Aims and Objects of the Association

- (1) To safeguard the health of mothers and babies.
- (2) To encourage the breast-feeding of infants.
- (3) To train double certificated Nurses in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare.
- (4) To employ these trained Nurses, who shall—
 - (a) Attend certain Centres, where not only mothers with their babies can come, but also expectant mothers.
 - (b) Visit mothers at their homes, and help them carry out simple hygienic rules.
- (5) To hold meetings and give organised teaching to women, as opportunity shall arise, and to disseminate such knowledge by every available agency.
- (6) To co-operate with all present or future organisations working for the same objects.

The object of the Association being to keep infants healthy, sick children are not treated at Centres, but are always referred to their own doctor or to a hospital.

THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In presenting the Thirty-third Annual Report the Council draws attention to the fact that, while its report gives a general survey of the Association's work, each Health Centre publishes its own Annual Report and Balance Sheet, manages its own affairs, and extends the work in its own district, the Association acting as the co-ordinating link between the various Centres.

The Balance Sheet at the end of this Report relates only to the Central Council, the Mothercraft Home and Training School and Travelling Baby Health Centre.

ADMINISTRATION

The Council has met very month. The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and ten members of Council, or whom two at least must be representatives of Municipal Councils, two at least representatives of country Centres, and one a member of the British Medical Association, is elected by the Council at the first meeting after the Annual Meeting. This Committee, which co-ordinates the work, has met every month. The Training School Committee and Medical Sub-Committee deal with all technical matters in connection with the training of the nurses and the conduct of Baby Health Centres generally. Finance is controlled by a separate Sub-Committee.

OBITUARY

The Council records with deep regret the death during the year of Mrs. E. E. Mott. Mrs. Mott had been a member of the Essendon Baby Health Centre Committee, and served on the Council and Executive Committee of the Association for many years, and rendered valuable service to the Baby Health Centre movement.

TRAVELLERS RETURN

Mrs. J. M. Gardiner, Vice-President of the Association, returned from her visit overseas in February.

Dr. Doris Officer, Hon. Secretary, returned from abroad in March. In the thirteen months away Dr. Officer extensively

studied Maternal and Child Welfare and other social services in eight countries.

The Council accorded both travellers a warm welcome on their return.

The Council also extended a welcome back to Dr. Barbara Meredith, Director of Maternal and Child Welfare, after her overseas visit. Dr. Meredith returned in May, having completed the period allotted by her W.H.O. Scholarship.

ACTING HON. SECRETARY

The Council records its deep appreciation to Dr. Isabel Younger Ross, who acted as Hon. Secretary whilst Dr. Officer was abroad. The Council valued very highly all the work that Dr. Younger Ross so capably carried out for the benefit of the Association during this period.

GENERAL PROGRESS

The Association, as the major Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisation in the State of Victoria, continues its work of establishing new Baby Health Centres and extending the scope of existing ones.

The Association also continues its interest in promoting legislative reform necessary for safeguarding the health of women and children, and stresses the definite need for increased funds for the development of all maternal and child welfare work, with its valuable objectives of saving infant life, the prevention of ill-health amongst young children and encouraging mothers to have, and rear, the healthy children so much needed by the nation.

The Association, as a representative organisation, affords the vital link-up of municipal and public interest in infant welfare work throughout the State that is so essential to the movement and its progress.

The Council of the Association is formed of representatives from the Municipal and Shire Councils, their Baby Health Centre Committees, and from other kindred societies interested in the welfare of women and children, and actively concerned with its actual promotion. Unity is strength, and such a link-up with a central organisation gives strength to this movement, since it creates the organised public opinion and interest that all progressive movements need in a democratic community.

Many Councils and Baby Health Centre Committees are interested and effective in promoting infant welfare work in their own districts, but it is only when they are linked up by representation in this Association that they can combine to form the necessary public opinion for promoting all measures

for safeguarding the health of the mothers and babies, and their sphere of influence in this work is widened by contact with others similarly engaged.

