# Aims and Objects of the Association

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall-
  - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
  - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

## FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Forty-Second Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, The Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

#### ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee consists of the office-bearers and twenty (20) members of the Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, and is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting.

This Committee which co-ordinates the work has met every month.

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and a Medical Sub. Committee, deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses, and the conduct of the Hospital and its Baby Health Centre.

Finance is dealt with by a separate Sub-Committee.

## **HONOURS**

The Council records its pleasure that Councillor M. E. Hedditch, Mayor of Portland, was awarded the O.B.E. by Her Majesty the Queen in the New Year Honours List. Cr. Hedditch has represented Portland on the Association's Council for many years, and the Council has always appreciated her interest in, and support for this work.

The Council also congratulates Dr. Barbara Meredith, Director of Maternal, Infant and Pre-School Welfare on being awarded the O.B.E. in the Birthday Honours List.

#### **OBITUARY**

The Council records its deep regret at the death during the year of Miss Grace M. Turner, after a long illness. Miss Turner was a Council member of the Association for many years, and was Convenor of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee up to the time of her illness.

Miss Turner was keenly interested in all the Association's work for the Mothers and Babies, and left a legacy of £4,000 to be known as the "Grace Turner Fund" to further this work.

The Council also records with great regret the death of Mrs. C. O. White, which occurred in June, 1960, in England.

Mrs. White was Hon, Secretary of the Association for the first fifteen years of the Association's work in pioneering and establishing the Baby Health Centre Movement in Victoria. She was Hon. Secretary from 1918-1933; during these years Mrs. White was untiring in her efforts to enlarge the scope of Baby Welfare work, and was instrumental in the organisation of a network of Baby Health Centres throughout the State.

Mrs. White went to live in England in 1933, but always maintained her keen interest in the Association's work. She was a Life Member of the Association, and annually contributed funds for the "Margaret White" prize given annually to the Infant Welfare trainee at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital who is considered the best all-round Infant Welfare trainee during the year.

The Council also records with very deep regret the death in August of Mrs. W. A. Rogers, who had been a Council member, and member of the Association's Executive, Finance and Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committees for many years. Mrs. Rogers gave generously of her time and interest in furthering all the activities of the Association, and will be deeply missed—whenever there was work to be done, Mrs. Rogers was a prominent volunteer for helping.

Mrs. Rogers left her estate as a legacy to the Association for use in helping to build the "Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall," and to further the work for the Mothers and Babies in Victoria in which she had shown so keen an interest in helping during her life-time.

### **GENERAL PROGRESS**

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

## THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are now 401 Centres affiliated with the Association.

New Centres have been established at—North Balwyn, East Oakleigh, Hamlyn Heights (Corio), Mooroolbark (Lilydale Shire), Ringwood East.

New buildings have been officially opened at Wodonga, Lockington, Macarthur, Willaura, Diamond Creek, East Oakleigh, Portarlington, Mt. Evelyn, Chelsea, Hamlyn Heights (Corio), North Balwyn.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centre Committees and delegates to the Association's Central Council, was held at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital on June 9th, 1960. Many Country Centres were represented.

Centres visited by the Honorary Secretary during the year to give talks, attend Annual Meetings, or for official openings of new Centre buildings were Wodonga, Willaura, Diamond Creek, East Oakleigh, Portarlington, Mt. Evelyn, Chelsea, Castlemaine, Donald, Heathcote, Elmore, Emerald, Flinders, Sandringham, Camberwell, Healesville, Richmond, Leongatha, Lang Lang, Bayswater, and North Balwyn.

Mr. M. V. Anderson, President, attended the Malvern Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Rivers Dickinson represented the Association at Heidelberg, Croydon and Kilsyth.

The Honorary Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, officially opened the new Centre buildings at Wodonga, East Oakleigh, and Mt. Evelyn.

Dr. Officer attended the Seminar held in May, by the Victorian Family Council at which all aspects of family life were discussed.

Dr. Officer also took part in the Child Care Week Conference held in August, 1960, arranged by the Children's Welfare Association, speaking on "The Importance of the first 21 months" in the session entitled "The Making of an Adult."

Dr. W. A. Kemp, a member of the Association's Council and Executive Committee, was given leave of absence during the year, as he was going overseas.

Miss Rhoda Strachan, who had been a member of the Council for very many years, resigned on account of ill-health, and was elected a Life Member of the Association.

## WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils are also providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0.5 years of age, (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community, including the prevention of delinquency.

**Dental Examinations.**—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists. Other country towns could well follow this lead.

Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran, and Essendon City Councils have established pre-school dental clinics in their districts in connection with their infant welfare centres, and other Councils we hope will develop similar services.

Ante-Natal Care.—Care of the Expectant Mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out of recent years by the establishment of antenatal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the over-crowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre ante-natal clinics work in close co-operation.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre or living in their districts. Vaccination against smallpox and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sisters in Charge of Centres should encourage all their mothers to have carried out.

Councils are now including inoculation against tetanus in their routine preventive inoculations to children, and immunisation of children against polio-myelitis.

## PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Municipal Home Help Schemes:—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need a MUCH greater extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.

