AIMS AND OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION



- 1. To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- 2. To encourage the breast feeding of infants.
- 3. To equip and maintain a Hospital and Babies Home, and Infant Welfare and Mothercraft Training School, with Model Baby Health Centre for:
 - (a) The special training of Infant Welfare Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses.
 - (b) The provision of education for mothers with a view to enabling them to bring up their children in accordance with modern health principles.
 - (c) The provision of accommodation for the education and care of mothers and babies, especially nursing mothers, and for difficult, delicate or premature babies who may require special investigation and expert care in regard to their rearing, and so that where mothers in poor, necessitous or destitute circumstances are so accommodated and maintained, the Association shall contribute towards their upkeep from its funds received voluntarily for the purpose.
- 4. To co-operate with School and other authorities in giving teaching to classes of school girls and young women with the view of gaining their sympathy and interest in the proper care and nurture of babies and young children.
- 5. To arrange for organised teaching to women on the care of the-
 - (a) expectant mother,
 - (b) the mother, and
 - (c) children,

and to disseminate such knowledge by every available means.

6. To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Forty-eighth Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the works in its own district, the Association acting as a co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this report relates only to the activities of the Central Council of the Association and its Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies and Infant Welfare Training School.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met every month. The Executive Committee consists of the office-bearers and twenty (20) members of the Council of whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country centres, and one a member of the Australian Medical Association, and is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting.

This Committee which co-ordinates the work has met every month.

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, and a Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the Nurses and the conduct of the Hospital and its Baby Health Centre, and in the recommendations for development of the work of the Hospital.

Finance is dealt with by a separate Sub-Committee.

LADY DELACOMBE

Lady Delacombe, the Association's Patroness, very graciously consented to officially open the "1966 Doll Pageant" held at the Myer Emporium in May in aid of the Association's "Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies and Infant Welfare Training School".

The Association deeply appreciates Lady Delacombe's interest in our work for the Mothers and Babies throughout the State, and particularly in that being carried out by our Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies.

In speaking of this work Lady Delacombe once said—"Peace of mind is surely one of the most important factors in a Mother's life ,and by bringing her baby or her worries to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for their help and advice I know this is what she is getting".

LADY CURTIS

Lady Curtis was warmly welcomed by the Council as the Association's new President at the beginning of the year—and the Council has valued the help and leadership which she has given to the Association's work during the year, and the new contacts that she has been able to interest in our work.

MRS. W. L. KERNOT, M.B.E.

The resignation of Mrs. Kernot as Vice-President of the Association, on account of ill-health, was received by the Council with very real regret. Mrs. Kernot has represented the Geelong Baby Health Centre Committee on the Central Council for nearly 49 years, ever since the establishment of the Geelong Baby Health Centre in December, 1917 the first Centre to be established in the country in Victoria. She also represented the Geelong West City Council on our Central Council for many years. Mrs. Kernot was elected a Life Member of the Association and still retains a keen interest in our work. The Asociation, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible, not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment, and facilities for her work.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation,

There are now 484 Centres affiliated with the Association. New Centres have been established at Doncaster West. Mentone, Beaumaris. Cora Lynn (Berwick), and Research (Eltham).

New Centre buildings have been opened during the year at Mentone, Liardet St., (Port Melbourne), Gisborne, Doncaster West, Rochester, Cooma Street (East Moorabbin), Beaumaris, Rosanna (Heidelberg), Snake Valley, Amphitheatre, Park Orchards (Doncaster & Templestowe), Altona Street (South Kensington), Clarence Street (Prahran), Cobden, Leopold (Bellarine), Woomelang, and Patchewollock.

Terang Centre has been remodelled, and the foundation stone laid for the new Herne Hill (Geelong West) Infant Welfare and Pre-School

Mornington Infant Welfare Centre Committee affiliated with the Association during the year.

Centres visited by the Hon. Secretary during the year to attend Annual Meetings were Castlemaine, Croydon, Eltham, Sandringham, Lancefield, Caulfield, Warrandyte, Oakleigh, Malvern and Camberwell, Geelong West and the New Norfolk Baby Health Centre in Tasmania.

Mrs. Rivers Dickinson represented the Association at Annual Meetings at Montrose, Kilsyth, and the Croydon "Get Together Club".