One trusts that as the Baby Health Centre movement develops in this State, and Commonwealth as a whole, that nothing will be allowed to militate against the strength and unity of the Voluntary Infant Welfare Organisations, which have been responsible not only for playing the vital part of pioneering this movement, but in maintaining its general progressiveness during the many years of its development, facts which are frequently forgotten.

The tremendous value to this movement of the work and interest of the Ladies' Baby Health Centre Committees formed to assist Councils in the domestic management of their Centres cannot be too strongly stressed.

Not only has the work of these committees been responsible in the first place for the establishment of the Centres in their district, and for stimulating the interests of their Councils in the project, but they have been largely responsible for the subsequent development of the work, and for obtaining for the sister the necessary equipment.

The best results in Centre work and their general running eventuates when Councils have such Ladies' Committees with whom they work in close co-operation.

YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

There are 305 Centres affiliated with the Association, 216 being in country districts, with 42 townships served by the Travelling Baby Health Centres; there are 347 districts linked up with the Association.

New Centres have been established, many of them part-time, in the Ararat, Avoca, Bellarine, Broadmeadows, Buln Buln, Corio, Geelong, Casterton, Ferntree Gully, Huntley, Lexton, Minhamite, Mortlake, Mount Rouse, Portland, Ripon and Stawell districts.

New Centre buildings have been built or are in course of erection at Richmond, Hawthorn, Alexandra, McKinnon, Newtown-Chilwell and Sale.

Many committees have funds in hand, or plans for raising the necessary money to assist their Councils with the provision of other new Centre buildings, where the work can be carried out to better advantage, and with more facilities for the Sisters.

The Annual Conference of Presidents and Secretaries of Baby Health Centres and delegates to the Central Council of the Association was held at the Victoria Palace on Friday, 6th June. Many delegates from all parts of the State attended.

Dr. G. Coles, Medical Officer of Health for Victoria and Chairman of the Health Commission attended. It was the first such Conference that Dr. Coles had attended, and he expressed interest in the Conference and the matters discussed, and how helpful it was to the whole Baby Health Centre movement.

Dr. Ruth Mocatto, Medical Officer to the Mothers' and Babies' Health Association of South Australia attended a Council Meeting of the Association during the year and spoke of their work in South Australia for the mothers and babies.

Since her return from abroad Dr. Doris Officer, Hon. Secretary, has visited the Centres in Ballarat, Bacchus Marsh and Upper Ferntree Gully and also performed the official opening of the attractive new Centre building at McKinnon.

Through the generosity of Pro-Vita Products, a sum of money is in hand for the establishment of a library at the Association's new Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School in Carlton. Also through the interest of the Mayoress of Essendon, and with a generous donation from her "Aid for Others" Committee a visual aid projector has been bought for use at the Mothercraft Home and for other educational activities of the Association.

We thank Mrs. E. Kellaway, Hon. Secretary of the Essendon and District Baby Health Centre Committee, and member of the Association's Executive and Training School Committees, for the excellent help she has given the Association during the year; it has been invaluable, particularly in connection with the Mothercraft Home.

WORK OF THE BABY HEALTH CENTRES

The work being carried out by the Baby Health Centres continues to increase and more demands than ever are being made on the Sisters' time and services to the community. This fact is becoming increasingly recognised by Councils and their Committees, and consequently additional Infant Welfare Sisters are being appointed to their Centres to cope with the extra work.

Many Councils also contemplate providing better transport facilities for their Sisters to help them to attend new Sub-Centres and to assist the mothers in their homes. This will conserve the Sisters' valuable time for the actual work of advising mothers, instead of much of it being wasted through inconvenient methods of transport.

The Baby Health Centre movement provides the most extensive system of parent education at very reasonable cost to the community. Of all services provided for the mothers it is one that comes most intimately in contact with them, both through the mothers' regular attendances at the Centres and

by the extensive system of home visiting, which is part of the Sisters' work.

The work carried out at the Centres by the Sisters is not only invaluable in its preservation of precious infant life and its prevention of avoidable illness, but it helps the mother in the establishment of sound family life, which is the only foundation for national happiness and security, and its promotion the only real remedy for the industrial unrest and social problems present in the community.

Dental Examinations.—The need for the extension of dental examination and treatment for children attending Centres is urgent, especially in country districts.

