Aims and Objects of the Association

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
 - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Forty-Fourth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, The Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee consists of the office-bearers and twenty (20) members of the Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, and is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting.

This Committee which co-ordinates the work has met every month.

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and a Medical Sub-Committee, deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses, and the conduct of the Hospital and its Baby Health Centre.

Finance is dealt with by a separate Sub-Committee.

OBITUARY

The Council records with deep regret the loss of two of its members during the year—

Mrs. D. Gunson, who represented Lang Lang on the Central Council, passed away very suddenly in May. She had represented Lang Lang on the Central Council for very many years, and had always been extremely active in furthering the Baby Health Centre work in that district, and will be greatly missed. She was also a member of the Association's Executive, Finance and Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committees.

Mrs. R. H. Lightfoot, who also passed away very suddenly in July, had represented Richmond on the Council for very many years. She had been a member of the Richmond Baby Health Centre Committee almost since its beginning. She was three times Mayoress of Richmond, and twice President of the Baby Health Centre Committee in Richmond, and was holding that office at the time of her death. She will be greatly missed both for her very active work in Richmond, and for the Association.

GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are now 455 Centres affiliated with the Association. New Centres have been established at Bendigo North, Whitburn (Oakleigh) and Yaapeet (Karkaroc).

New Centre buildings have been officially opened during the year at Hawthorn (Glenferrie Rd.), Montrose, South West Ballarat, Norlane (Geelong), Anglesea, Carisbrook, Donald and Silvan.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centre Committees and delegates to the Association's Central Council was deferred this year — the official opening of the new Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall taking its place instead, in May.

Centres visited by the Hon. Secretary during the year to give talks, attend Annual Meetings, or for the official opening of new Centre buildings, were Emerald, Malvern, Mt. Evelyn, Richmond, Caulfield, Heidelberg, Lang Lang, Anglesea, Silvan, Donald and Carisbrook.

Dr. Officer also visited Colac to judge the local Committee's Babies' Photograph Competition in aid of the Centre funds. She also visited Warrandyte Baby Health Centre for the unveiling of a Plaque to commemorate the work of Mrs. Betton, who had been President of that Committee for 25 years.

The Council records its gratitude to the Emerald Baby Health Centre Committee for a donation of £50 to provide equipment in the new Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall, and to Miss Leach, Hon. Secretary of the Heidelberg Baby Health Centre Committee for the beautiful tablecloth she made, and raffled, to also provide needed equipment for the Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall. Her effort resulted in £51 being received for this purpose.

Mr. M. V. Anderson, President, attended the Caulfield Baby Health Centres' Annual Meeting during the year.

Mrs. Rivers Dickinson represented the Association at the Croydon "Get-together" Club Meeting, and Annual Meetings at Kilsyth and Mooroolbark.

Mrs. W. Kernot represented the Association at the official opening of the new Norlane Baby Health Centre building, and was also present at the official opening of the Anglesea Baby Health Centre building.

Mrs. E. S. A. Bell represented the Association at the Sandringham Baby Health Centre's Annual Meeting.

Dr. Doris Officer appeared on a television session arranged by Channel 9, the subject being discussed being "A Flat is Not a Home".

In February the Association moved its Headquarter Office from the National Bank Building at 71 Collins Street, Melbourne, to special offices built at the new Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall — a move that has many advantages for our work, particularly that of closer contact with the major activity of the Association, the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, which is now alongside our offices.

Life Members. Mr. and Mrs. W. Howard were elected Life Members of the Association during the year in recognition of the extremely valuable help they have given in raising funds, over so many years, to maintain the Association's Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, and particularly for all the time and organising they have given to ensure the success of the "Doll Pageant" held at the Myer Emporium each year in aid of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. The Council cannot express its appreciation of all they have done for the Association warmly enough.

WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils are also providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at a very reasonable cost to the community.

Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0-5 years of age (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community, including the prevention of delinquency.

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists. Other country towns could well follow this lead.

Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran, and Essendon City Councils have established pre-school dental clinics in their districts in connection with their infant welfare centres, and other Councils we hope will develop similar services.

Ante-Natal Care.—Care of the expectant mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out for some years now by the establishment of ante-natal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the over-crowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre ante-natal clinics work in close co-operation.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

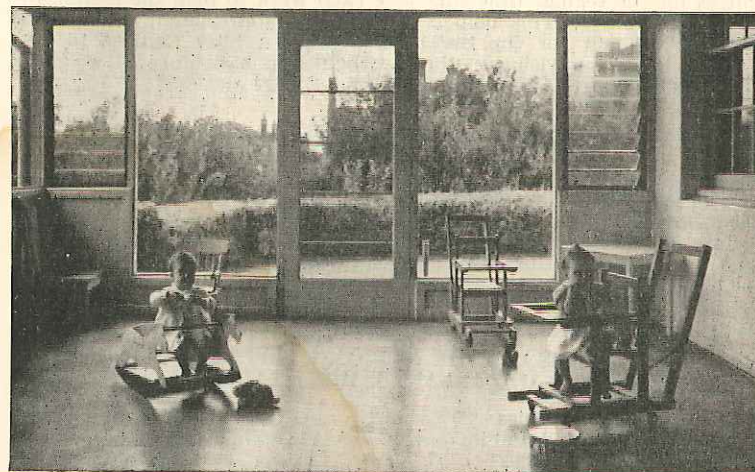
Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, and immunising against poliomyelitis, for children attending the Centre, or living in their districts. Such immunisation programmes, together with vaccination against smallpox, are safeguards to the children's health, which Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all mothers to take advantage of.

PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Municipal Home Help Scheme.—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need a **MUCH greater extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.**

Good "Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity, and many more of such personnel are required for this service.

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

In 1961 the Infant Mortality rate in Victoria was 17.8 per 1,000 live births, an encouragingly low figure — and the lowest on record for Victoria.

"BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over fourteen years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. At our present building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers, and to the many delicate frail little infants, including premature ones, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State.

A total of 575 mothers and babies admitted during the year.

Nursing Mothers' Wing.—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers who have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution.

Infants' Hospital Section.—In this section skilled attention is being given to premature, frail and delicate babies—little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life.

Training Functions.—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

Infant Welfare Trainees.—Thirty-nine (39) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 1,143 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of this Movement in Victoria.

Twelve (12) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year—

"The Margaret White Prize", awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded to Sister M. C. Brown.

The Council congratulates the winners of these prizes on their success.

Eight (8) Mothercraft Students are in residence for the fifteen months Course in Mothercraft.

Six (6) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the year.

Dr. Kate Campbell continues her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Hospital.

Dr. Elizabeth Turner continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare trainees, and Mothercraft students.

Dr. Ruth Walker looks after the Mothers and Babies in the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and Dr. Margery Wadds conducts a weekly clinic to trainees in the Baby Health Centre, and is also Assistant Paediatrician to the Hospital.

Dr. Marcia Robinson continued her lectures on "Pre-natal Care" to Infant Welfare trainees during the year.

Dr. T. Seward has continued his lectures on "Preventive Dentistry" to trainees and to Mothers in residence, or attending the Baby Health Centre.

Special Lectures on the pre-school child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by Matron and her Nursing Staff.

Dr. Doris Officer continues to give lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the Medical Officers and Lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

The Council very much values the excellent manner in which the Matron, Miss E. M. Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister G. Stott, and the Nursing Staff carry out the work of the Hospital, and to ensure its smooth running. Mothers constantly express their warm gratitude for all the help and care they receive at the Hospital.

During the year Matron Buxton had six weeks' sick leave, and the Council deeply appreciates the excellent way in which Sister Stott, the Assistant Matron, and the other members of the Nursing Staff, carried on the work of the Hospital during Matron's absence.

The Council records its appreciation of the work during the year of its Honorary Medical Officer to the Staff of the Hospital. The Council values the time that Dr. Helen Byrne gives so generously to this work.

The Council appreciates too the loyal and efficient work carried out during the year by all members of the domestic staff. The smooth running of the domestic side of the Hospital contributes so much to the successful running of the Hospital.

The Council values Mr. J. Stenning's work as general handyman—and the many services he carries out for the Hospital and the "Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall".

The Annual Reunion of Sisters in Charge of Centres, and past trainees of the Association was held in December, 1961, at the Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall.

Improvements effected by the Committee at the Hospital during the year include re-painting of the Staff Nurses' Sitting Room, renovations to the Food Room in the Nursery Wing, and the Food Room in the Mothers' Wing. Complete re-painting of the rooms in the Mothers' Wing is at present being carried out.

QUEEN ELIZABETH BABY HEALTH CENTRE

This Centre gives daily advice to many mothers living in the vicinity, and visits are also paid to the homes of the mothers.

The Sister-in-Charge is not only responsible for the routine running of the Centre itself, but also for the practical training of the Infant Welfare Trainees in Centre work.

The Council is grateful to Sister Love, the Sister-in-Charge, for her excellent work during the year.

ISABEL YOUNGER ROSS MEMORIAL HALL

The erection of the Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall was completed in December, 1961. The car park and laying out of the grounds were completed in time for the official opening of the Hall by Lady Brooks, which took place on May 3rd, 1962.

The Hall represents the State's tribute to the late Dr. Isabel Younger Ross, O.B.E., as founder of the Baby Health Centre Movement in Victoria 45 years ago.

The cost of the Hall, parking area, lay-out of the grounds and furnishings was approximately £45,000. A grant of £15,000 was received from the Government, and the remaining £30,000 was provided by the Association from a Public Appeal, and from funds received from the Estate of the late Mrs. W. A. Rogers, a former Committee member, who left the whole of her Estate to assist this project.

During the year the Hall has been in demand for various functions and conferences.

