AIMS AND OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION



1. To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
2. To encourage the breast feeding of infants.
3. To equip and maintain a Hospital and Babies Home, and Infant Welfare and Mothercraft Training School, with Model Baby Health Centre for:
 - (a) The special training of Infant Welfare Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses.
 - (b) The provision of education for mothers with a view to enabling them to bring up their children in accordance with modern health principles.
 - (c) The provision of accommodation for the education and care of mothers and babies, especially nursing mothers, and for difficult, delicate or premature babies who may require special investigation and expert care in regard to their rearing, and so that where mothers in poor, necessitous or destitute circumstances are so accommodated and maintained, the Association shall contribute towards their upkeep from its funds received voluntarily for the purpose.
4. To co-operate with School and other authorities in giving teaching to classes of school girls and young women with the view of gaining their sympathy and interest in the proper care and nurture of babies and young children.
5. To arrange for organised teaching to women on the care of the—
 - (a) expectant mother,
 - (b) the mother, and
 - (c) children,and to disseminate such knowledge by every available means.
6. To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Forty-seventh Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the works in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this report relates only to the activities of the Central Council of the Association and its Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies and Infant Welfare Training School.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee consists of the office-bearers and twenty (20) members of the Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country centres, and one a member of the Australian Medical Association, and is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting.

This Committee which co-ordinates the work has met every month.

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and a Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses and the conduct of the Hospital and its Baby Health Centre, and in the recommendations for development of the work of the Hospital.

Finance is dealt with by a separate Sub-Committee.

LADY DELACOMBE

Lady Delacombe, the Association's Patroness, very graciously consented to officially open the "1965 Doll Pageant" held at the Myer Emporium in May in aid of the Association's "Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies and Infant Welfare Training School".

OBITUARIES

The Council records, with deep regret, the loss during the year of Miss Edith Allen, formerly "Sarah Dunne" of "The Herald". Miss Allen had been a member of the Association's Central Council for many years, and a very active member of the Committee of Management of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies, in whose work she was most deeply interested. Her help in all the domestic problems of the Hospital was always invaluable, and the Committee continues to miss her wise counsel in the domestic running of the Hospital.

The Council also records, with deep regret, the loss of Mrs. T. J. McClelland who was on the Central Council for many years, and has also been a very active member of the Sandringham Baby Health Centre Committee for many years and, at one time, was its Hon. Secretary. Mrs. McClelland was one who devoted the major part of her life to the assistance and welfare of others. Her sudden death in January came as a shock to the Council of the Association, and she has been greatly missed.

The Council also records with regret the deaths, during the year, of Mr. Anderson, former Town Clerk of South Melbourne City Council, and Mr. F. L. Hallett, former Town Clerk of the Richmond City Council. Both Mr. Anderson and Mr. Hallett contributed much help in the furtherance of the Baby Health Centre work in their municipalities, and were also both most helpful to the work of the Association itself.

HONOURS

The Council extends its congratulations to Mr. E. A. Le Page, who was honoured by the Queen during the year, and received the M.B.E. for his work for the Community. Mr. Le Page represented the Moorabbin City Council for many years on the Central Council of the Association, and was a very regular attendant at Council meetings till his retirement from the Moorabbin City Council.

GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the

work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are now 478 Centres affiliated with the Association.

New centres have been established at Nangiloc (Mildura Shire), Wemen (Swan Hill Shire), Kensington South (Melbourne City Council), Croydon North, Croydon South, Breakwater (Geelong City Council), Fyan's Park (Newtown and Chilwell City Council) and Hall's Gap (Stawell Shire).

New Centre buildings have been officially opened during the year at Auburn (Hawthorn City Council), Prahran-Windsor (Prahran City Council), Chiltern, South Kensington (Melbourne City Council), Cockatoo (Berwick Shire), Croydon (Eastfield Road), Kinglake (Eltham Shire), Maldon, Fyans Park (Newtown and Chilwell), Shepparton (Welsford Street), Violet Town, and Warracknabeal. Cobden has built a new centre, which has not yet been officially opened.