Colac provides dental inspection for the children attending the Centre. This has been in operation for some years, and has been possible through the co-operation and help of the local dentists.

Mobile vans for dental inspection and treatment is an urgent need in such outback country districts as those served by the Association's Travelling Baby Health Centre. Local dentists are few in these districts, and their attendance at some country townships irregular and with long intervals. This makes it impracticable for mothers to take their children of pre-school age for advice and treatment. The incidence of dental caries amongst children of this age, and in these districts, is far too high.

Pre-School Facilities.—Many new Baby Health Centres incorporate in their plans provision for indoor and outdoor playing spaces for toddlers. Suitable toys and equipment also provide demonstrations to parents of what is required for the development of children at different age levels.

Croydon has a Nursery School established at its Centre. Play groups have also been established in connection with other Centres—e.g., Belgrave, Lilydale, Warragul and Casterton, and others contemplate forming them. These play groups often function in suitable halls made available for the purpose.

Parent Clubs.—Parent Clubs have been established in connection with Baby Health Centres. Such clubs are primarily educational in object and form a valuable means of furthering the knowledge of parents in all matters connected with the upbringing of their children.

Clubs are established at Albert Park, Bendigo, Northcote, and Ascot Vale. Maryborough for some years has had a very progressive Mothers' Club, which has arranged many educational lectures for the mothers in the district.

It is hoped that other Councils and their Committees will consider the establishment of Parent Clubs, or the arrangement of special lectures for parents.

Libraries.—Many Centres are incorporating libraries of suitable books for the use of the mothers; a lead that other Centres could follow with advantage. Lists of suitable books and where to obtain them may be had on application to the Head Office of the Association.

Immunisation and Vaccination.—Many Councils continue to carry out immunising against diphtheria for children attending the Centre or living in their districts. Vaccination and immunisation against diphtheria and whooping cough are safeguards to the children's health which the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres should encourage all their mothers to have carried out.

PROBLEMS AFFECTING MOTHERS

Lack of Housing.—A separate home for each family is the most urgent need in this country for the health of the community.

No maternity homes, health centres, however well equipped, no schools with up-to-date buildings and apparatus, no free milk or meals can compensate for the evils of an overcrowded home, for it is impossible to teach health where people are herded together in insanitary conditions, as so many are these days. Relieving the acute housing shortage therefore remains a No. 1 Health necessity—inadequate housing outweighs all other problems in its adverse effect on the rearing of a family, and for stimulating an increase in our birth rate.

Services to the Home.—The provision of better, more reliable essential services to the home, such as gas, electricity and fuel, delivery and shopping facilities are necessary for promoting happy and contented home life. Inadequate heating and constantly recurring gas and electricity restrictions have a profound effect on the life of a mother. Time that might be spent with the children for their mutual benefit and pleasure is taken up in wrestling with obsolete household equipment.

Municipal Home Help Schemes.—The Councils, such as Kew, Hawthorn, South Melbourne, Camberwell and Ringwood, who have established Home Help Schemes in their districts, are making a valuable contribution to the health of women and children.

To relieve the constant dread which hangs over the mother of a young family, as to who will care for the children should she fall ill, or even during her confinement, we need an extension of all existing Home Help Schemes and the provision of properly staffed hostels where the children can reside during her absence.

The Government is to be congratulated on its interest in this "Home Help" problem, and for its having appointed a special organiser to stimulate and develop "Home Help" services in more municipalities. The Council wishes Miss Constance Duncan, the Department of Health's "Home Help" organiser, all success in her work.

It is, however, "personnel" for staffing such services that is our prime necessity.

Infant Mortality Rate

Vital statistics for 1950 show that the infant mortality rate has again fallen to 20.09 per thousand births for Victoria. This is very encouraging, but the neo-natal death rate occurring in infants under one month could be further improved by increased pre-natal care of the mothers.

"BABY HEALTH" QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

The Association has continued the production of this magazine during the year, and wishes to thank all those who have contributed articles which have helped to make the magazine a success.

The Association values the interest of the firms who support the production of the magazine by the insertion of advertisements.