Good "Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity, and many more of such personnel.

#### INFANT MORTALITY RATE

In 1959 the Infant mortality rate in Victoria was 21 per 1,000 live births, a rise in the infant mortality rate since last year when it was 19.23 per 1,000. A disturbing fact of this rise is that, as Dr. Meredith, Director of Maternal and Child Welfare, pointed out in August, for the first time for many years there has been a rise in the death rate of infants aged one month to twelve months, and the cause of deaths in these infants were from gastro-enteritis and respiratory diseases. The great preventative of these two infections in babyhood is breast-feeding. There is every indication for an intensive campaign to promote the natural feeding of infants, and for better help to be given mothers in carrying out this natural function.

# "BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over twelve years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

#### **VOLUNTARY HELPERS**

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

# THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. At our present building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers, and to the many delicate frail little infants, including premature ones, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State.

A total of 690 mothers and babies admitted during the year.

Nursing Mothers' Wing.—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals, All mothers that have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution.

Infants' Hospital Section.—In this section skilled attention is being given to premature, frail and delicate babies—little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life.

Training Functions.—Training of Eaby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

Infant Welfare Trainees. Thirty-six (36) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 1068 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of this Movement in Victoria.

Ten (10) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year—
"The Sir Herbert & Lady Olney" prizes given to the trainees in each term considered most suitable for Baby Health Centre work:—

First Term—Sister A. M. Westbrook. Second Term—Sister Z. J. Wykes. Third Term—Sister T. J. Webb.

"The Margaret White Prize," awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded to Sister A. M. Westbrook.

The Council congratulates the winners of these prizes on their success.

Twenty-two (22) Medical Students attended during the year for special lectures and demonstrations in Infant Feeding and Management.

Eight (8) Mothercraft Students are in residence for the fifteen months Course in Mothercraft.

Seven (7) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the year.

Dr. Kate Campbell continues her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Hospital.


Dr. Elizabeth Turner continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare trainees, and Mothercraft students.

Special Lectures on the pre-school child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Maternal and Child Hygiene Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by trainees.

Nursing Lectures and demonstrations are carried out by Matron and her Nursing Staff.

Dr. Doris Officer continues to give lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the Medical Officers and Lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

The Council very much values the excellent manner in which the Matron, Miss E. M. Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister G. Stott, and the Nursing Staff carry out the work of the Hospital, and to ensure its smooth running. Mothers constantly express their warm gratitude for all the help and care they receive at the Hospital.

The Council deeply regretted the absence for three months during the year of Matron Buxton owing to sickness—and is glad that she made such a good recovery.

The Council appreciated very much the loyal and capable manner in which the Assistant Matron, Sister Stott, carried on the work during Matron's absence, and the Council also appreciated

the co-operation and help received from members of the Nursing Staff.

The Council appreciates too the loyal and efficient work carried out during the year by all members of the domestic staff. The smooth running of the domestic side of the Hospital contributes so much to the successful running of the Hospital.

The Annual Reunion of Sisters in Charge of Centres, and past trainees of the Association was held in December, 1959, at the Hospital.

The Council records its appreciation of the work during the year of its Honorary Medical Officer to the Staff of the Hospital. The Council values the time that Dr. Helen Byrne gives so generously to this work.

Sister Stephens was appointed to take Sister Reynold's place.



## LECTURING SISTER

The past year for Mothercraft Lecturing has proved most successful. The interest and enthusiasm in all schools continues, and many schools have expressed the desire to add Mothercraft Lecturing to their curriculum and where possible this has been attended to.

The standard of the Project Books has been very high—and the keen interest taken in the Course of Mothercraft lectures not only by the pupils, but also by the Staffs of the Schools is very pleasing, and many expressions of appreciation are received each term by the Heads of the Schools and by the Girls.

More than 100 students in Mothercraft from the Emily Mc-Pherson College of Domestic Economy visited the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and the students were appreciative of Matron Buxton's help and co-operation in arranging this—Students from this College included ones from East Africa, as well as many Chinese, Malayan and Dutch girls.

During the past year 39 schools were visited. At many Schools two, three, four and five classes were given at each School.

A total of 2,252 girls received tuition in Mothercraft.

The Council has very much valued Sister Burgess's work as Lecturing Sister, and the interest she takes in it.

The Council of the Association pioneered the giving of Mothercraft Lectures in 1920, forty years ago, and has carried on this work ever since with a full time Sister.

The Service is financed from the Voluntary Funds of the Association.

# LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT — COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters in Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

#### STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy now paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £600 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £3,000.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have not been increased since 1946.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for full-time Sisters appointed to this work. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose, and the Association's Central Council has assisted many Committees with grants towards the equipment of new centres, or for extending the work in existing ones.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £600 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £19/1/6, with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificate or certificates other than a General Nursing Certificate.

A uniform allowance of 4/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres, or give a "car allowance" if a Sister uses her own car for her work.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies with regular donations each year.

## WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to collect paper and make it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal," in which the Association shares.

During the year the Hon. Secretary of the Association, Dr. Doris Officer, has continued as Chairman of the Hospital and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

#### FINANCE

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work.