Centres visited by the Hon. Secretary, Dr. Doris Officer, during the year, to give talks, attend Annual Meetings, or for the opening of new centre buildings, were: Emerald, Shepparton, Sandringham, Malvern, Camberwell, Lancefield, Castlemaine and Croydon.

Mr. M. V. Anderson (President) attended the Caulfield Annual Meeting.

Mrs. W. Stephens attended Annual Meetings at Pakenham East and Oakleigh.

Mrs. Rivers Dickenson, who resigned for health reasons from the Executive Committee but is continuing as a member of the Association's Central Council, represented the Association at Annual Meetings at Montrose and various other meetings in the Croydon district.

Mrs. E. S. A. Bell, a Vice-President of the Association, resigned through ill-health during the year, but has been elected a Life-member of the Association in appreciation of her many years of service to the Association and its Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies.

The Hon. Secretary, Dr. Officer, attended a Conference at the Social Welfare Department during the year to discuss the implications of the new Adoption Act.

Dr. Officer also attended, as Guest Speaker, a meeting held by the East Kew Women's Club, and as Guest Speaker at the Annual Meeting of the three Kindergartens at Puckapunyal. A talk on "The Individual and the Community" was also given to the Victoria League.

WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils are also providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at a very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0-5 years of age (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, by teaching her the "art of motherhood".

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for many years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists. Other country towns could well follow this lead.

Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran, Brunswick and Essendon City Councils have established pre-school dental clinics in their districts in connection with their infant welfare centres, and other Councils we hope will develop similar services.

Ante-Natal Care.—Care of the expectant mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out for some years now by the establishment of ante-natal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the over-crowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre ante-natal clinics work in close co-operation.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for

toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

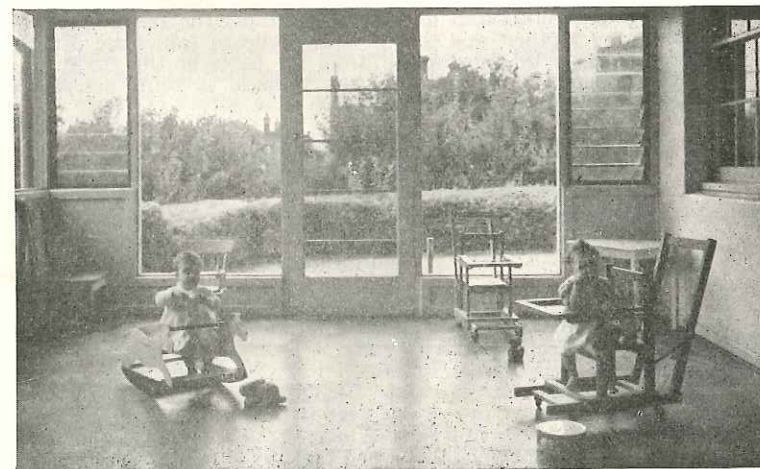
Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, and immunising against poliomyelitis, for children attending the Centre, or living in their districts. Such immunisation programmes, together with vaccination against smallpox, are safeguards to the children's health, which Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all mothers to take advantage of.

Home Safety and Accident Prevention.—This is another sphere that Sisters in charge of Centres throughout the State have special opportunities of teaching the mothers and so reducing the mortality and incidence of the crippling injuries that may result from lack of thought in promoting "Home Safety". As our Infant Welfare Sisters are given special training in this subject during their Infant Welfare course, and 90% of mothers with young babies attend Baby Health Centres, the Sisters have the best opportunity of anyone in teaching "accident prevention".

PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Municipal Home Help Scheme.—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need a **MUCH greater extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.**

Good "Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity, and many more of such personnel are required for this service.

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

In 1964, the Infant Mortality rate in Victoria was 16.89 per 1,000 live births — a record low rate in Victoria, and lower than the previous record low achieved in 1961 of 17.8 per 1,000 live births, and a great improvement on the infant mortality rate of 18.92 per 1,000 for 1963.

"BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over seventeen years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. At our present building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mother, and to the many delicate frail little infants, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State, and further developments of the work of the hospital is being considered and planned.

A total of 513 mothers and babies admitted during the year.

Nursing Mothers' Wing.—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers who have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution, but much more could be achieved if more mothers were encouraged to come into residence for the specialized help in the "Womanly Art of Breast-feeding" which is available in this section of the hospital, and much of the unnecessary weaning of babies, which too frequently occurs, could be avoided.

Infants' Hospital Section.—In this section, skilled attention is being given to ex-premature, frail and delicate babies — little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life. An increased number of babies referred from the Social Welfare Department have been taken into residence for this specialized care, and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies has been gazetted as an Approved Babies Home for this purpose.

Training Functions.—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly-trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

Infant Welfare Trainees.—Thirty-nine (39) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 1,258 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of this Movement in Victoria.

Eight (8) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year—

The Council congratulates the winners of these prizes on their success.

Eight (8) Mothercraft Students are in residence for the fifteen months Course in Mothercraft.

Seven (7) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the year.

During the year Tongala Milk Products Pty. Ltd. have very generously made a sum of money available to the Association to provide a "scholarship" each term to assist an infant welfare trainee with her course. This has been greatly valued by those selected for this scholarship each term. Holders this year have been:—