The Council is grateful to all those who have become regular subscribers, as this helps the financial stability of the production. Rising costs of paper and of printing, etc., have increased considerably, and the magazine needs a great many more regular subscribers, and the interest of local Committees to guarantee the sale each issue of a guaranteed number of copies to ensure financial stability of the magazine.

If this support is forthcoming, continued production of the magazine would be ensured. The Minister of Health has approved and granted permission for the distribution of copies of "Baby Health" in Infant Welfare Centres.

VOLUNTARY HELPERS

The Council thanks the Voluntary Helpers of the many Baby Health Centres for the regular time they give each week to help the Sisters-in-Charge of Centres. This help is very greatly appreciated; it would be extremely difficult for the Sisters-in-Charge of busy Centres to give adequate time in advising mothers without this assistance of weighing the babies and carrying out other helpful Centre duties.

MOTHERCRAFT HOME AND INFANT WELFARE TRAINING SCHOOL

The year has been a busy one, and residential care and investigation has been given to a number of difficult babies, including premature babies.

Mothers have also been taken into residence for assistance with breast-feeding.

The Committee appreciates the work of the Sister-in-Charge of the Centre, Sister Stubbs, both for the mothers attending the Centre and in the training given to the Infant Welfare trainees.

TRAINEES

Twenty-six (26) Sisters were trained in Infant Welfare during the year. A total of 754 Infant Welfare Sisters have been trained since the inception of the movement.

The following prizes have been awarded during the year. The "Sir Herbert and Lady Olney" prizes, given to the trainee in each term considered most suitable for Baby Health Centre work:—

- First Term—Sister Eileen Tregenza.
- Second Term—Sister Iris Nancy Air.
- Third Term—Sister Joan I. Smith.

The "Margaret White" prize awarded to the trainee considered best in the year has been awarded to Sister Iris N. Air.

The Council is grateful to the donors of these prizes, and congratulates the winners on their success.

Sixty-three (63) Medical Students attended during the year for Special Lectures and Demonstrations in Infant Feeding and Management. Several Sisters were given "Refresher Courses" in Infant Welfare during the year.

Dr. Kate Campbell, Medical Officer to the Mothercraft Home, left in April on a visit overseas. Dr. Elizabeth Turner has taken over her work of supervising the medical care of the babies in residence, and the giving of the monthly lectures to Sisters in charge of Centres.

Dr. Norrene Nicholson has given the Medical Lectures to the trainees, and Dr. Mary Fraser conducts the weekly clinic to trainees in the "Baby Health Centre."

Dr. Winifred Kennan left for overseas in April, and we are grateful to Dr. Isabel Ireland for giving the Ante-Natal lectures to the trainees in her place.

Special lectures on the Pre-School Child have been given by Miss Walker, of the Public Health Department, and visits to the "Lady Gowrie Centre" have been paid by the trainees.

Dr. Doris Officer has resumed her lectures in "Public Speaking" to the trainees.

Nursing lectures and demonstrations are carried out by the Matron and her trained staff.

The Council appreciates the work carried out by the medical officers and lecturers and the time they devote to this work.

As the Assistant Matron, Sister Harrison, was leaving in September to be married, Sister M. C. Grant was appointed in her place to take up the appointment on 24th September.

The Council greatly appreciates the work of Miss J. Stillwell (Matron), Assistant Matron (Sister C. Harrison) and Staff Sister (Sister Brenda Smith). The work too carried out by the domestic staff is much appreciated, as it assists the smooth running of the Mothercraft Home as a whole.

NEW MATERNAL AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRE

Rebuilding and renovating of the former Carlton Home at 96 Keppell Street, Carlton, was continued during the year and practically finished in August—a few things, however, remain to be done before the building is completely finished.

Furnishings and equipment have been purchased for the new building, and have entailed a great deal of time and thought.

It was decided to transfer the activities conducted at our former Mothercraft Home and the new building on 17th August so as to free our former building for the use and expansion of the work of the Women's Hospital.

The move took place as scheduled, and went smoothly and without any serious interruption to the usual routine.