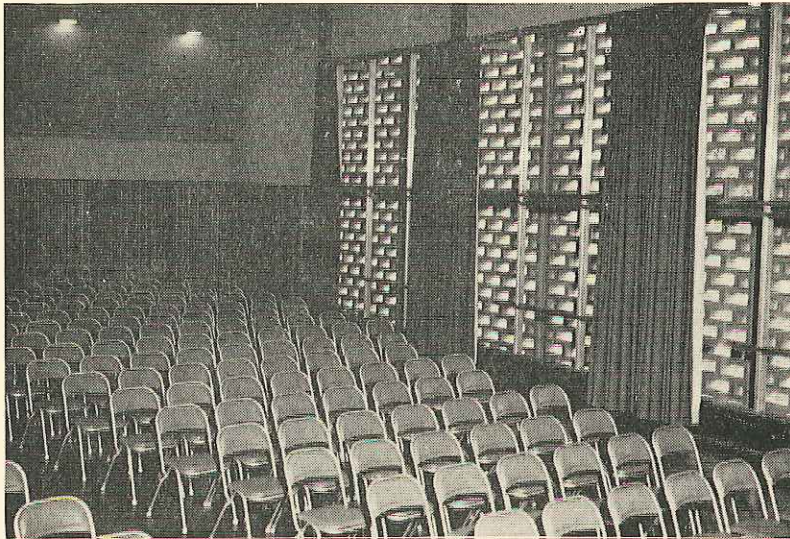
The monthly lectures for Infant Welfare Sisters from all over the State, which are arranged by the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, are held in the Hall, and the monthly lectures arranged by the Association and given by Dr. Kate Campbell, are also held at the Hall.

The attractiveness and excellent facilities at the Hall have been appreciated by all who have used it, and special delight and comment have been expressed on its excellent acoustics.

The Council has deeply valued the time, work and care given by Mr. Armstrong, Chief Architect, and his Assistant, Mr. Thornton, of the Architect's Department of the Hospitals and Charities Commission in designing and supervising the building of this attractive and excellent functioning Hall.

TRAVELLING BABY HEALTH CENTRE (WALPEUP SHIRE)

After having conducted this Service in the district for over 25 years, the Association during the year handed over the running of this service to the Walpeup Shire Council in order that the work for the Mothers and Babies in this district could be further improved and developed by the provision of a Baby Health Centre building in Ouyen, with residential headquarters for the Sister-in-Charge. The Council would be the only body who could receive a Government subsidy for this purpose.

The Association donated to the Council its own Volkswagen Kombi-bus, which was specially equipped as a Travelling Baby Health Centre, and valued at £1500, so that the service for the Mothers could continue smoothly without any interruption. It also donated to the Council all the other scales and equipment which had been in use in that district — and the Association looks forward to seeing further developments in this district in the near future — and has promised the Council further help if required.

LECTURING SISTER

The past year for Mothercraft Lecturing has proved most successful.

The examination results were of a very high standard and the project book work was also extremely good. Two prizes were awarded by the Association this year for the project books — one being allotted to a student at "Stratherne", and one to a student at Methodist Ladies' College, Hawthorn.

New schools receiving Mothercraft Lectures for the first time were Croydon, Lilydale, Nunawading and McKinnon High Schools, Malvern Central and Preston East, and lectures at Brighton Technical School, Vauluse and Toorak College were re-commenced.

Many expressions of appreciation have been received from Head-masters and Headmistresses and Mother Rectresses for the unfailing work and service rendered by the Victorian Baby Health Centres Association over a great number of years in connection with the Mothercraft Lecturing in schools.

Technical Schools at Swinburne, Box Hill, Brighton, Preston and East Preston.

Grammar Schools: "Firbank", "Shelford", Ivanhoe and Camberwell.

A total of 2,473 girls received mothercraft lectures during the year.

Certificates issued: 2,301; passed: 74; failed: 73.

Films from the State Film Centre were shown at the Emily McPherson College, "Fintona" and Middle Park.

It is gratifying to know from Form Mistresses, Art Teachers and other members of Staff, of the co-operation given in Mothercraft work; many headteachers are aware of the requests from girls for the Course of Lectures.

The Council has very much valued Sister Burgess's work as Lecturing Sister, and the interest she takes in it.

The Council very much appreciated the assistance given by Sister B. Stephens with Lecturing to Schools during the second term — as this enabled more schools to be given Lectures during that term, and new schools at Croydon and Lilydale to be included in our schedule.

At many of the schools more than one class is given, some schools being given up to five classes.

There is no doubt that Mothercraft Lectures are becoming increasingly popular with the girls, and their value and importance increasingly recognised.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters-in-Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy now paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £750 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £3,000.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have not been increased since 1946.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose, and the Association's Central Council has assisted many Committees with grants towards the equipment of new centres, or for extending the work in existing ones.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £750 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £19/10/6, with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificates or certificates other than (a) a General Nursing Certificate, (b) an infant welfare certificate.

A uniform allowance of 4/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres, or give a "car allowance" if a Sister uses her own car for her work.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies with regular donations each year.

WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to collect paper and make it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal" in which the Association shares.

During the year the Hon. Secretary of the Association, Dr. Doris Officer, O.B.E., has continued as Chairman of the Hospital and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

FINANCE

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work, and without this support the Association could not continue its work.