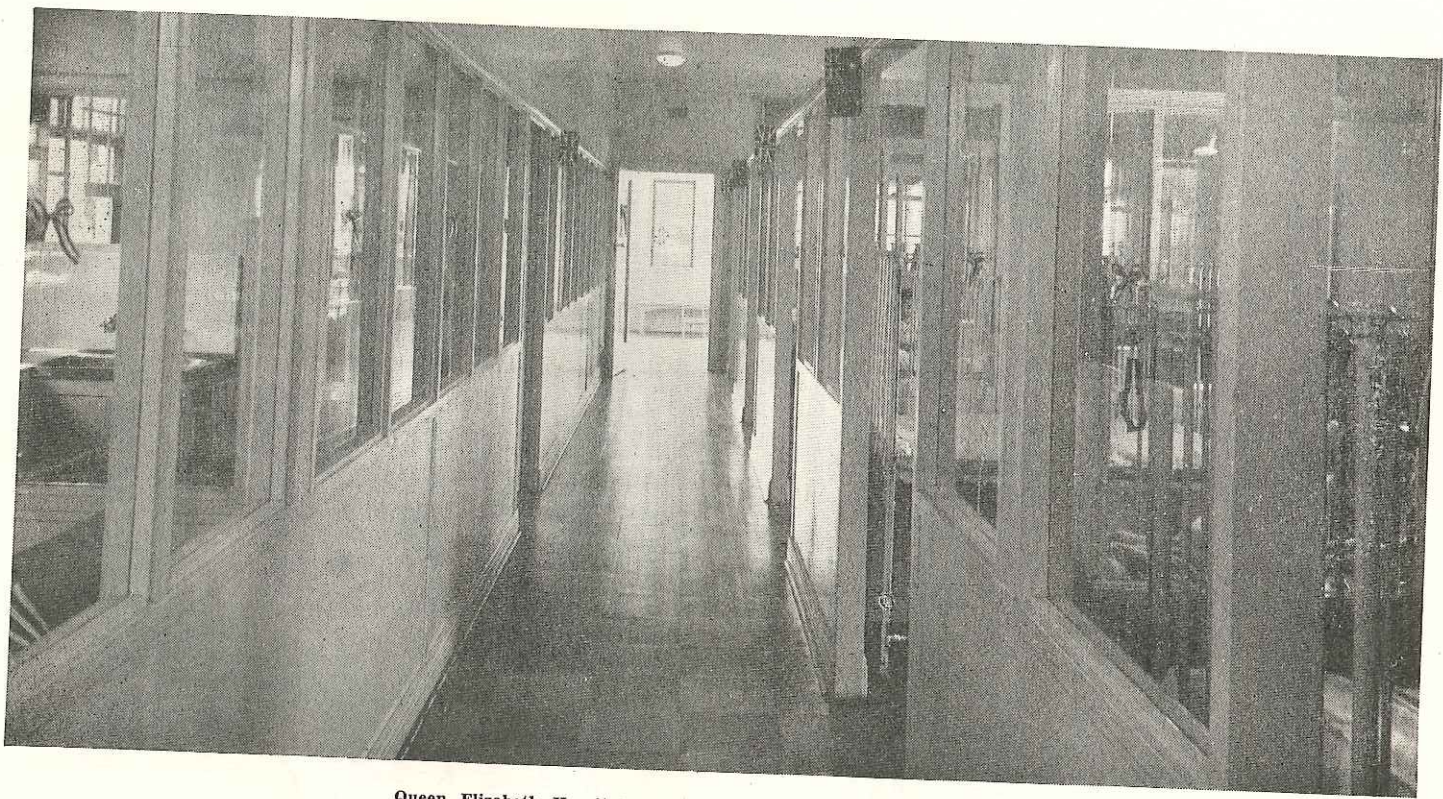

Dr. Elizabeth Turner also continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare trainees.

Dr. Clare Mackinnon resigned as Lecturer during the year, her lectures being given by Dr. Kate Campbell in addition to her usual ones.

The Committee is grateful to Miss W. Ride, S.Tut.Dip., from the Maternal and Child Welfare Branch of the Public Health Department, for the special tutorials she so ably gives to the Infant Welfare trainees.

The Committee is also grateful to Dr. Nigel Gray, Deputy Medical Superintendent of the Royal Children's Hospital, for the time he gives to lecturing on Infectious Diseases, and to Dr. Roy Cash, Senior Dentist to the Melbourne City Council, for his special lectures on "Dental Care", and also to Dr. M. Wilson, of the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, who lectures on "Home Safety and Accident Prevention".

During the year, Dr. E. A. Morey lectured to the Infant Welfare trainees on "The Child and His Family", "The Management of Young Children" and "The Handicapped Child", when she returned from overseas.

During the year Dr. Officer lectured to the Infant Welfare trainees on the Child and His Family, and the Management of Young Children and the Handicapped Child, when Dr. Morey was overseas.

Dr. Ruth Walker looks after the Mothers and Babies in the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and Dr. Margery Wadds conducts a weekly clinic to trainees in the Baby Health Centre, and is also Assistant Paediatrician to the Hospital.

Dr. Marcia Robinson continued her lectures on "Pre-natal Care" to Infant Welfare trainees during the year.

Dr. T. Seward has continued his lectures on "Preventive Dentistry" to trainees and to Mothers in residence, or attending the Baby Health Centre.

Special Lectures on the pre-school child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by Matron and her Nursing Staff.

Dr. Doris Officer continues to give lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the Medical Officers and Lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

The Council very much values the excellent manner in which the Matron, Miss E. M. Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister G. Stott, and the Nursing Staff carry out the work of the Hospital, and to ensure its smooth running. Mothers constantly express their warm gratitude for all the help and care they receive at the Hospital.

The Council records its appreciation of the work during the year of its Honorary Medical Officer to the Staff of the Hospital. The Council values the time that Dr. Helen Byrne gives so generously to this work.

The Council appreciates too the loyal and efficient work carried out during the year by all members of the domestic staff. The smooth running of the domestic side of the Hospital contributes so much to the successful running of the Hospital.

During the year, Mrs. L. E. Dwyer was appointed Housekeeper in place of Mrs. Scott, who resigned. The Committee appreciates the work that Mrs. Dwyer has put in to ensure the smooth running of the domestic side of the hospital.

The Council values Mr. J. Stenning's work as general handyman — and the many services he carries out for the Hospital and the "Isabel Younger Ross Memorial Hall".