All the functions formerly conducted at the Association's former building at 730 Swanston Street, Carlton, now function at the new Mothercraft Home, 96 Keppell Street, Carlton. Doctors, nursing staff, trainees and the mothers have all expressed their appreciation of the comforts and facilities available in the new building.

Extra Infant Welfare Sisters and also training for Mothercraft trainees will be possible now the move to the new building has been made, and all our activities will be able to be very extensively increased.

There is a separate wing for ten (10) Nursing Mothers and their babies on the "Rooming-in" system. A modern Baby Health Centre adjoins this wing.

A special "Nursery Wing" accommodates 10 artificially-fed infants.

There is a special Premature Baby Unit with ante-room, and accommodation for four premature babies and two ex-premature babies. This unit is complete with heating and humidity control. An Isolation Unit is also provided, and a Special Lecture Room for the trainees.

Longer range plans for the Carlton site include:—

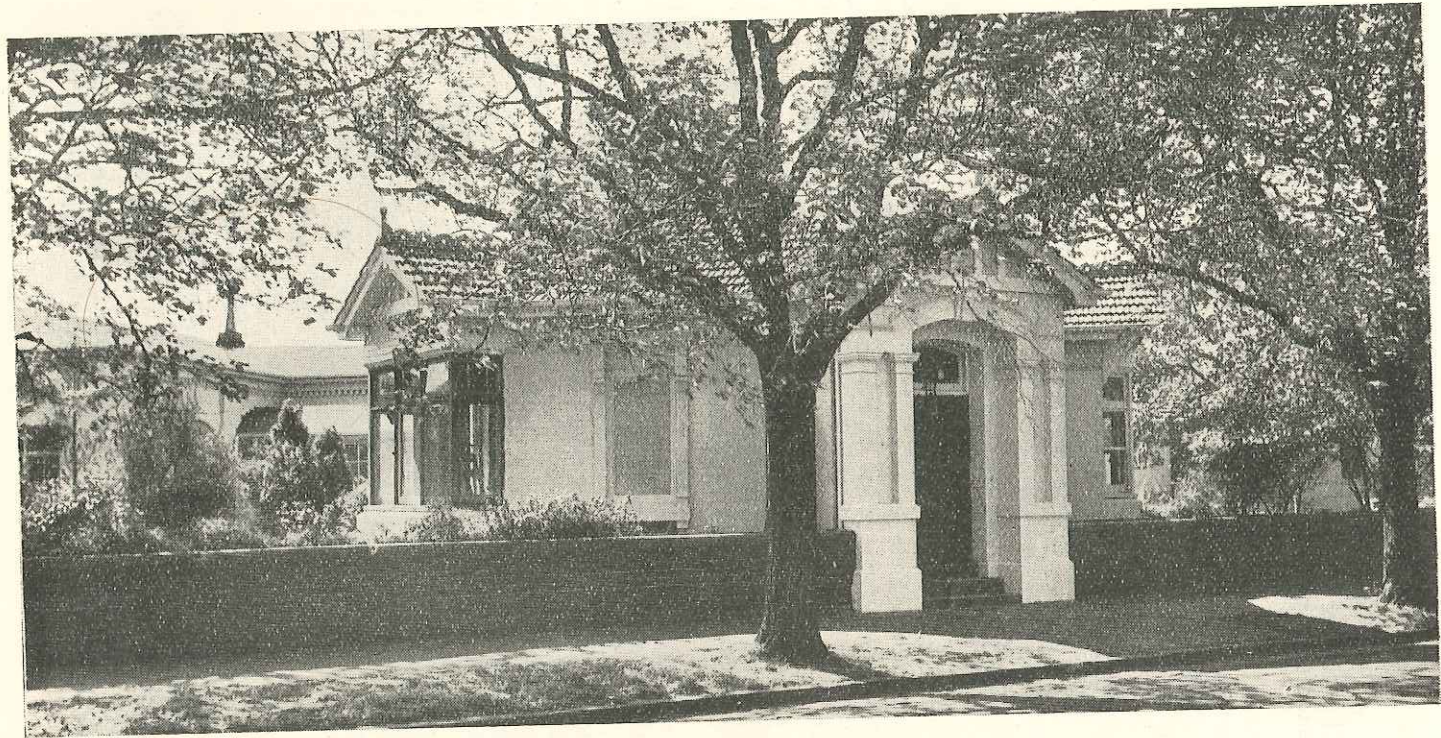
(1) Residential Centres for Mothers and Babies evacuated at an early date from Maternity Hospitals, and care of mothers and babies from the Children's Welfare Department.

