THIRD ANNUAL REPORT, 1920-1921.

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AIMS AND OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies, by the spread of knowledge of the laws of health.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To employ trained nurses who shall:-
 - (a) Attend certain centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (4) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (5) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The objects of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centre, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

Third Annual Report.

Ladies and Gentlemen,-

In presenting the Third Annual Report, the Executive Council draws attention to the fact that while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this pamphlet is for the Executive Council and the Training School only.

GENERAL PROGRESS.

During the year great progress has been made in all directions. The establishment of a Training Centre for nurses, the opening of many new Centres, the widening of the scope of the work in all Centres in lectures to school girls, demonstrations to expectant mothers, and propaganda work generally, have brought home to many the fact that life is the chief source of wealth and greatness of a nation, and that the rearing of strong, healthy children is the most patriotic work in which anyone can take part.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

The Executive Council, which is composed of delegates from the local committees of the various Baby Health Centres, the contributing Municipal Councils, the State Government, the various institutions dealing with child welfare has met monthly.

This year the duties of the Council have been very onerous, owing to the number of new centres opened and various matters relating to the extension of the work in country districts, and it is proposed to form a small executive body to meet at frequent intervals and co-ordinate the work of the Executive Council.

TRAINING SCHOOL.

The Training School and Model Centre was opened by Her Excellency, Lady Forster, at the end of last October. This Training School provides a post graduate course of training of three months' duration for nurses on the general register of the R.V.T.N.A. in order to fit them to take positions as sisters in charge of Baby Health Centres. Sister Peck is in charge, four nurses being in training every three months. The training is an intensive one, and is proving a very great asset to the efficiency of the work done in the Baby Health Centres.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS.

The Executive Council is indebted to Miss Rhoda Strachan for her organisation of the voluntary helpers. These young ladies take a course of instruction and attend demonstrations at the Training School. They are of great assistance to the sisters in many of the Centres.

Thanks are also due to the Misses Anderson and Fortune, who have so materially helped in cutting out patterns sent from the Model Centre.