Many improvements have been effected by the Committee at the hospital during the year. These include:— New blinds in the mothers' wing, and new exhaust fan in the mothers' wing food room, and the re-upholstering of the couch in the mothers' sitting room, the re-painting and other repairs to the infant welfare trainees' residential quarters,

library and bathrooms in the infant welfare trainees' section, and passages in the infant welfare and mothercraft trainees' quarters, the work of re-painting other passageways in the building is proceeding. The Committee greatly values the very practical advice and help that Mr. H. H. Beet so readily gives in regard to all this work, and which he carries out personally and single-handed.

A television set was purchased during the year for the use of the domestic staff, and chairs in their sitting-room were re-upholstered, and a new linoleum laid.

A television set was also purchased for the use of the nursing staff.

The re-painting of the exterior of the hospital has been started, and prior to this, all necessary gutterings and down-pipes were renewed.

QUEEN ELIZABETH BABY HEALTH CENTRE

This Centre gives daily advice to many mothers living in the vicinity, and visits are also paid to the homes of the mothers.

The Sister-in-Charge is not only responsible for the routine running of the Centre itself, but also for the practical training of the Infant Welfare Trainees in Centre work.

The Council is grateful to Sister Love, the Sister-in-Charge, for her excellent work during the year.

Not only does this Auxiliary contribute many gifts of baby clothes to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital during the year, but has raised substantial sums for the purchase of special equipment for the Hospital.

During the year, this Auxiliary made a contribution of £199/10/9 for stacking chairs and a doctors desk for the Baby Health Centre Section of the Hospital, and have also contributed funds for the renovation of the furniture and its re-upholstering in matron's sitting-room.

The Council expresses its warm thanks to the members of this Auxiliary for their continued valuable help to the Hospital.

STAFF AMENITIES FUND

The Staff Amenities Fund, organised and run by Matron Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister Stott, and Sister Love, Sister in Charge of the Baby Health Centre, to assist the Hospital with special equipment, has provided a refrigerator for the Infant Welfare trainees' pantry, and a screen for the movie projector.

Through the generosity of Dr. Ruth Walker, who gave a donation of £100 to the fund, a Hoover Automatic Washing Machine was provided for the Nursing Staff.

A special picture night, with stalls, was held recently and raised £76/8/- for the Fund. New stacking desks are being purchased as a result of this effort.

The Library at the Hospital has been re-organised under Sister Love, and new books of value to the Nursing Staff during their training, have been purchased.

The Committee very greatly values these magnificent efforts made to assist the Hospital by Matron and her Nursing Staff, and to the success of which the members of the Domestic Staff have also generously contributed by supporting their fund-raising efforts. The Committee thanks all those, including the friends of the Nursing and Domestic Staff who have done so much to help the work of the Hospital.

ISABEL YOUNGER ROSS MEMORIAL HALL

During the year the Hall has again been in demand for various functions and conferences.

The monthly lectures for Infant Welfare Sisters from all over the State, which are arranged by the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, are held in the Hall, and the monthly lectures arranged by the Association and given by Dr. Kate Campbell, are also held at the Hall.

The attractiveness and excellent facilities at the Hall have been appreciated by all who have used it, and special delight and comment have been expressed on its excellent acoustics.

LECTURING SISTER

The past year for Mothercraft Lectures has proved most successful.

The percentage of certificate awards was excellent, and the standard of the work very high.

Two prizes were awarded by the Association at the end of the year for the best project books.

All girls taking the mothercraft lectures at the schools serviced by the Association, do a written exam. paper, on which they are marked for their certificates, and have to get 75% or over marks for a certificate. The project books are judged separately for the prizes.

One prize was awarded to a student at Fintona Girls' School, and the other to a student at the East Preston Technical School.