(2) Pre-school care for children whose mothers have to go into hospital, and who have no one to look after them, and for children from the Royal Park Children's Welfare Depot.

(3) Day Nursery for the children of mothers forced by circumstances to work for their living.

When fully developed this Maternal and Child Welfare Centre with its many activities will be the most important Preventive Medicine Centre in the State.

The Association looks forward to co-operating with the Faculty of Medicine of the Melbourne University and the Children's Hospital in providing extra facilities for medical students to gain extra experience in all Maternal and Child Welfare aspects of preventive medicine.



TRAVELLING BABY HEALTH CENTRE (Mallee District)

This service has been on the road fourteen years, and was the pioneer Travelling Baby Health Service in Australia. A successful year's work is reported.

Attendances are slightly less this year, but fewer birth notifications have been received. The general health of the babies has been good, diphtheria and whooping cough immunisation has been carried out by the local doctors during the year.

The schedule was altered slightly in the year to meet the needs of the work at the different townships visited, or to overcome difficulties in road conditions.

The Sisters deeply appreciated Lady Brooks' (our Patroness) desire to see the Travelling Centre, and they enjoyed their visit to Government House early in the year to show the Caravan to Lady Brooks. Her interest in them and in their work was a great encouragement to the Sisters. The Sisters did a week's "refresher course" at the Association's Mothercraft Home whilst waiting for an overhaul on the Caravan to be completed in Melbourne. They also visited the "Lady Gowrie Centre" to study pre-school activities.

The Council deeply appreciates the work of the Sisters-in-Charge of the Travelling Baby Health Centre, Sister D. Goldsworthy and Sister M. Watson, and we know how much the mothers in the districts they serve appreciate the loyal and devoted services of these two Sisters.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT

The Lectures in Mothercraft given by the Association at many girls' schools and to various women's organisations form an important feature of our work for Infant Welfare.

Sister G. Mole, Lecturing Sister, reports that the Mothercraft classes in the schools have been very satisfactory. The

head teachers of the various schools are most co-operative and expressions of appreciation of the mothercraft course of lectures have been given. The project books compiled by the girls is an indication of the keen interest and enthusiasm that the girls who attend the lectures have for this subject.

Sister Mole reports that the "Baby Health Centre of the Air" session, which she conducts through 3UZ Broadcasting Station, is becoming well known and she receives many letters expressing interest in the sessions and gratitude for these weekly broadcasts.

Forty-seven (47) schools have been visited for the giving of lectures on "Mothercraft."

Some of the larger schools have two, three and four classes.

A total of 2,181 girls received these lectures during the year. Results of exams. were:—

The Council values Sister G. Mole's work as Lecturing Sister and many letters in appreciation of her work and personality are received by the Association.

LECTURES IN MOTHERCRAFT—COUNTRY DISTRICTS

In addition to the Lectures in Mothercraft supplied to Schools in the Metropolitan area, many Sisters in Charge of Baby Health Centres in the country have given lectures in their districts to senior school girls.

The Association congratulates these Sisters on carrying out this splendid educational work in addition to their routine Centre work.

CO-OPERATION

The Council wishes to express its appreciation for the interest, help and co-operation received from Dr. Meredith, Director of Maternal, Infant and Pre-School Welfare (Victoria) and members of her Department, also to Dr. E. Wilmot, who was Acting Director during Dr. Meredith's absence abroad.

The Council also expresses its appreciation of the interest and help received from Dr. Phillip Gilbert, Medical Officer of Health, City of Melbourne, and Dr. Hilda Kincaid, Child Welfare Medical Officer, Melbourne City Council, especially in connection with the work of the Association's Training School Centre in Carlton.