Dr. Officer, Hon. Secretary, represented the Association at the "Women at Work" Conference held at the Southern Cross Hotel in May.

Dr. Officer also attended a "Health Education Workshop" residential seminar held at Mont Park the end of May, at which 60 organisations interested in, or active in, health education were represented. A later meeting in connection with this Health Education Workshop was attended in early August to correlate its findings and was held at Royal Park.

Dr. Officer represented the Association at the Official Opening of "Child Care Week, 1966" - by Lady Delacombe on August 7th at the Isabel Younger Ross Hall.

Mrs. Paton, President of the Nursing Mothers' Association, attended the 1965 October Council Meeting as Guest Speaker, and gave an interesting talk on the work of her Association in stimulating renewed interest in the breast-feeding of babies.

On behalf of her Association she presented some excellent books on this subject for the library at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies.

Dr. W. A. Kemp, a member of the Association's Executive Committee, gave an interesting talk on his recent visit to New Guinea to the Council in April, 1966.

Talks on "The Child and His Family" were given by the Hon. Secretary, Dr. Officer to the "Thistle Club," Mentone, and to the Box Hill Home Help Service personnel during the year.

At the request of the Nursing Mothers' Association, Dr. Officer gave a talk on "Home Safety", illustrated by slides at one of their monthly meetings.

The Council is grateful to Mr. L. Newton of Macedon, who very kindly opened his garden for public inspection in aid of our Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers & Babies last year.

The Council welcomes several new members to its Queen Elizabeth Hospital Committee, Mrs. W. Howard, Mrs. Bloore, Mrs. D. Wang, Mrs. Alwyn Goodman, and Mrs. E. A. Broadbent. The Council will value their help and interest in our work.

Mr. W. Howard, who for so many years has been Chairman of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital's Business Men's Committee, has become a member of the Association's Finance Committee.

WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils are also providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at a very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

Advice at the Centres covers that given to expectant mothers, and the baby from 0-5 years of age (i.e., up to school age).

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, by teaching her the "art of motherhood".

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for many years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists. Other country towns could well follow this lead.

Melbourne, South Melbourne, Prahran, Brunswick and Essendon City Councils have established pre-school dental clinics in their districts in connection with their infant welfare centres, and other Councils we hope will develop similar services.

Ante-Natal Care.—Care of the expectant mother and advice to her on all points of general hygiene and diet has always been a feature of Baby Health Centre work. Extension of such care has been carried out for some years now by the establishment of ante-natal clinics in connection with Baby Health Centres under special medical supervision.

Such clinics have been established in many Municipalities.

An extension of this work is particularly desirable since it saves the mother both time and fatigue in travelling and the over-crowding of the ante-natal clinics at the hospitals, with whom the Centre antenatal clinics work in close co-operation.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.


Some Baby Health Centres are combining Pre-School facilities in conjunction with their centre buildings.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with some Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object, and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, and immunising against poliomyelitis, for children attending the Centre, or

living in their districts. Such immunisation programmes, together with vaccination against smallpox, are safeguards to the children's health, which Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all mothers to take advantage of.

Home Safety and Accident Prevention.—This is another sphere that Sisters in charge of Centres throughout the State have special opportunities of teaching the mothers and so reducing the mortality and incidence of the crippling injuries that may result from lack of thought in promoting "Home Safety". As our Infant Welfare Sisters are given special training in this subject during their Infant Welfare course, and 90% of mothers with young babies attend Baby Health Centres, the Sisters have the best opportunity of anyone in teaching "accident prevention".

PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Municipal Home Help Scheme.—The Councils who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need a MUCH greater extension of all existing Home Help Schemes.

Good "Personnel" for staffing "Home Help" services is our prime necessity, and many more of such personnel are required for this service.

Many more mothers would be enabled to breast-feed their babies if on return from hospital they could have the services of an efficient home-help to assist them in their homes, so that the mother can get adequate rest which is so essential at this time, especially if there are other young children to look after as well as the baby.

INFANT MORTALITY RATE

In 1965, the Infant Mortality rate in Victoria was 17.45 per 1,000 live births — a rise on the rate for 1964, when it was 16.89 per 1,000 live births, the lowest infant mortality rate recorded in Victoria.

"BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this Magazine during the year.

The magazine has now been in production for over eighteen years, and favourable comments are constantly being received in regard to it from readers in Victoria, in other Australian States, and from overseas readers.

The Association values the interest of the firms, who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements. The Council is grateful to all its regular subscribers and those Committees who guarantee to sell a certain number of copies each issue.

An increase in the number of regular subscribers would be welcomed, as this ensures the financial stability of the Magazine.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babes and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

THE QUEEN ELIZABETH HOSPITAL FOR MOTHERS AND BABIES

The year has been a particularly busy one. At our present building it has been possible to double our former training functions in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft and to almost quadruple the residential care given to Nursing Mothers and to the many delicate frail little infants, who are referred to this institution from all parts of the State, and further developments of the work of the hospital is being considered and planned.

A total of 474 mothers and babies admitted during the year.

Nursing Mothers' Wing.—In this wing mothers not only receive help if experiencing difficulty with natural feeding, but are taught the

care and management of their infants.

Many mothers are transferred to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies for extra rest and care from the Maternity Hospitals. All mothers who have been in residence have expressed their appreciation of the wonderful help given to them, and their delight that there is such a place for them to come to for rest, care and alleviation of their difficulties.

They have received the "peace of mind" and help referred to by Lady Delacombe.

Highly successful results with breast feeding are being achieved through the work of this section of the institution, but much more could be achieved if more mothers were encouraged to come into residence for the specialized help in the "Womanly Art of Breastfeeding" which is available in this section of the hospital, and much of the unnecessary weaning of babies, which too frequently occurs, could be avoided.

Mothers are also helped if experiencing weaning problems with their older babies, and can be helped in the management of twins.

Infants' Hospital Section.—In this section, skilled attention is being given to ex-premature, frail and delicate babies — little babies who would rapidly go downhill if they did not receive this expert care often required for long periods. They leave the hospital as bright, bonny babies with a firm hold on life. An increased number of babies referred from the Social Welfare Department have been taken into residence for this specialized care, and the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies has been gazetted as an Approved Babies Home for this purpose.

Dr. Bialestock, a member of our Executive Committee, and in charge of the babies admitted to "Allambie", the Social Welfare Department's home for babies needing care as Wards of State, sends those babies to our Queen Elizabeth Hospital whom she feels would benefit physically, mentally, and emotionally from the expert care and individual "mothering" which is a special feature of the hospital's work. A sojourn at the hospital has often led to the much earlier adoption of some of these babies than would otherwise have been the case.

Training Functions.—Training of Baby Health Centre Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses is an important work of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Mothers and Babies. These highly-trained Nurses take skilled advice to countless mothers all over the State.

Infant Welfare Trainees.—Thirty-five (35) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 1,293 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained by the Association since the inception of this Movement in Victoria.

Eight (8) Infant Welfare Sisters have been given Special Refresher Courses in Infant Welfare during the year.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year-

The Council congratulates the winners of these prizes on their success.

Eight (8) Mothercraft Students are in residence for the fifteen months Course in Mothercraft.

Six (6) Mothercraft Nurses completed their training during the months Course in Mothercraft.

During the year Tongala Milk Products Pty. Ltd. have very generously made a sum of money available to the Association to provide a "scholarship" each term to assist an infant welfare trainee with her course. This has been greatly valued by those selected for this scholarship each term. Holders this year have been:—

First Term — Sister I. J. Schulze. Second Term — Sister M. Wise. Third Term — Sister J. M. Wagner.

Dr. Kate Campbell continues her work as Senior Medical Officer to the Hospital and as Medical Lecturer to the Infant Welfare trainees.

Dr. Elizabeth Turner also continues her work of lecturing to the Infant Welfare trainees.

The Committee is grateful to Miss W. Ride, S.Tut.Dip., from the Maternal and Child Welfare Branch of the Public Health Department, for the special tutorials she so ably gives to the Infant Welfare trainees.

The Committee is also grateful to Dr. Nigel Gray, Deputy Medical Superintendent of the Royal Children's Hospital, for the time he gives to lecturing on Infectious Diseases, and to Dr. Roy Cash, Senior Dentist to the Melbourne City Council, for his special lectures on "Dental Care", and also to Dr. M. Wilson, of the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, who lectures on "Home Safety and Accident Prevention".