Many expressions of appreciation of the Mothercraft Lectures given have been received from headmasters and headmistresses and principals of the various schools, and from the girls themselves.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters-in-Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

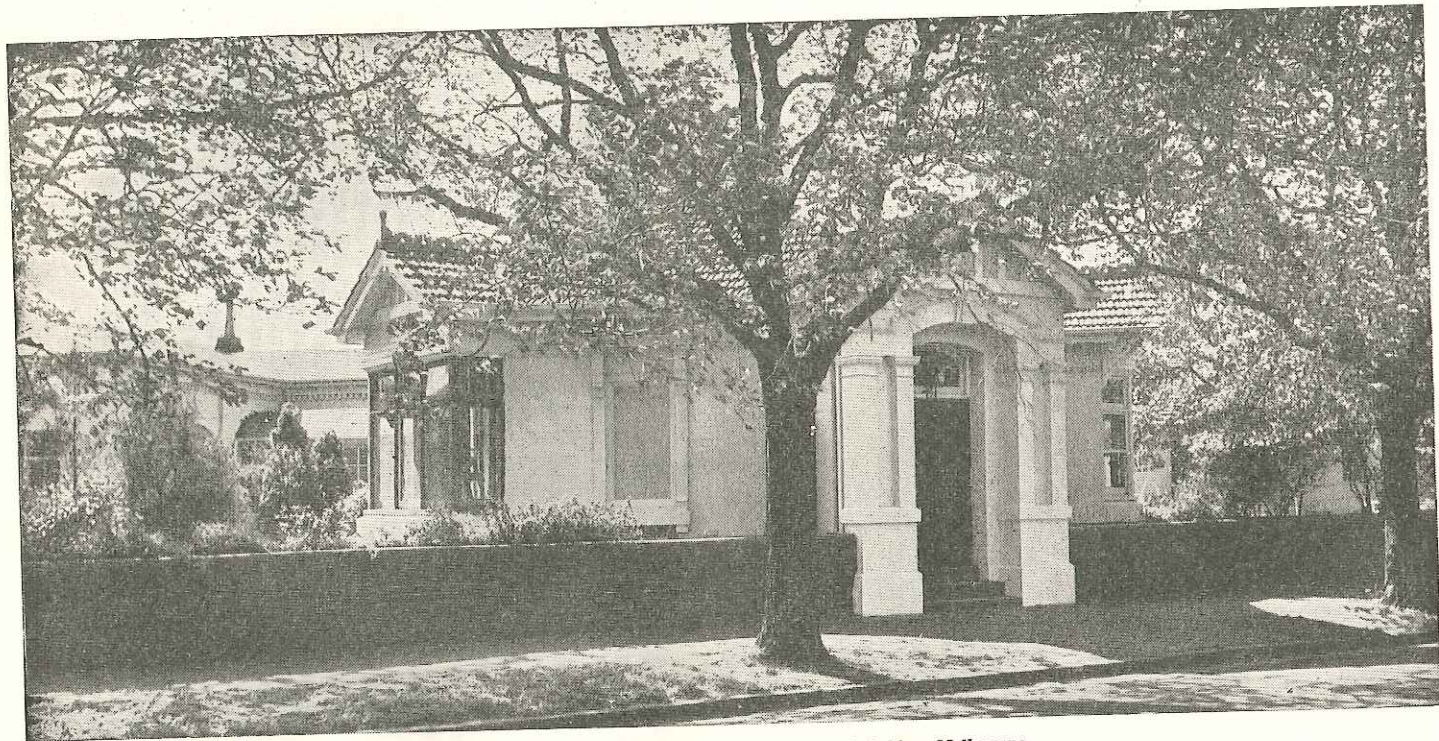
STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy now paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £750 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £3,000.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have only been increased, since 1946, by £1000 shared between three Infant Welfare Training Schools.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose, and the Association's Central Council has assisted many Committees with grants towards the equipment of new centres, or for extending the work in existing ones.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £750 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £22/3/6, with an additional payment of 17/6 per week if required to use any certificates or certificates other than (a) a General Nursing Certificate, (b) an infant welfare certificate.

A uniform allowance of 8/- per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres, or give a "car allowance" if a Sister uses her own car for her work.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies with regular donations each year.

WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to collect paper and make it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal" in which the Association shares.

During the year the Hon. Secretary of the Association, Dr. Doris Officer, O.B.E., has continued as Chairman of the Hospital and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

FINANCE

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work, and without this support the Association could not continue its work.