The Council thanks the Directors of the "Argus," "Age," "Herald" and "Sun" newspapers for their valuable publicity afforded during the year in regard to the Association's work. The Council also appreciates the space given by the Editors of many country and suburban newspapers to this work.

STATE GOVERNMENT

The Government subsidy paid to Municipalities with Baby Health Centres amounts to £250 per annum for each full-time Sister employed, and proportionately for each part-time Sister.

The subsidy towards the erection of Baby Health Centre buildings, which has recently been increased, is helpful and encouraging to local effort in raising funds for such buildings. The subsidy is now on a 2-1 basis up to £2,250.

The Association appreciates the increasing State Government interest in Maternal and Child Welfare work, evidenced by its increasing subsidies for this work.

The Council values the Government's continuance of the special grants to its Infant Welfare Training School. In view of increased costs occasioned by rises in salary rates and award conditions, over which the Committees responsible for running such institutions have no control, a high rate of subsidy is imperative if these institutions are to continue to function with any measure of freedom from financial anxiety.

The subsidy towards purchase of cars for Sisters in country districts, and the allotment of a grant towards their maintenance and depreciation is a very valuable contribution towards the success of Baby Health Centre work.

The Council appreciates the Government's interest in the Travelling Baby Health Centre service, and the subsidy allotted to assist its maintenance. This has been on the basis of half the salary for full-time Sisters appointed to this work. All other expenses are borne by the Association from funds voluntarily made available for the purpose.

The increased Government Grant to Shire Councils in respect of payment to Travelling Baby Health Centres Services in their districts provided the Councils increase their Grant by 100 per cent. is very much appreciated. This increase dates from July, 1949, and is of the greatest assistance to the maintenance of the Travelling Centre service.

MUNICIPAL AND SHIRE COUNCILS

Municipal and Shire Councils continue to take an active interest in the Centres and in the extension of this Service in their districts. The Councils have been responsible for the erection of many fine buildings. Further ones are contemplated in many districts as soon as building conditions are relaxed. Councils are frequently helped by funds raised by their Baby Health Centre Committees in erecting their buildings, and many Committees have quite large sums in hand for this purpose. Their funds will be greatly assisted by the extra Government subsidy now obtainable.

Councils bear all the maintenance costs of their Centres, and the cost of the Sister's salary, aided by the Government subsidy of £250 for each full-time Sister employed, or proportionately for those employed part-time. The award rate for Infant Welfare Sisters is now £12/16/- with an additional payment of 15/- per week if required to use any certificate or certificates other than—

- (a) General Nursing Certificate;
- (b) Infant Welfare Certificate.

A uniform allowance of 3/6 per week is also payable under the award.

Some Councils provide cars for their Sisters' use in visiting and travelling between sub-Centres.

In many country districts, especially those unserved or sparsely served by train or bus services, a car is a necessity for the Sister to facilitate her transport from one Centre to another to carry on her work in part-time Centres, or to save her time when visiting the mothers in their homes.

The Council is grateful to those Municipal Councils who support the work of the Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School with regular donations each year.

WASTE PAPER

The Association has continued to benefit each month by contributions received from the sale of Waste Paper, the collection of waste paper being carried out by the Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal Committee.

Collections of Waste Paper for the benefit of the Hospitals and Charities (in which the Association shares) have now been resumed. They were dropped temporarily last year. The Association asks all those interested in helping its work to resume collecting paper and making it available to the "Hospitals and Charities Waste Paper Appeal."

HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION

The Council records its thanks to the Hospitals and Charities Commission for their helpful grants during the year; they have been of great assistance in maintaining the work of the Mothercraft Home and Infant Welfare Training School. The sums received under the Hospital Benefits Act are also of great value. The Council would like to record its warm appreciation of the interest and always helpful advice given during the year by Mr. C. N. McVilly, Chairman of the Commission. The Association looks forward to a close co-operation with the Commission in the future development of the new Maternal and Child Welfare Centre in Carlton.

FINANCE

The Council desires to thank all those who have so generously contributed financial support for its many Maternal and Child Welfare activities during the year. These donations have been of great benefit to the Association's work.