During the year Professor E. A. Morey lectured to the infant welfare trainees on "The Child and His Family", "The Management of Young Children" and "The Handicapped Child"—

Dr. Ruth Walker looks after the Mothers and Babies in the Nursing Mothers' Wing, and Dr. Margery Wadds conducts a weekly clinic to trainees in the Baby Health Centre, and is also Assistant Paediatrician to the Hospital.

Dr. Marcia Robinson continued her lectures on "Pre-natal Care" to Infant Welfare trainees during the year.

Dr. T. Seward has continued his lectures on "Preventive Dentistry" to trainees and to Mothers in residence, or attending the Baby Health Centre.

Special Lectures on the pre-school child are given by Miss Stubbs of the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" are paid by trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by Matron

and her Nursing Staff.

Dr. Doris Officer continues to give lectures on "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the Medical Officers

and Lecturers, and the time they devote to this work.

The Council very much values the excellent manner in which the Matron, Miss E. M. Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister G. Stott, and the Nursing Staff carry out the work of the Hospital, and to ensure its smooth running. Mothers constantly express their warm gratitude for all the help and care they receive at the Hospital.

The Council appreciates too the loyal and efficient work carried out during the year by all members of the domestic staff. The smooth running of the domestic side of the Hospital contributes so much

to the successful running of the Hospital.

The Committee appreciates the work that Mrs. Dwyer, as housekeeper, has put in to ensure the smooth running of the domestic side of the hospital.

The Council values Mr. J. Stenning's work as general handyman and the many services he carries out for the Hospital and the "Isabel

Younger Ross Memorial Hall".

Many improvements have been effected by the Committee at the Hospital during the year. These include: - new curtains for Matron's sitting room, new blinds for the Nursery Wing, and outside blinds for the kitchen, the whole of the exterior of the hospital has been repainted, and interior painting and renovations have been carried out in the Mothercraft Students' Wing, the entrance hall, and corridors in the domestic wing, and laundry section.

The Committee greatly values the very practical advice and help that Mr. H. H. Beet so readily gives to all the interior painting and renovations needed at the hospital, and the great interest he shows in the Hospital and its work, and in its smooth running whilst renovations

and repainting are being carried out.

Strip heaters have been installed in the sunroom off the Nurseries.

QUEEN ELIZABETH BABY HEALTH CENTRE

This Centre gives daily advice to many mothers living in the vicinity, and visits are also paid to the homes of the mothers.

The Sister-in-Charge is not only responsible for the routine running of the Centre itself, but also for the practical training of the Infant Welfare Trainees in Centre work.

The Council is grateful to Sister Love, the Sister-in-Charge, for her excellent work during the year.

Sister Love and her staff have given co-operation to the Melbourne City Council in its campaign for diphtheria immunisation, and have organised the smooth running of the monthly immunisation sessions, carried out by the Council's medical officer. Assistance is also given to Dr. Brodrick, Child Welfare Medical Officer for the City of Melbourne. at her medical clinics at the Queen Elizabeth Baby Health Centre.

The Pre-Natal Clinic which was started at the Centre in February. 1965, has continued to function well, and attendances are increasing.

It is staffed by a medical officer from the Melbourne City Council,

but the nursing staff is provided by the Association.

The dietitian, Miss Ramsay, from the Maternal Child Welfare Department, now visits the clinic to advise the patients on diet. This is of great benefit to them and to the infant welfare trainees.

Sister Love, with the assistance of the R.A.C.V., arranged a display at the Centre illustrating "Car Safety for Children" - which was of great interest to the mothers attending the Centre, it was on view for two months. New library books have been purchased for the Centre.

During the year the Business Men's Committee contributed \$907.19 to the Hospital funds, and \$150 from the Lord Mayor's Command Performance.

Through the interest of Mr. W. Howard, as President of the Bing Boys, new Sunray strip heaters were purchased for the Sun-room off the

Nurseries, and the cost donated by the Bing Boys.

The Council is deeply grateful to Mr. Howard, and all of his business friends, for their splendid help during the year and the very material benefits that their activities have brought to the Hospital funds.

