies.



LECTURING SISTER

The past year for Mothercraft Lecturing has proved most successful. The interest and enthusiasm in all schools continues, and many schools have expressed the desire to add Mothercraft Lecturing to their curriculum and where possible this has been attended to.

The standard of the Project Books has been very high — the Annual Award for the outstanding book of the year was made to Margaret McGrath, of Coburg High School — a very excellent project book interestingly set out.

The keen interest taken in the Course of Mothercraft lectures not only by the pupils, but also by the Staffs of the Schools is very pleasing, and many expressions of appreciation are received each term by the Heads of the Schools and by the Girls.

Another rewarding feature is the number of pupils manifesting an interest in taking up nursing, either General, or Mothercraft

work. It is felt that, if interest is aroused, information can be given, and this leads very often to a girl's decision as to the career she is going to follow. An increase of interest in applying for Nursing Bursaries by the Heads of the Schools has been reported as a result.

Films from the State Film Centre, excursions to Health Centres and to Mothercraft Training Hospitals have added to the enjoyment of the course.

A word of thanks to the Matrons, and to the Health Centre Sisters, for their co-operation and help in this respect.

During the past year 43 schools were visited.

A total of 2,537 girls received tuition in Mothercraft.

It is regretted that Brighton Girls' Technical School could not fit in classes this year, they hope to resume next year.

Classes for girls at St. Catherine's School were commenced this year, and great enthusiasm for them was displayed by the girls.

The classes were given to the senior girls, and it is hoped that a course will be given annually.

The Council very much valued Sister Fryer's work as Lecturing Sister and regrets that for health reasons she was unable to continue the lectures for the third term. Sister Burgess was appointed to carry out this work, and her work as lecturer in Mothercraft has been greatly appreciated by the Council.

The Council of the Association pioneered the giving of Mothercraft Lectures to Schools in 1920, and has carried on this work ever since with a full-time Sister. The Service is financed from the Voluntary Funds of the Association.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT — COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters in Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

Country areas where such lectures have been given are Beaufort, Moe, Branxholme, Warracknabeal, Casterton, Colac, Drouin, Daylesford, Echuca, Redcliffs, Manangatang, Wonthaggi, Geelong, Cororooke, Coleraine, Dartmoor, Heywood, Berwick, Euroa, Timboon, Maryborough and Portland.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy now paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £600 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £3,000.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned

by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have not been increased since 1946.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for full-time Sisters appointed to this work. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose, and the Association's Central Council has assisted many Committees with grants towards the equipment of new centres, or for extending the work in existing ones.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £600 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £17/3/0, with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificate or certificates other than a General Nursing Certificate.

A uniform allowance of 4/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres, or give a "car allowance" if a Sister uses her own car for her work.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies with regular donations each year.

WASTE PAPER