AUXILIARIES

Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Surrey Hills Auxiliary:

The Council is very appreciative of the very valuable and continued

help given by this Auxiliary to the Hospital during the year.

Not only does this Auxiliary contribute many gifts of baby clothes to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital during the year, but has raised substantial sums for the purchase of special equipment for the Hospital.

During the year this Auxiliary made a contribution of \$214.46 for new blinds in the Nursery Wing, and for an exterior sun-blind for the kitchen quarters, and have also purchased a new "Whirlpool" Washing Machine, at a cost of \$270 for the Hospital laundry.

The Council expresses its warm thanks to the members of this Auxiliary for their very splendid efforts on behalf of the hospital.

STAFF AMENITIES FUND

The Staff Amenities Fund, organised and run by Matron Buxton, the Assistant Matron, Sister Stott, and Sister Love, Sister-in-Charge of the Baby Health Centre attached to the Hospital, have continued their valuable work of raising funds for the purchase of special equipment for the Hospital.

As a result of a Theatre Night to see the "Great Waltz", and a film night, with gift stalls, held at the "Isabel Younger Ross Hall", \$250 was

raised for the New Building Fund of the Hospital.

New curtains for Matron's sitting room were also provided.

ISABEL YOUNGER ROSS MEMORIAL HALL

During the year the Hall has again been in demand for various

functions and conferences.

The monthly lectures for Infant Welfare Sisters from all over the State, which are arranged by the Maternal and Child Welfare Department, are held in the Hall, and the monthly lectures arranged by the Association and given by Dr. Kate Campbell, are also held at the Hall.

The attractiveness and excellent facilities at the Hall have been appreciated by all who have used it, and special delight and comment

have been expressed on its excellent acoustics.

Owing to the increased usage of the Isobel Younger Ross Hall, 80 new stacking chairs have been purchased during the year.

LECTURING SISTER

The Mothercraft Lectures given to Girls' Schools have been carried on very successfully this year.

Sister Burgess reports that the standard of the work done by the girls receiving these lectures was very high, and the average percentage of certificates awarded was excellent.

All girls taking the mothercraft lectures at the schools serviced by the Association do a written exam paper on which they are marked for their certificates, and have to get 75%, or over, marks for a certificate.

The girls also prepare project books on this subject. These are judged separately, and two prizes are awarded by the Association at the end of the year for the best project books. One prize this year was awarded to a student at Camberwell Girls' Grammar School, and the other to a student at Middle Park Central School.

Mrs. N. Davidson, who represents the Girl Guides' Association on our Central Council, was lent four interesting project books, prepared by the girls taking Mothercraft lectures, to show at a meeting at which Lady Delacombe and Lady Bolte were present. They aroused great interest at the Meeting — Sister Burgess said they were, all four, very outstanding in standard.

Sister Burgess reports that Mitcham Technical School, a large new Technical School, hopes to commence Mothercraft lectures next year.

Many expressions of appreciation of the Mothercraft Lectures given have been received from headmasters, headmistresses and principals of the various schools visited, and from the girls themselves.

Total number of classes lectured to numbered 90. At many Schools more than one class is given.

The Council has very much valued Sister Burgess's work as Lecturing Sister, and the interest she takes in it.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters-in-Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy now paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to \$1,500 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to \$6000.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Queen Elizabeth Mothercraft and Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a much higher rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety. These grants have only been increased, since 1946, by \$2,000 shared between three Infant Welfare Training Schools.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as funds and the Government subsidy are available. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose, and the Association's Central Council has assisted many Committees with grants towards the equipment of new centres, or for extending the work in existing ones.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of \$1,500 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time.

The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now \$59 per week, rising to \$64 in the fourth year of service.

A uniform allowance of 8/- per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres, or give a "car allowance" if a Sister uses her own car for her work.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

WASTE PAPER AND CARDBOARD APPEAL

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of waste paper, the collection being carried out by the "Hospitals and Charities Paper and Cardboard Appeal Committee".

The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to collect paper and cardboard, and make it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Paper and Cardboard Appeal" in which the Association shares.

During the year the Hon. Secretary of the Association, Dr. Doris Officer, O.B.E., has continued as Chairman of the Hospitals and Charities Paper and Cardboard Appeal Committee.

FINANCE

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work, and without this support the Association could not continue its work.
